These questionnaires are the basis of the classification of all registrants.

Washington. All men with dependents were elassified under class three as i was the desire of the government not to disturb the home life.

On June 24, a bill was passed raising the basic pay from \$21.00 to \$50.00 per month and also setting up a fund for the subsistence of dependants.

This was done because of the fact that the Army realized that it would be necessary to call many men with dependants.

Instructions were issued to reclassify all registrants. First, single men, no dependants. Second, single men with dependants. Third, married men with wife only. Fourth, married man with wife and one child. Fifth, married men with wife and more than one child. The quota or number of men called is determined by the State Board.

Our instructions are that these quotas must be filled in the above order when possible, but they must

Japan was paying a high price for the occupation of three western Aleutian islands. That was evident when a navy communique disclosed that 21 Jap ships had been sunk or damaged, an undetermined number of airplanes lost and important shore installations had been blasted since the invasion was first undertaken

Latest exploit was a surprise attack by an American task force on Kiska harbor. Caught unawares, the Japs replied to the first American shells with anti-aircraft fire. In the raid, the navy said, shore batteries were silenced by cruisers and destroyers, fires started in the enemy camp area, a cargo ship apparently sunk and "the only resistance encountered was from aircraft."

Kiska is the Japs' main base in the Aleutians, although the Nipponese have also occupied Attu and Aggattu, at the tip of the island chain.





Active in Europe

The long-awaited entry of American fighting planes on a large scale into the European air war took place when U. S. fighting craft engaged in 31 operational sorties.

This baptism was regarded as a forerunner of the time when the sky above Germany would be filled with destruction-laden American planes. In the initial operations, United States fighter squadrons flying in conjunction with Royal Air Force units made three flights over the French coast. Twenty other aerial missions were over the sea and eight were in-

terception sorties off the coast of England, according to a communique of the United States European headquarters.

Meanwhile the RAF's assaults on German industrial centers continued with another blistering attack on Mainz in which high explosives and incendiaries were again rained down. The effectiveness of the British air blitz was attested by Dr. Joseph Goebbels, German minister of propaganda, who admitted that Germany is suffering "painful wounds" from the RAF's summer offensive, in an article for "Das Reich."

FARM INCOME: Ahead of HCL

Increases in farm income have thus far been able to outrun rises in the cost of living, it was disclosed in a department of agriculture survey which showed that while net income of farm families averaged 46 per cent higher in 1941 and in the first three months of 1942 than in the comparable period in 1935-36, living costs had increased approximately one-third. Thus income outstripped the rise in living

This was made evident when statistics released in Washington showed that the country has 60,000 doctors, whereas needs for military and civilian functions will require 140,000 physicians. As a result of this situation, selective service headquarters said local boards had already begun to reclassify physicians who can be spared from civilian service. -

For every 1,000,000 men in the army, approximately 6,000 doctors are required. The navy's needs are 6.500 physicians to every 1,000,000 men. President Roosevelt's recent statement that 4,000,000 men are already under arms indicates that 24,000 doctors are ticketed for military service. The army recently declared it will need 20,000 more by the end of the year.





Roger B. Whitman-WNU Features. DAMPNESS IN HOUSES OFTEN DUE TO METHOD OF PLASTERING

COMPLAINTS of cold and damp houses are likely to be due to the application of inside plaster directly to outside masonry walls; brick, tile, concrete blocks and stone. Properly, plaster should be on lath to provide an insulating air space. Without it the plaster becomes almost

the house air in contact with it becomes chilled. Further, moisture in the house air condenses against it, often to such an extent that the wallpaper comes off. This defect in construction can be noticed by placing the hand on the inner surface of an outside wall to

compare its temperature with that of a wall between two rooms. The appearance of wet spots on a plaster wall covering an inside chimney is from a similar condition; the chimney brickwork is cold, and in chilling the plaster that is applied directly to it, will result in condensation from damp house air. Such situations can be remedied only by protecting the inside plaster against the low temperature of the masonry. One method would be to replace the inside plaster with plaster on lath on furring strips; another, to sheathe the inner surface of the outside walls with insulating board. With this protection a house would be much more comfortable in cold weather because the house air would

not be affected by the low temperature of the walls. Wall Smoked Black Question: We have a new house

heated with a forced air furnace. In about four weeks after starting the fire, the living-room wall around the register was smoked black. The furnace engineer, without examining the furnace, said the soiling was not from smoke, but from dust, rug lint, etc. We doubt this, as everything is new and clean. What do you think?

Answer: Soiling around regis ters is usually from open joints around the firebox; probably through breaks in the cemented joints. These should be recemented at a time when the fire is out. In the meantime, lift out the register and cover the end of the pipe with fabric mosquito netting, preferably dark in color, which will be held in place when the register is returned to position.

Question: The floors in my very old house are sagging because of the weight of the massive chimney in the center. As the walls have just been plastered, I do not wish to have the floors raised. I am thinking of taking up the hardwood flooring and putting a filler underneath. What could I use for this?

Answer: The sagging of the floors may indicate serious trouble; the settling of foundations, the rotting or destruction of floor beams and other woodwork, or some similar trouble. It would be a waste of time and money to do any kind of repair work without knowing the exact condition of the house. I strongly recommend that you have a thorough examination made by a competent builder.

Cellar Floor Paint Question: Part of the cellar of my house is used as a kitchen and general utility room. The cement floor has been painted a number of times with cement paint, but with unsatisfactory results; it peels off and the cement shows through. How can I finish that floor to stand reasonable wear?

Answer: You must use special paint for the job; a kind of paint that is proof against the lime in the cement. One variety that gives excellent results is based on rubber. Any large paint dealer should be able to supply it. Cement paint is not intended for a floor, although it is also proof against lime. It is excellent for walls that do not receive wear.

Fire-Stained Walls

Question: We recently had a fire in our home, and the walls are covered with black smoke stains. What should be done before we re-paper? Answer: Take off the old paper, or if the walls are not papered, wash with a solution of washing soda in water, a pound to the gallon. Rinse with clear water and allow to dry thoroughly.

Bathroom Ventilation Question: Must a bathroom be ventilated by running a pipe through the roof?

Answer: Ventilation and other details of a plumbing installation are covered in the plumbing code of the neighborhood. If this code is not followed, you may get into trouble with the authorities.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LE-GISLATURE OF THE STATE OF proposing an Amendment to Ar-TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a to read as follows.

"Section 49a. Orange juice, chilled before the fruit is squeezed, is an excellent pep-you-up. Let the sugar stand on grapefruit a while (while the coffee percolates) and the sugar will melt and go further. Try eating fruit or juice first, but saving half to finish off your breakfast-it will leave a fresh taste

in your mouth. Fruit stewed should have sugar added after it is stewed, with a pinch of salt. You won't need as much sweetening, this way. Cook dried fruits with a slice of lemon or orange. These citrus fruits have an affinity with dried apricots, peaches, prunes and apples.


