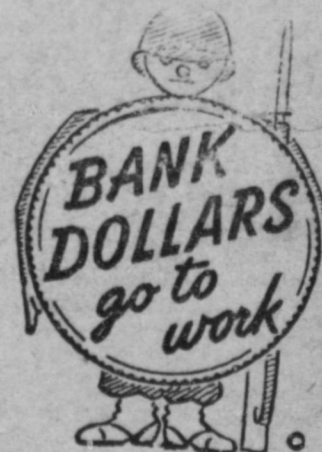

So, let's save not only the big amounts from frying and roasting, but also meat trimmings, plate scraps, and scrapings. Melt them down once a week and add the liquid fat to the salvage can. Skim soups and gravies. Scrape every pan. Every drop is important.

When your salvage can is full, take it to your butcher, and get 2 red points and up to 4¢ for each pound. If you have any difficulty, call your County Agent or Home Demonstration Agent.

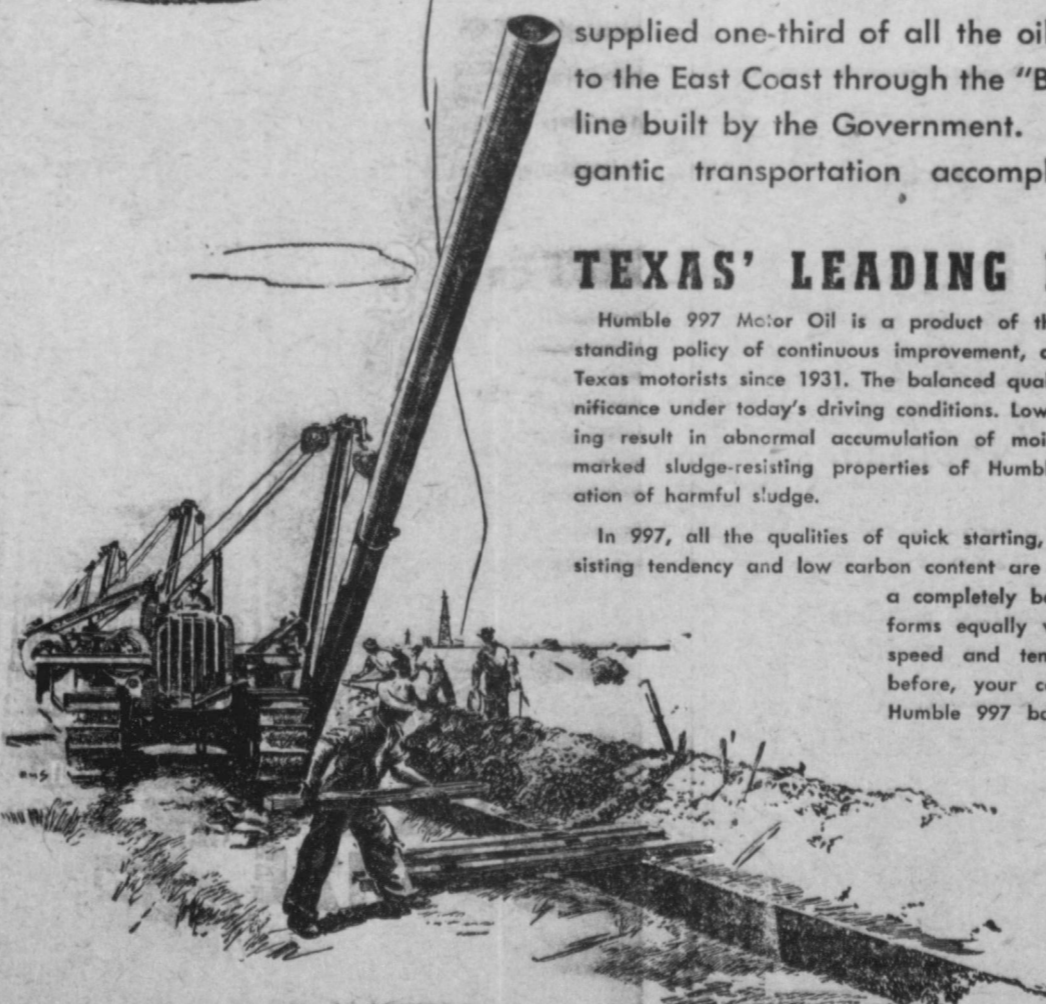

**Phagan Serves On  
Wonder Ship Of  
Squadron 10**

Leo C. Phagan, coxswain, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Phagan of Rockport, has served since its commissioning on the USS Hector, a repair ship in Squadron 10, recently described by Wick Fowler, war correspondent.

The hundreds of vessels in the noncombatant armada are available to repair or replace anything needed in the fleet.

Aboard the huge, cruiser-type Hector are found all sorts of equipment, machine, boiler, welding, shipfitter, carpenter, refrigeration, internal combustion, diesel, gyro, electronics, watch, optical, foundry, radio, torpedo ordinance and hydraulic gear tools.

It had 168 jobs in operation at one time including vessels tied up alongside for major repairs and equipment brought in from other vessels for repair or replacement.

The Fifth Fleet, when it rendezvoused with Squadron 10 for the attacks on Tokyo and Iwo Jima, took on supplies in great quantities, food enough to feed the population of a city the size of Dallas for a month; fuel oil sufficient to fill a 238-mile-long train of 10,000 one-ton tank cars; enough gasoline to operate 30,700 automobiles for a year; clothing for more than 1,500,000 people; toilet goods to stock 6,000 drug stores, 480 freight car loads of ammunition, 270,000 pounds of soap and 5,000,000 packages of cigarettes.

The Hector is a \$20,000,000 ship and with its tools and stores is worth \$80,000,000 but it saves as much as 30 days time in the refitting of a combat ship and prevents our vessels from having to limp or be towed to Pearl Harbor or the United States for repairs. In some cases, vessels are saved from sinking when put into condition to be towed.

**Sgt. Sam Solis  
Awarded Air Medal**

Staff Sgt. Sam Solis, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. Solis of Rockport, has been awarded the Air Medal for "outstanding achievement while participating in the aerial flights which resupplied isolated ground troops at Bastogne, Belgium, during the period from October to December, 1944."

His citation said that continuous delivery of critically needed supplies and air evacuation of wounded was accomplished in the face of enemy flak and small arms fire in vulnerable aircraft.
