Court Explains Reallocation

Set out in the Constitution of the State, Commissioners Courts are authorized to levy as follows:

For General Fund purposes not to exceed 25c on each \$100 valuation.

For Jury Fund purposes not to exceed 15c on each \$100 valuation.

For Permanent Improvement Fund purposes not to exceed 25c on each \$100 valuation.

For Road and Bridge Fund purposes not to exceed 15c on each \$100 valuation.

80c Total

In accordance with a law voted at the last November 7th, 1944, General Election it is now permissable for the commissioners court to change the above mentioned limits to best suit their needs providing that the sum total does not exceed the original Constitution limit of 80c.

To exercise this right, the court must submit the question to a vote of the people of each County at a Special Election called for that purpose. Therefore, after careful thought and study, the question is being submitted to you by your Commissioners Court for acceptance or rejection.

The new set up would be as follows:

50c General Fund not to exceed 04c Jury Fund not to exceed Permanent Improvement Fund not to exceed 10c Road and Bridge Fund not to exceed 16c Total 80c

In no way can this reallocation raise your taxes. It is simply giving flexibility to the general fund of the county which carries the greatest part of the load. It is urged that your thoroughly inform yourself of the intent and purpose of the election.

Mrs. Haynes' Nephew Writes of Atrocity

Cpl. Oscar L. Sexton of San Angelo, nephew of Mrs. Don Haynes of Rockport, was on the scene at at Providence, R. I., are making Gardelegen, a concentration camp in Germany, with Ninth Army invesitgators after 2,000 Polish, Russian and Hungarian slave laborers were burned to death by retreating teen-age SS troops.

He wrote that the bodies in the barns were still burning when they arrived and people and the children they held in their arms were burned to a crisp.

One of the 10 men who escaped the blazing death chamber told him how the prisoners in a 100 by 50 foot barn were ordered to sit down on the gasoline soaked, straw scattered floor. A 16-year old SS corporal laughingly struck a match to the straw. When prisoners made breaks, the teen-aged troops opened fire on them with tracer bulets and hand grenades. Before Americans advanced to the camp, the troopers returned, asking if any if anyone needed aid. If anyone showed signs of life by answering, he was shot.
