# **Price Fixing Could Prove** Very Harmful


Bureau opposes the authority to regulate dairymen and fix mills prices for three reasons

(1) Price fixing cannot suc-cessfully substitute for competive prices in determining consumer demand for any product An artificial price set by gov ernment edict runs the risk of jeopardizing consumer supplies as well as making the producer dependent upon government for er of fixing milk prices could his income. A price considered "fair" to the consumer might not assure an adequate return to the producer.

(2) A commission empowered to fix prices would necessarily be required to regulate the day-to-day business operations of dairymen.

Initial construction of plant was started in 1952 by the Austin Building Company, general contractors, and the first unit was placed in commercial operation in July, 1953. The No. unit has a name-plate generating capacity of 30,000 KW.

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

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

CHOICE 68 may not elect a candidate officially, but unofficially, it will carry a lot of weight and should not be approached lightly by participating students.






