In one neighborhood, swing shifters moved out of the abodes they rented almost as fast as they moved in. It was because of the noise, they complained.

Fred M. Echoff, president of the city noise abatement commission, erlisted 600 elementary school children as junior commandos. The children policed the streets for noise-makers and pledged themselves to quiet play.
