amendments. Explaining their stand, the committee headed by Emory Spencer made the following report as a basis for further thought by the

"Senate Joint Resolution No. 7 would in brief give service men and women, while in service and for 18 months after discharge, a right to vote without having a poll tax, provided they are otherwise qualified to vote. Exception is made of

"House Joint Resolution No. 13 raise the maximum for Old Age Assistance, Blind Assistance and Needy Children Assistance to \$20 per month fro mthe present maximum of \$15 per month. When an equal amount, this would raise the present maximum from \$30 to \$40. The committee believes increased costs of living make the raise justifiable.

ROASTS AND CHOPS — save all trimmings (scraps from plates; too.) Keep them in a small bowl; once a week melt them down.

1. FRIED SALT PORK-with milk gravy. Salt pork yields so much grease, you won't need it all for gravy. Pour the rest into the salvage can.

2. DEEP FAT FRYING—use the fat over and over; but when it's too dark and smelly to use any more, don't forget Uncle Sam wants it! 3. ROASTS AND CHOPS - save all trimmings

(scraps from plates; too.) Keep them in a small bowl; once a week melt them down. SAUSAGES—they're better if you parboil them


