**First Aid Repair**  
SAVES WEAR AND TEAR

**PLUGS**  
The most common cause of blown-out fuses is a defective appliance or lamp plug. Wires leading into the plug become worn so that bare wires may touch, causing a fuse to blow.  
Avoid this happening by regularly inspecting plugs. When you find a bad connection, repair by the following steps:

1. Disconnect from wall socket and loosen the two screws holding wires in the plug. Pull out the wire.
2. Cut off frayed part of wire. Strip off a half inch of insulation on each wire.
3. Tie wires in loose knot on insulated portion. This helps prevent wires from pulling loose.
4. Re-connect wires, curling each around a prong and screw post. Tighten screws.

**CORDS**  
A frayed lamp or electrical appliance cord is dangerous and is often the cause of a blown-out fuse. By regular inspection of your electrical cords and by making simple little repairs, when needed, you will avoid having lamps and electrical appliances out of service. To repair a cord:

1. Disconnect cord from wall socket, then clean away the frayed or crumbled part of the insulation.
2. Scrape clean the exposed part of the wire.
3. Tape up each wire separately. Tape carefully so exposed wires do not touch.
4. Tape the two wires together. Use electrician's tape throughout the repair job, not adhesive.

**CAUTION:** It's all right to repair frayed insulation on a cord but if the wires are broken, do not try to repair the cord. Spliced cords are dangerous and their use violates electrical codes. When in doubt about home repairs, see an electrician.
