

Lt. Clara Mae Bickford, pretty Tivoli Army nurse, returned last week after spending three years in dent; Mrs. Hugh Morrison, second Japanese prison camps. She was liberated on February 3, when American forces freed the prisoners of Santa Tomas prison.

Lieutenant Bickford had been through the hell of war on Bataan and Corregidor and had spent three years as a Japanese prisoner, with life sustained mainly by rice. She told of these experiences at a home coming celebration held in her honor at Tivoli last Tuesday.

"You can't imagine the great thrill all of us got when our first Red Cross packages arrived," Lt. Bickford said. "Those packages weighed 80 pounds, but we were so happy to get them that we lugged them away in our arms."




