elementary teacher.

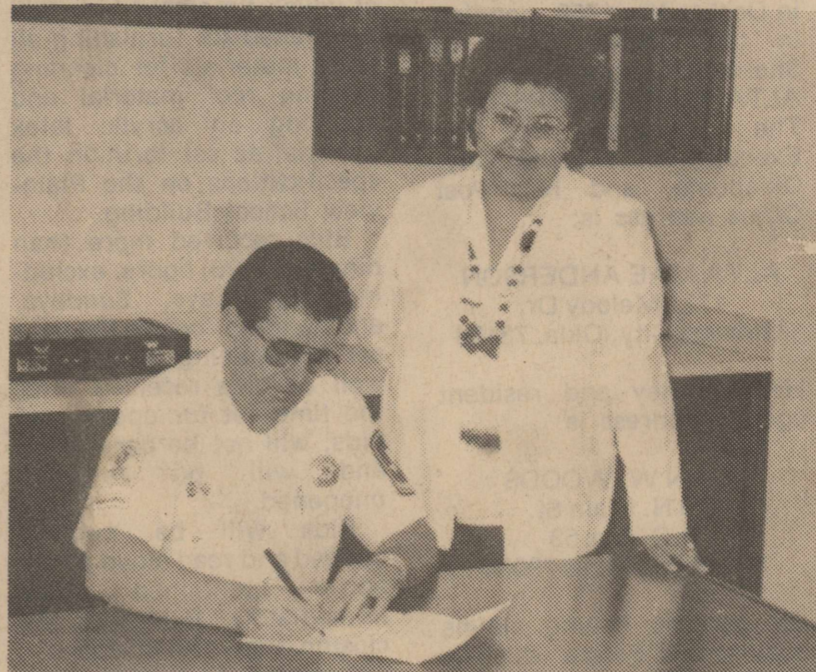

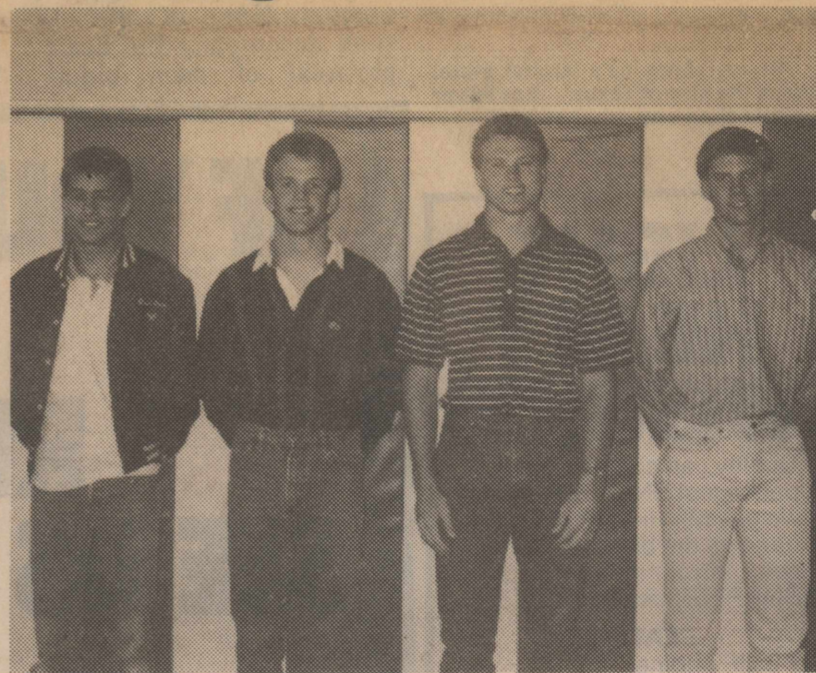
Compensation & Pension	\$158,919

April-Child Abuse Prevention Month

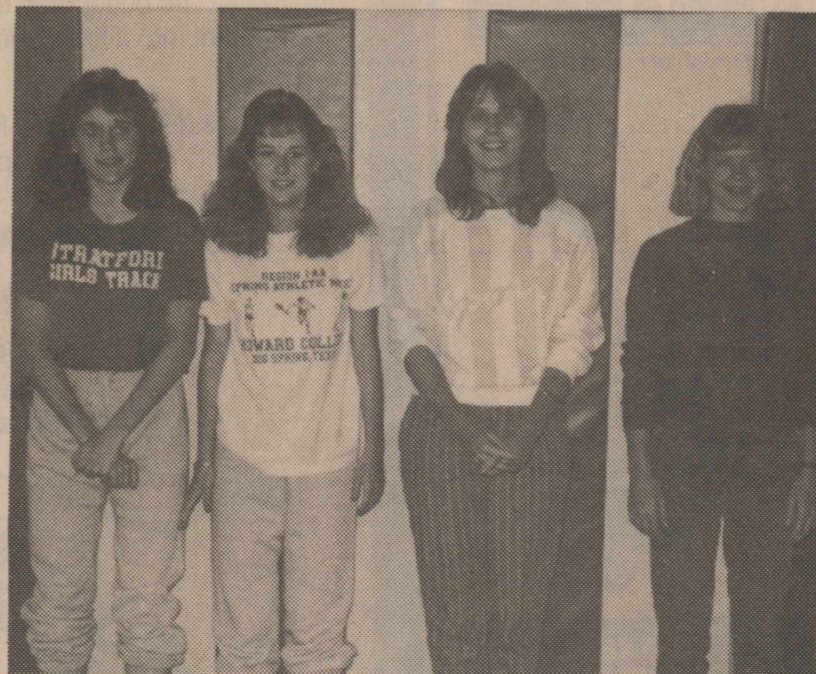

Sexual Abuse In The Rural Community

The Regional Council of Child Welfare Boards, Region 01 invites you to a workshop: "SEXUAL ABUSE IN THE RURAL COMMUNITY", presented by Dr. Wayne D. Duehn, Ph. D., University of Texas at Arlington, on April 23 at 7:00 p.m. and April 24 at 9 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. at the Fellowship Hall of the First United Methodist Church at 401 Binkley, Dumas, Texas.

Thursday evening, April 23rd, Dr. Duehn will focus on the definition of sexual abuse and its impact on child and family. Dr. Duehn invites the public to attend this informative session. What is sexual abuse?? What causes the offender to abuse the child, who is often his own? Why does the child not tell? Is sexual abuse or its treatment "different" in the rural areas? Dr. Duehn will allow ample time to address your questions.

On Friday, April 24th, identification, investigation, and treatment goals and strategies will be Dr. Duehn's topic. This session will be of particular interest to those who work with children or who work in law enforcement. Persons having legal responsibility for protecting children will also benefit from Dr. Duehn's discussion of the impact of sexual abuse, good vs bad investigations, and when to believe the child. Again, Dr. Duehn will pay particular attention to issues of interest to professionals from rural areas.

Dr. Duehn is an expert in the field of clinical practice with sexually abused children. He is a dynamic speaker and noted author on the subject of the sexually abusing family. Professor

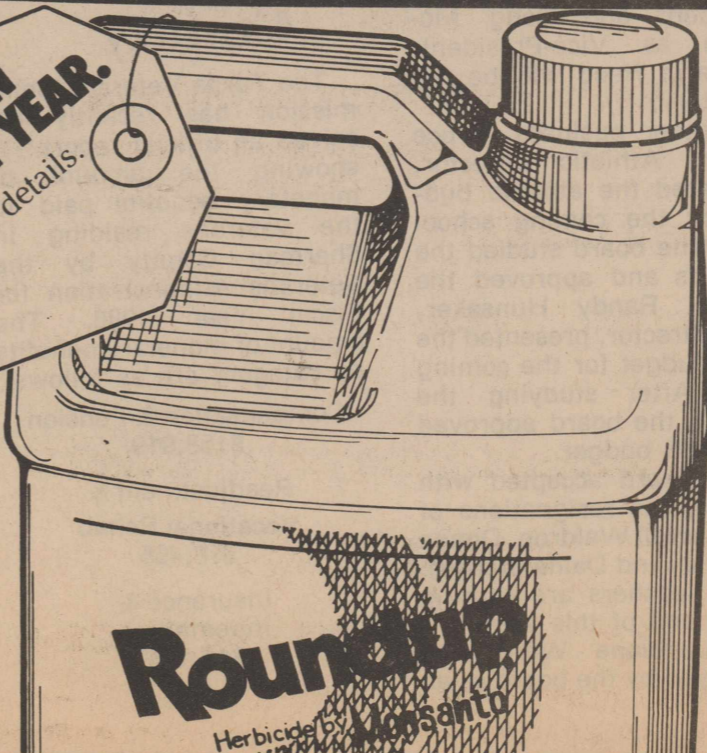

Letter To Editor

To: Pioneer Wheat Customers.

Subj: Freeze Damage on Wheat.

We've had many calls from wheat farmers the last couple of days regarding their need for information about the effects of cold temperatures on wheat. The most recent information we have been able to obtain was published by the Cooperative Extension Service in Kansas. We were able to obtain enough copies of this article to send to the Pioneer Sales Reps in each of your respective areas.

If you have any questions regarding the effects of the recent cold weather on your winter wheat crop, please feel free to contact your local Pioneer Sales Rep for a look at this article.

We believe the information contained in the article will help you assess the injury to your wheat crop. Keep in mind that you will need to wait a few days after the freeze to get an accurate assessment of your situation.

There are several factors that will influence the extent of damage to your wheat. The three most important factors are stage of growth, how low temperatures dropped and how long temperatures remained below freezing. Other considerations include whether the wheat is growing in low lying areas or on hillsides and the amount of available moisture.
