ARMY VETERINARY CORPS HELPS ICELAND LIVESTOCK
CHICAGO.—The U. S. Veterinary Corps launched a disease control program for Iceland's livestock and helped increase production, when U. S. troops arrived there, according to the Journal of the American Veterinary Association.

Cattle and sheep were examined for tuberculosis and brucellosis, the Journal said.

A vaccine was developed to prevent abortion, which was as high as 40 per cent on some sheep farms.

This was shown in a survey undertaken by General Foods Corp., according to Clarence Francis, president of the concern, who spoke at the recent convention here of the National Restaurant Association.

Juvenile Crime Up 11 Per Cent in Chicago

CHICAGO.—Chicago's juvenile delinquency rate is lower than that of any other large American city, but it's rising because of the war.

Mayor Edward J. Kelly reported that the delinquency rate rose 11 per cent in the first quarter of 1943 compared with the corresponding period last year.

New York's juvenile delinquency he said, rose 55 per cent from the first quarter of 1942.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25 — Victory gardeners produced 42 percent of all vegetables grown in 1943, and more than half the fresh vegetables available to civilians, James H. Burdett, director of the national garden bureau said today.

Pontiac Worker's Idea Earns \$1,000
PONTIAC, Mich.—An idea that enables one man to take the place of six at the Pontiac Motor Division's Bofors gun plant brought Harry LeMieux a \$1,000 War Bond.
LeMieux, who lives at 307 N. Perry St., Pontiac, operates a lathe turning gun barrels. He found that while the operations were in progress the operators were idle 80 minutes. His suggestion that one man be allowed to run two lathes, freeing six men for other vital war work, doubled production per man on the job.
LeMieux has been employed by Pontiac Motors for six years, but it isn't the first time he was awarded special honors. He formerly was a professional ski-jumper and was a member of the 1928 Olympic team. The \$1,000 suggestion, was the second of his suggestions, was the second to be paid by Pontiac.
