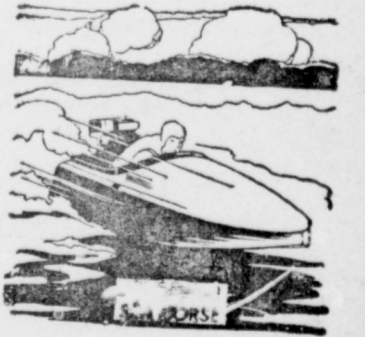

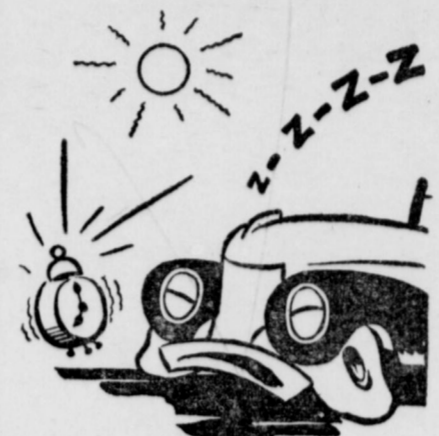
Born to Mr. and Mrs. Roy Courts, Jr., July 12th, a 7 3/4-pound girl.

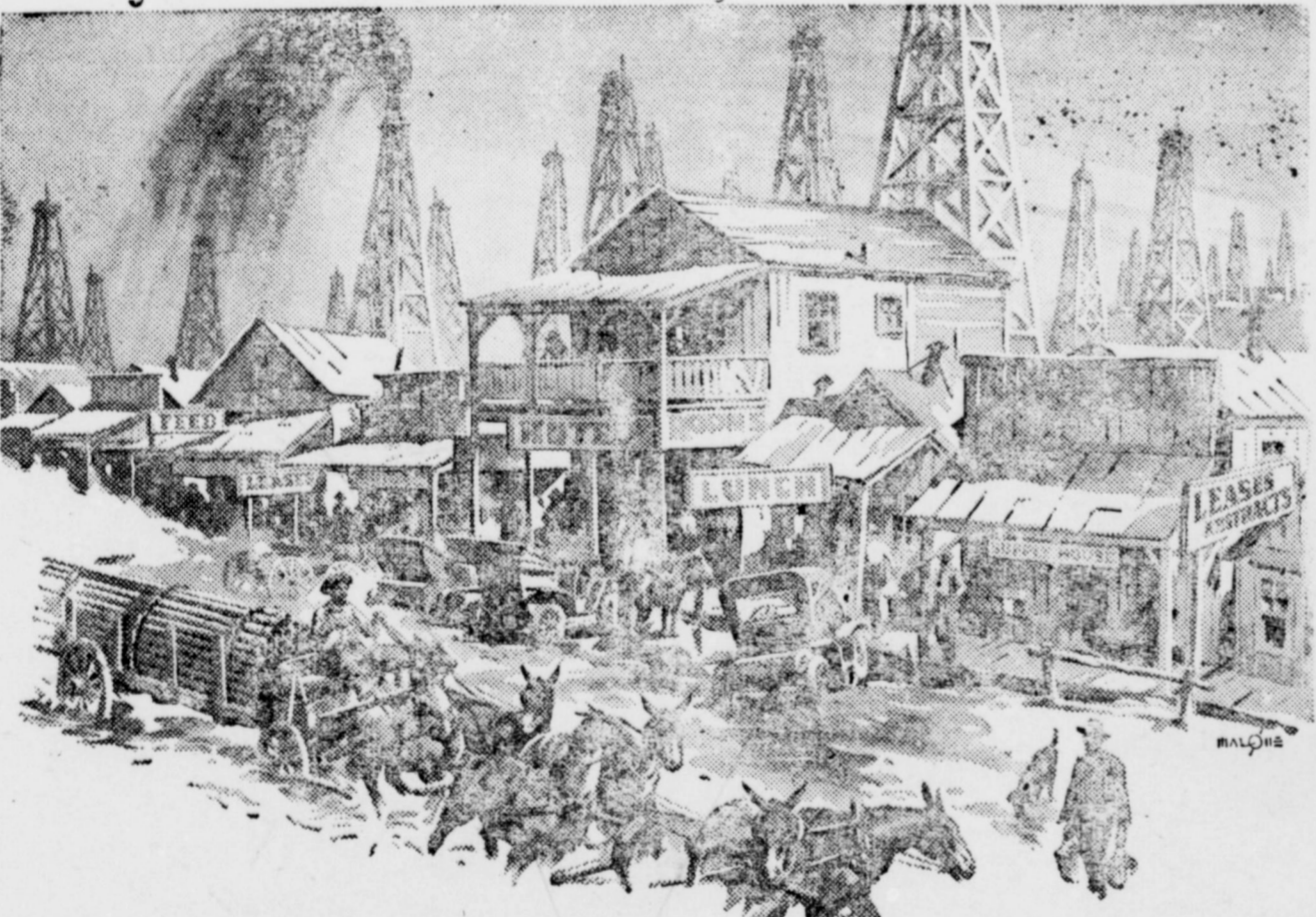
