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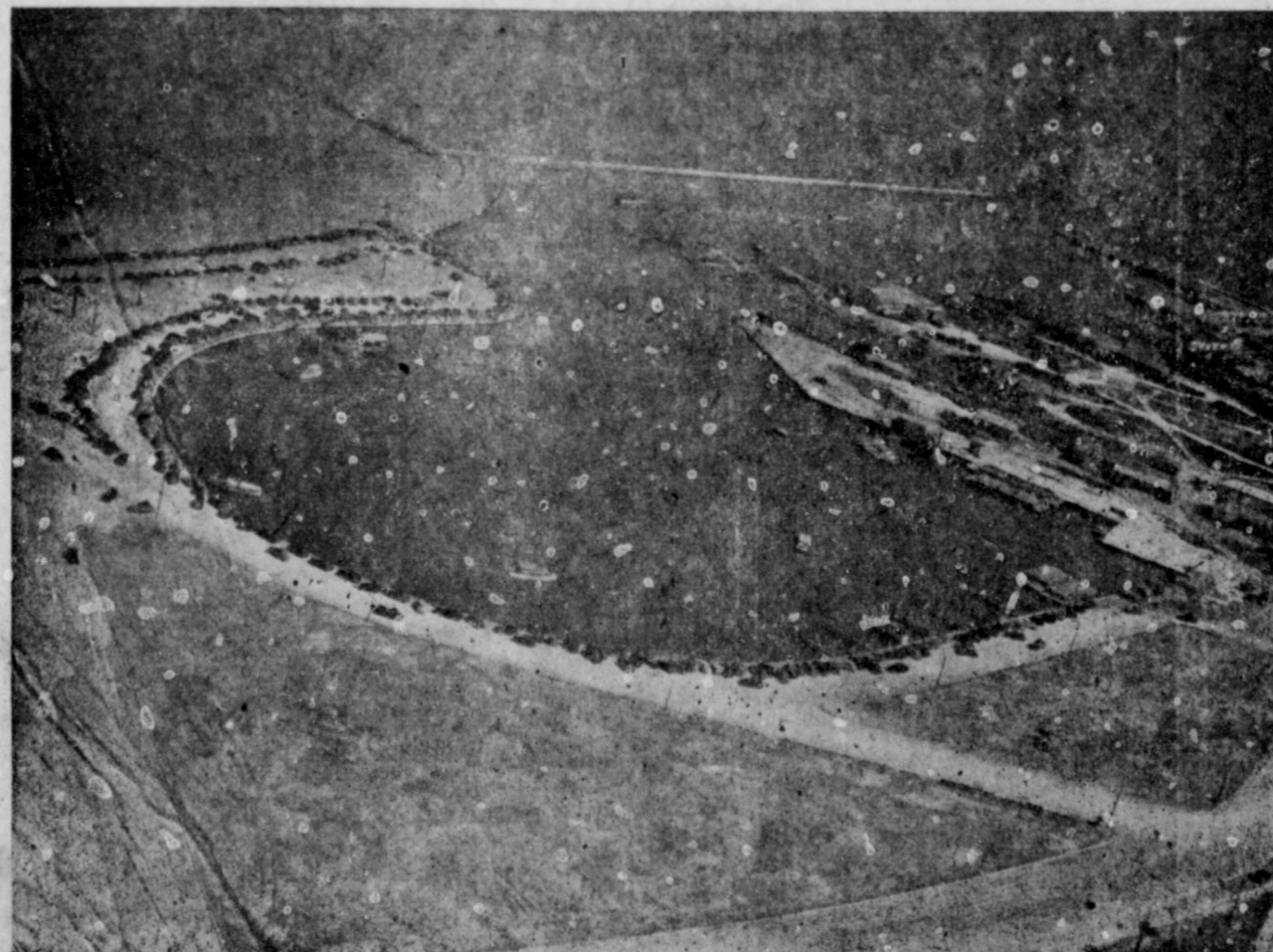
FISHING—There is no better place to go fishing than in the waters off shore from Live Oak and Lamar Peninsulas, where Trout and Redfish are found in abundance—and where giant silvery Tarpon are ready to take the bait and give the sportsman a furious hour's battle. Aransas Bay was described in last year's official State Game, Fish & Oyster Commission report as a deep bay of uniform depth, containing unusually clear water. It is protected from inland floods to an unusual degree and as the result its salt content—so important to marine life—is unusually constant. . . . HERE is found the famous Rockport oyster, known from coast to coast.

BATHING—is unexcelled. You may either take the kiddies for a swim in the safe shallow bay right in front of your cottage, or swim at the new sand-bottomed beach outside the small craft harbor. There are no undertows and surf bathing is at its best.

NATURE STUDY—recognized naturalists know of no other place in Texas where such a variety of flora and fauna are combined for first hand study. Each year a larger number of nature students and bird lovers visit Live Oak and Lamar peninsulas.

SIGHTSEEING—visitors are always welcome at the State Game, Fish & Oyster Commission's only marine laboratory, stationed at Rockport and carrying on extensive marine experiments and study in Aransas and Copano bays and the nearby Gulf of Mexico. Beautiful state parks on Lamar peninsula, include the now famous Big Oak and the CCC improved Goose Island. The well preserved Fulton mansion is open to visitors and it takes the sightseer back to a day when Rockport and Fulton were the principal South Texas ports of call for deep sea sailing vessels. Add to all this miles of scenic drives that never fail to please the motorist's eye.

BOAT FACILITIES—have been given every attention at ROCKPORT. A new small craft harbor and channel have been completed by the Rockport Navigation District. Too, many prominent Texas sportsmen have built their own boat houses here and Rockport is becoming the home port for many palatial pleasure crafts. Boats, in which to fish or hunt, are available for rent at points all along the bay front and Fulton and Lamar. Guides are furnished for parties wishing to make one day or overnight trips to the Gulf.

Washington, D. C.

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One reason for the new appropriation is that many of the original price estimates have been found to be far too low, particularly in the case of planes, ships and guns.

Chiefly to blame are army supply brasshats, who are inadequate to handle the colossal task thrust on them, but so jealous of their bureaucratic powers that they won't let anyone else tackle it.

Will Davis

The country doesn't like strikes any more than it likes war, but the war has brought out many men of stature, and the strikes have brought out William H. Davis, new chairman of the National Defense Mediation board.

Actually Davis is no "war baby," but a veteran who has been working at labor mediation for many years. Still it was settlement of the Allis-Chalmers strike that first won him national attention.

By profession Davis is a patent lawyer, with offices in New York city. On the very next day after the Allis-Chalmers triumph, he appeared before the U. S. Supreme court, his hair no more unruly than usual, to argue a patent case.

When a committee of congress asked him what he thought of a bill to outlaw strikes, he said, "When you pass compulsory legislation, you make the working man a slave, and there is no use producing defense materials for a nation of slaves."

There are a lot of odd pieces in Davis' life. He was born in Bangor, Maine, schooled in Washington, D. C., is a member of New York's swanky Downtown Athletic club, a labor sympathizer, founder of the Grand Central Art galleries, father-in-law of Argentine diplomat Alonzo Irigoyen, and careless with his clothes.

One phrase-maker says Davis has "the face of a kindly bulldog." Another "the face of a tired trombone player." Not many faces would answer to that. Davis is easy to spot in a crowd.

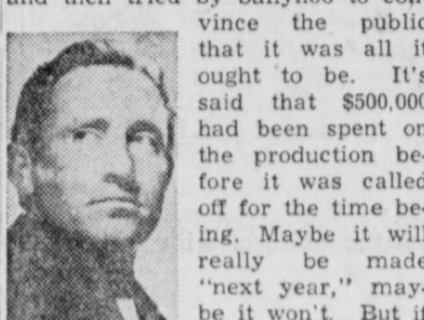

INDIAN AFFAIRS

I asked Mr. John Collier, of the office of Indian affairs, to come in to tell me something about the Navajo situation.

It appears that the land on the reservation, in 81 years, has completely changed because of overgrazing.

This means that a people, whose average cash income is only about \$120 a year, must either go on relief, which they want at all costs to avoid, or starve to death.

The decision on the irrigation is, of course, up to congress. At the present time, I can quite understand the argument against putting money into anything which can be set aside to be done when the defense period is over.

We had a small dinner and movie in the evening. The President had given me strict instructions that I was not to put over anything educational on them, that it was to be an evening of entertainment!

Elliott told me something about this camp on which these regular army boys are working 18 hours a day to transform it into an airfield.

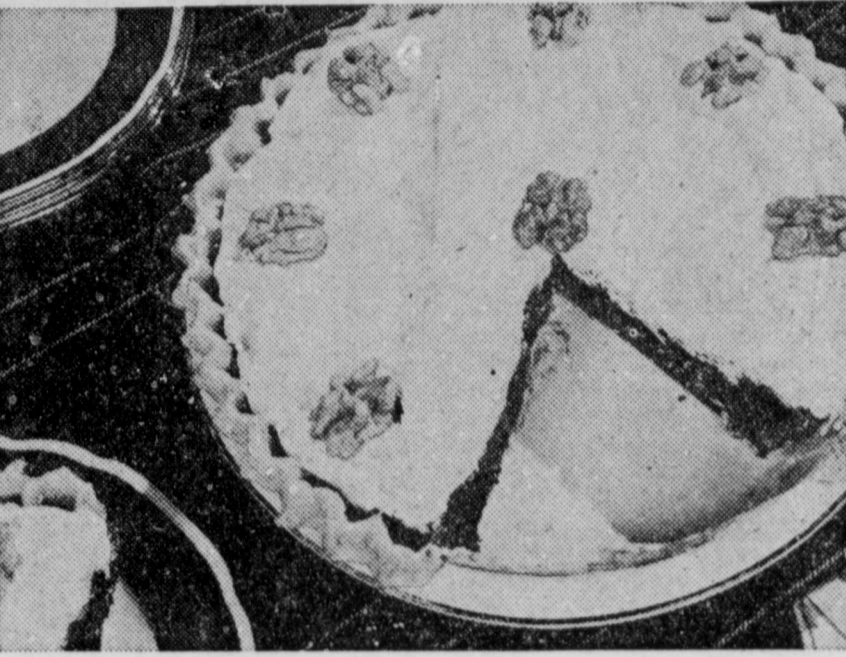
TO NEW ENGLAND We spent one night in cabins just beyond Portsmouth, N. H., by-pass.

EASY AS PIE

No sooner are you back from your honeymoon than the business of planning menus, marketing and cooking for two begins!

In your capacity as chief cook, you're sure to find the task of preparing three meals a day a real challenge.

Because I'm convinced that the ability to make really good pie is a highly desirable quality for any young woman to possess.

If he likes desserts at all (most men adore them), try your luck with lemon-chiffon, chocolate, rhubarb or even Spanish cream pie.

I've captioned the column Easy As Pie... which perhaps gives an erroneous impression.

In making pastry remember these points: (1) unless you are making hot water pastry, have the ingredients for making pie crust cold;

fancy edge. Cut chocolate in pieces and melt over hot water. Beat eggs well, and add sugar, bread crumbs and melted chocolate. Mix well.

Just because it's summer, don't stop pie baking... merely change the kind of pie you serve.

To make the filling and pastry really boon companions, substitute orange juice for the water in the pastry.

Spanish Cream Pie. 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin 1/2 cup cold milk 1 1/2 cups scalded milk 2 egg yolks 1/2 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla 2 egg whites 1 baked pastry shell

Sometimes it is fun to change the flavor of pastry by adding an extra ingredient or two to the recipe.

Spiced pastry is excellent for fruit pies, particularly peach, apple and apricot.

Crumb Pastry. 2 cups crumbs, rolled fine or ground 1/2 cup melted butter Blend butter and crumbs.

Apple Pie. 4 1/2 cups apples 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg or cinnamon 1 teaspoon butter 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup sugar

Line plate with pastry. Pare, core and slice apples. Mix sugar, salt and spice; put part of sugar in bottom of plate filled with apples.

Moisten edges of lower crust; put on upper crust and press edges firmly together.

Moisten edges of lower crust; put on upper crust and press edges firmly together. Place pie on bottom shelf or rack in oven and bake in hot oven, 450 degrees F., for 10 minutes.

FIRST-AID to the AILING HOUSE By ROGER B. WHITMAN

Torn Painting QUESTION: An oil painting has a tear about an inch and a half long. What do you advise on repairing it? Can I do it myself, and thus avoid the expense of professional restoration?

Answer: The method is to cement a piece of canvas on the back. But before doing this, the fuzzy edges of the tear must be clipped off or pushed through to the back with a needle or other instrument.

Repainting a House QUESTION: Eight years ago I had my house painted. Wooden shingles all around. The mixture was composed of white lead, linseed oil, turpentine and color in oil, also dryers.

Answer: Paint for exterior use should contain a large portion of a metallic pigment, to give it body.

Question: The floor of a dining-room is about four feet below the ground level; the floor is tile laid over concrete.

Answer: A wood floor stuck down over a damp-proofed floor should prevent condensation.

Question: In our four-year-old bungalow we installed a washstand in the upstairs closet.

A reader sends in the following suggestion: "The original finish of Venetian blinds can be preserved by an application of paste wax rubbed on and then polished.

Question: An oil burning heating unit has a tankless instantaneous water heating coil. Do you think this is preferable to a heater using a tank?

Question: Can you tell me where a stove of the following description may be bought? It looks like a phonograph cabinet, burns coal, and is supposed to heat several rooms.

Question: I want to lay a brick walk in my garden, with bricks on their sides. I do not want the expense of a concrete foundation.

Question: Several years ago I laid a brick walk on the soil, spacing the bricks a half-inch or more apart, filling the spaces with soil, and planting grass in it.

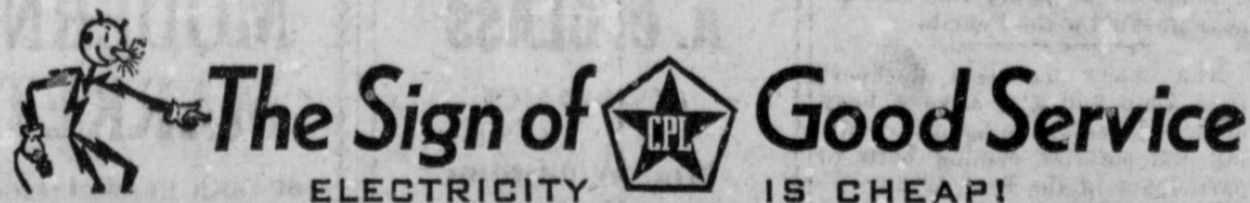
