The PC-497, first submarine chaser ever built on the Texas coast, will be launched here Friday afternoon during impressive naval ceremonies at the Westergard-Rice Brothers & Company shipyard. The 110-foot boat is one of four being constructed here for the Navy under the defense pro-

Mrs. Bryson Filbert, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Rice, Sr., of Aransas Pass, has been accorded the honor of being named sponsor of the PC-497 and will christen the boat during the ceremonies scheduled to begin at 1:30 p. m., on July 4th. Only a small crowd of invited guests will be present inide the yards to witness the launch ng ceremonies.

It was believed that a larger crowd would gather on the rock break-water opposite the boat works for a long distance view of the launching. A close wa'ch will be kept for cameras and no one will be allowed to take pictures of the launching from the rocks.

Gates to the Boat Works will open at 1 p. m., and admittance will be by invitation only. The Rockport Municipal Band, sponsored Company, will give a concert before the launching ceremonies. The band will be under the direction of W. M. McGrath.

At 1:30 there will be an address by Mayor Jimmy Gregg of Aransas Pass and by Fancher Archer, manager of the Rockport Chamber of Commerce. Following the talks by Mayor Gregg and Mr. Archer the boat will be christened by Mrs. Filbert, and will be launched immediately as the band plays an appropriate selection. 

In fact, the RAF reported the dropping of as many bombs by weight in two weeks of the Russian warfare as they had in a whole month previously.

Heavy American bombers were 200, and the plane guesses from "Little Flower" LaGuardia got unconstantly arriving on the scene in 2,000 on a side to 4,000. England, and these, presumably, permitted the British to regard planes as slightly more "expendable" than they had viewed them pre-

wiously. There did not seem to be any question of "ferrying" airplanes to Russia. Rather, the only serious question of a changed policy on the part of England was the suggestion in some quarters that it might be a good thing for Britain to cross the channel with soldiers and tanks now that Hitler's "back was turned."

That Britain was watching the Russo-German war with her fingers crossed was evident in the military answer to this suggestion. The first objection was that the channel ports had been so blasted that they would not be suitable for landings of large numbers of troops, and that, if the Germans should win a sudden and swift victory over the Russians, then limited forces of British on the continent might find themselves in a very precarious positions.

Therefore the question of British aid to Russia seemed to be largely one of sending an advisory military mission, which was done at once, and the extension of more liberal trading credits.

In the United States, aside from the fact that the question of any aid at all became a matter of vitriolic debate, the actual aid to the Reds boiled itself down to the same thing. President Roosevelt said:

"Even if Russia were to send us a list of her needs, it is not possible to fill the order as one would go to a store. Our munitions factories, including the airplane plants, are completely busy filling our own needs and those of Britain."

The question of time was important, for the United States did not want to send planes and other equipment to Vladivostok, thence to start the long trek across Siberia, and Danzig. # Fanaticus Americanus



General Mauborgne, chief signal officer of the army, is the Thomas Alva Edison of aviation radio-in the army at any rate. It was in October, 1912, that the then Lieutenant Mauborgne installed the first radio set in an airplane, at Fort Riley, Kan. The army had 12 planes then, and aviation meant signal corps, with planes first conceived as primarily useful for observation and signalling.

Lieut. "Hap" Arnold, who later was to become head of the army air corps, flew one of the planes to Fort Riley for the installation. There was much excitement, all over the country, when Lieutenant Mauborgne's cumbersome quenched spark radio set managed to waft a few signals earthward. There was still more excitement when, in 1914, the lieutenant achieved the first two-way communication between an airplane and a ground station.

He had started something there and came along with it, to today's miracles of aerial chatter. He attained his present rank September 1937, having been for the previous year director of the radio laboratory at Wright Field. For 29 years his work has been an unceasing concentration on development and experiment in aviation radio. His career is one of many recent reminders of our possibly unsuspected high degree of preparedness in varied and highly specialized trained personnel.

# Texas Need For Shipbuilders Acute

DALLAS, July 2-Texas need for shipbuilders rapidly is becoming acute, James R. D. Eddy, state director of national defense training, disclosed today.

The long sheltered coastline of the nation's largest coastline of the nation's largest state is destined to play an increasing role in the Battle of the Atlantic, Eddy said, producing "ships and more ships" to maintain British supply lines and augment the American merchant marine.

Some 103 vessels costing \$181,-142,42 are under construction or on order at Beaumont, Orange and Houston, it was noted, and the demand for shipyards workers is "particularly strong."

Transforming of Workers Eddy's job is to transform Texans into skilled workers for the shipyards and other defense industries. Enrolling for defense training courses at high schools, colleges and National Youth Administration centers is "practically thes ame thing as writing your name on a payroll," he asserted.

Now receiving instruction are12,-644 Texans. Eighty-five per cent of wood boat-building, elecricity, blue print reading, drafting, armature, blacksmith, related mathematics cocking and baking.

Shinbuilding instruction naturally would be found near the Gulf Coast. Eddy said, since the type of training for each locality is determined by a local advisory committee. The object is to plan courses "most likely to lead to immadiate employment" in that vi-

Schools co-operating in the pro-gram include Texas University, Southern Methodist University, Texas Technological College, Texas A&M College and the College of Mines. In addition, defense schooling is offered in Army camps in San Antonio, El Paso, Galveston and San Angelo.







# Defeated in House

Legislation Said To Be Unnecessary At Present Time

WASHINGTON, July 2—The House last night defeated, 154 to 146, legislation which would have authorized the Justice Department to tap telephone and telegraph wires to obtain evidence in espionage, sabotage, extortion and kidnaping cases.

The vote, cutting sharply across party lines, follower bi-partisan charges that the legislation is not necessary at this time and constiutes the first step on "the road oward Fascism."

The bill was sponsored by Rep. Sam Hobbs (D-Ala.). It would have permitted the Federal Bureau of Investigation, upon certifcation by the attorney general, o "intercept, listen in or record telephone, telegraph or radio comnunications.'

The attorney general would have been authorized to grant such permission only when he had reason to believe that any of the four felonies is, or is about to be, committed. Evidence so obtained yould be legally admissable in

"Such legislation is not neresary at this time," declared Rep. Francis E. Walter (D-Pa) who ed the floor fight against the neasure. "It is, moreover, an invasion of private rights and a step long the road toward autocracy and Fascism.'

### All-Time Record for Marriages Chalked Up During Past Year





# Wire-Tappin, To Fight Espionas Defeated in House

Legislation Said To Be Unnecessary At Present Time

WASHINGTON, July 2-The House last night defeated, 154 to 146, legislation which would have authorized the Justice Department to tap telephone and telegraph wires to obtain evidence in espionage, sabotage, extortion and kidnaping cases.

The vote, cutting sharply across party lines, follower bi-partisan charges that the legislation is not necessary at this time and constitutes the first step on "the road oward Fascism."

The bill was sponsored by Rep. Sam Hobbs (D-Ala.). It would have permitted the Federal Bureau of Investigation, upon certification by the attorney general, to "intercept, listen in or record telephone, telegraph or radio communications."

The attorney general would have been authorized to grant such permission only when he had reason to believe that any of the four felonies is, or is about to be, committed. Evidence so obtained yould be legally admissable in

"Such legislation is not necesary at this time," declared Rep. Francis E. Walter (D-Pa) who ed the floor fight against the measure. "It is, moreover, an inasion of private rights and a step long the road toward autocracy and Eascism."

### All-Time Record for Marriages Chalked Up During Past Year

"So whatever happens," he wrote in Il Giornale d'Italia, "it will stand again as made definitely clear that entrance into the war of the United States government belongs exclusively to, and arises from deliberate initiative, and it cannot be justified by any later excuse of pretended aggression by the Axis powers nor any pretext of this or that incident."

Gayda then repeated the Axis thesis that American help to Britain will be too little and too late and declared that, with the defeat of Russia, both Germany and Japan would be free to tackle Ameri-

I asked Mr. John Collier, of the office of Indian affairs, to come in to tell me something about the Navajo situation.

It appears that the land on the reservation, in 81 years, has completely changed because of overgrazing. What was once meadow land with plenty of water and beautiful grass, is now practically desert. The wooded slopes have disappeared, floods wash away the top soil and the grass no longer exists. It is quite evident that, in order to bring it back, there must be a drastic curtailment of cattle wild horses, goats and sheep.

This means that a people, whose average cash income is only about \$120 a year, must either go on relief, which they want at all costs to avoid, or starve to death. The only other solution seems to be the possibility of carrying through an irrigation project which will allow them to irrigate enough land so they can raise crops to feed their cattle at certain times, and also to grow some cash crop if the difficulty of transportation can be overcome.

The decision on the irrigation is, of course, up to congress. At the present time, I can quite understand the argument against putting money into anything which can be set aside to be done when the defense period is over. Still, if congress decides that this is necessary, it seems to me that they have a joint responsibility with the office of Indian affairs to devise some means by which these naturally independent American citizens can earn their living and not feel dependent upon the government for a chance merely to survive.

# FIRST-AID\* **AILING HOUSE**

(@ Roger B. Whitman-WNU Service.) Torn Painting

QUESTION: An oil painting has a tear about an inch and a half long. What do you advise on repairing it? Can I do it myself, and thus avoid the expense of professional restoration?

Answer: The method is to cement a piece of canvas on the back. But before doing this, the fuzzy edges of the tear must be clipped off or pushed through to the back with a needle or other instrument. With the fuzz disposed of, the edges are brought together as neatly as possible, and secured by the patch on the back. The painting is then touched up with the necessary colors. On a painting of any value, however, the job should be done by a professional; for without experience, the result is likely to be a botch.

### Repainting a House

Question: Eight years ago I had my house painted. Wooden shingles all around. The mixture was composed of white lead, linseed oil, turpentine and color in oil, also dryers. expect to have it painted again. The painter wants to use oil, turpentine, color, dryers and very little white lead. What would you sug-

Answer: Paint for exterior use should contain a large portion of a metallic pigment, to give it body. Paint containing a large proportion of color will have no substance, and the paint film will be weak. Exterior paint should have a large percentage of white lead.

It should be remembered that exterior painting should not be attempted in cold weather. The temperature should be at least 50 degrees, and after a stretch of at least four dry days.




