

\$30,000 Issue **Election Set** For March 10

Election Called For Issue Not to Exceed 21/4 Per Cent

An election to decide whether the Rockport Independent School District shall issue \$30,000 in bonds to build and equip a modern gymnasium has been set for March 10. An official notice of the election is published in this issue.

The election calls for the issuance of the \$30,000 in bonds to be repaid \$3,000 annually for a period of ten years at an interest rate not exceeding 2 1-4 per cent per annum.

The money, if the bonds are voted, will be used to erect a modern school building to be used as a gymnasium. The new building, school officials point out, will meet a need that is increasing yearly. It will provide a building where the physical education program of the school can be carried out, and will also provide a place where large public gatherings may

The election was called by the Board of Trustees on Feb. 15 and is to be held March 10. The only polling place will be the main school building. Miss Violet Percival has been appointed judge of the election, and Miss Floy Kennedy and Mrs. Alvin Brundrett, clerks.

The election order states: 'None but resident qualified property taxpaving voters of said Rockport Independent School District, who own taxable property in said district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote at said election."

Clothing Price Reductions Are On Schedule

of certain types of fall and winter wearing apparel for men, women, and children is in prospect, along with other developments designed to improve the clothing situation, Clifton George, Jr., district OPA price executive, has informed S. B. Daggett, chairman of the Aransas County War Price Rationing

Effective March 1, a reduction of about eight per cent in manufacturer's ceiling prices for certain kinds of fall and winter outerwear will represent the first tangible development in the OPA-WPA program for bettering the supply of lower-priced garments, Mr. Daggett said. By late spring, when these garments will begin to reach the retail market, it is expected that a larger and better-balanced proportion of lower-priced clothing will be available in stores here in

Any price reduction made poscent cut in manufacturers' ceiling and, prices will be passed along, by that time, to the public, Mr. Daggett explained. Included in the mark-down will be such garments as wool shirts and pants, leather and corduroy jackets.

Under the new OPA-WPB clothing program it is expected that prices will drop at least six per cent-possibly as much as ten per cent by late summer and fall. That will save the public at least half a million dollars a year, George wrote Mr. Daggett. He stated that, speaking generally, this program will put prices back to where they were in 1943. To do this, the new pricing regulations will "go right down the line, from the textile mill to the retail store."
