## Ranchers Open Way for Wolf Hunters

Ranchers of Aransas County have opened the way for more wolf hunting in this vicinity by agreeing not to allow traps to be set on their land. In some sections traps have been a hazard to hunters' dogs and several valuable hounds have been left maimed after stepping into steel

According to Elbert Mundine, local hunting enthusiast, members of the Live Oak Wolf Hunters Association expects to run their dogs in this section during the next few months. It was at the request of the association and local hunters that the ranchers in this vicinity agreed not to set traps, or allow others to set traps on their land.

The Live Oak Wolf Hunters Association is made up of members from several counties in this section of the state, including Live Oak, San Patricio, Bee and Refugio. Members will likely hunt with their dogs in this section two or three times a

Elbert Mundine stated that during the past few years local hunters have been catching from 17 to 25 wolves a year.

"We don't use guns and the dogs don't bother livestock," Mundine said. He expressed appreciation for the cooperation being given by the ranchers.

Other wolf hunters include Sam Mundine, Joe Harper and Darb Stewart.
