

Real Estate Trading Passes \$40,000 In Two Months

POLITICS GROW LIVELY AS VOTING TIME DRAWS NEAR

Other Large Trades Reported Pending Here

1944 Realty Transfers Near Dollar Volume Of \$200,000

Real estate trading here during the past two months totaled more than \$40,000, according to records in the office of County Clerk J. M. Sparks. Recordings there since January 1 show a total value of near \$200,000.

Citizens Urged to Conserve Water

Aransas County Exceeds Bond Quota; Bond Sales Total \$167,098.00

Aransas County was one of the first to reach its Fifth War Loan Drive quota in South Texas and among the first five who have exceeded their goal by nearly 25 per cent, Fred Bracht, county chairman, revealed yesterday.

With a quota of \$135,000, the county's total over-all sales were \$167,098.50 and the Series "E" sales alone were \$48,987.50—\$3,987.50 above the \$45,000 quota, the chairman said.

All sales of Series "E" bonds throughout the month of July will be credited to the county's total, however, and the final count will probably be several hundred dollars higher, he added.

Messages of congratulations have been received by Bracht from Nathan Adams, state chairman of the War Finance Committee and From F. Bert Smith, regional chairman.

In his wire Adams declared he was "delighted that Aransas County is over the top. Please keep up the good work."

In a previous message he notified Bracht that this county was one of the first in the state to reach its Fifth War Loan Drive goal.

OPA Starts Drive To Enforce All Ceiling Prices

A warning that the Office of Price Administration was launching an enforcement drive to keep down prices charged by firms offering commercial services was issued yesterday by J. F. Creless, San Antonio OPA district officer.

Creless said more than 65 types of businesses, including plumbers, yardmen, laundries, funeral homes, radio and electrical repair shops, are affected by the regulations which require managers to file their base period prices as of March, 1942.

"Up until this time, we have been offering only an educational campaign, trying to teach business men how the OPA regulations affect their merchandise and services."

"They've had time to learn, however, and now we're going to start enforcing these regulations."

Creless was here conferring with Herman Hildenbrand, chairman of Aransas County War Price and Rationing Board, on the new used car ceiling prices that went into effect July 10.

Since there are no used car dealers in the county, only prices on sales made between individuals will be in effect here. The regulations call for individuals to sell their cars "as is"—that is without a guarantee—and to clear the sale through the ration board, Creless explained.

Violators are subject to a \$10,000 fine or a three-year penitentiary sentence, he added.

Repairs on City Reservoir Causes Water Shortage

System Will Be Back To Normal Within a Week

Citizens here are urged to use water as sparingly as possible during the next week, so that it will not become necessary to stop service entirely at intervals.

Reason for the water shortage is that the large reservoir, which keeps a reserve of water for the system, is being repaired and re-covered. In the meantime water for use in the city is being pumped directly from the wells and it is impossible to accumulate a surplus.

Workmen are rushing the repairs and construction of a new concrete cover for the reservoir and it is believed the work will be completed within a week.

Water customers are urged not to waste water or do excessive watering of lawns, etc, until the crisis is passed. It is necessary to the safety of the city to keep a surplus of water in the tower for fire protection.

Sgt. Cruiser Rides Disabled Bomber Saffly Back to Port

Staff Sgt. James C. Crusier of Rockport has been awarded the Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal for "exceptionally meritorious achievement over Germany and enemy-occupied Europe," Brig. Gen. James P. Hodges, commanding general of a Liberator Bomber Division in England has announced.

Sergeant Crusier, son of Mrs. Ethel Crusier of Rockport, was a student at Rockport high school before his enlistment in the Army on Dec. 11, 1942.

As a tail gunner on the B-24 Liberator "Jerilyn Sue," recently escaped serious injury, and possibly death, when the plane returned from a daylight bombing mission over Europe with her hydraulic system shot out, one engine useless and the radio compass smashed by flak.

As the wounded ship was brought in for a landing at the home base in England, the left gear folded and the plane spun in a savage ground loop. The pilots brought the ship to a stop, however, without injury to its 10 crew members.

Lyle-for-Congress Forces Launch Campaign

CORPUS CHRISTI, July 12— Permanent headquarters have been set up by the John Lyle for Congress forces in Corpus Christi and an extensive campaign will be carried on in behalf of Lyle, now a mobile anti-aircraft captain serving with the United States Army in Italy, throughout the 19 counties comprising the 14th Congressional District, James Young, campaign chairman said.

Young also said Lyle for Congress Committees are being organized in each of the district's 19 counties. "Business and Civic Leaders of Corpus Christi are behind John Lyle in this congressional race," Young asserted. "Leaders of other counties in the district are flocking to his cause daily. July 22 will see a landslide victory for the soldier-statesman."

Friends of John Lyle have filed his name for the July 22, Democratic Primary in each county of the district. While Army regulations forbid Captain Lyle from taking an active part in a political campaign, he has written personal friends that he will be happy to serve his country in the halls of Congress. He will be returned to the states to take his seat in Congress upon his election.

"John Lyle is not a new deal or an anti new deal candidate," Young declared. "He is a candidate of the people of the 14th Congressional district."

Nephew of Mrs. Ingersoll Has Narrow Escape During Invasion

Pvt. Eugene Lockwood, 19-year old nephew of Mrs. H. Ingersoll of Rockport, had what is believed to be one of the most harrowing experiences of the invasion of France. His home is in Florence, Ky.

Lockwood, with 16 others, had to cling to pieces of their wrecked landing craft for 10 hours under heavy gunfire from German 88's. The craft sprung a leak as the coast was neared. When an attempt was made to beach it the concussion from nearby ships firing on the beaches opened the plates and the ship went down. They were rescued later and returned to a British invasion base.

Last Rites Held Here Monday For Rev. Paul Reese

Rev. Paul Reese, retired Episcopal minister, died at his home here at 1:30 Sunday morning. The end came unexpectedly, as the 66-year-old minister had been up and about town as usual the afternoon before.

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon from the Episcopal church, with burial in the Rockport Cemetery. Rev. George S. Walton, rector of St. Peter's Church, officiated at the last rites.

Surviving are his widow Mrs. Emma Scott Reese, one son, John Paul Reese, of Rockport, and a foster son, Delmar Taylor, with the Army overseas.

Rev. Reese came to Rockport in 1934 after retiring from the ministry on account of his health. At the time of his retirement he was pastor of a church in San Angelo.

He was well-known to Rockport people and almost daily made his rounds of the business section of town to chat with friends. He did this Saturday afternoon and apparently was feeling as usual when he retired for the night.

Rev. Reese was born Oct. 27, 1877, in Westminster, Maryland, a son of Rev. and Mrs. James William Reese. He graduated at the age of 18 from Western Maryland College with a B. A. degree. He traveled extensively over the world in the old clipper ships and later in life wrote sea stories from his many experiences.

He practiced architecture for many years and during World War I volunteered his services to the Navy Department as an architect. During his work with the government he designed a type of marine barracks that was adopted by the Navy and used extensively over the world.

McBride to Run Write-In Race For Justice Peace

Wide Interest In County Attorney Race; Two Commissioner Contests

Politics stepped up to a lively pace here this week as candidates began grooming up for the last lap of their political campaigns to end for most of them on July 22 when the first democratic primary will be held.

New interest was injected into local politics this week when Justice of the Peace D. C. McBride announced that he would accept the office if he is re-elected by a write-in campaign that is being started by his friends. Joe Smith is the only announced candidate for the office.

McBride failed to announce for re-election, but said that many of his friends had urged him to make the race on a write-in basis and that he had agreed to serve if re-elected.

"Early in the year when I had other plans I told a certain man that I would not run for re-election," McBride said. "This man failed to qualify for a place on the ballot at the last minute. Under the circumstances—and since my plans have been changed—I feel free to ask for the office on a write-in basis."

With both candidates working hard as the election date draws near, the race for county attorney is taking on added interest. The contestants in this only county-wide race are Mrs. Evelyn Lincoln Archer, seeking re-election to her second term, and Emory M. Spencer a former county attorney.

Two commissioner's precincts have contested races. In precinct 2, L. V. McLester, the present incumbent, is opposed for re-election by Oscar L. Smith and G. C. Mullinax. In Precinct 4, T. E. DeForest, incumbent, is opposed by Harry Baldwin.

The races for congress and state representative are creating the most interest outside of county races. There is little interest in state races.

Backers of Capt. John E. Lyle for congress against the re-election of Congressman Richard M. Kleberg are making a strong bid for voting support, and Kleberg supporters are equally active on behalf of the congressman.

Harvey Shell is opposed for re-election as state representative by E. I. Crow and H. L. Atkinson. All are making active campaigns.

Justice Richard Critz Promises Fair Decisions

AUSTIN.—The attempt of a certain faction in organized labor to pack the state courts with its own judges is a "direct challenge" to the people of Texas and their free institutions, Associate Justice Richard Critz declared today in a stinging rebuke to a "political action committee's" 1944 political bulletin.

"I welcome the support of all laboring people, but so long as I am on this highest court there will be no handing out of special favors and all cases will be decided on their merits and according to law," he stated.

Justice Critz is seeking his second full elective term on the court.
