Lets Keep Up the Good Work in '47

Rockport progressed a great deal during 1946 in spite of the many shortages in materials and labor. There were quite a few new businesses put into operation, new buildings were constructed for businesses, and new homes were built. The turning basin or "Fish Bowl" got a large number of new piers, the beach was given a new coat of sand when the basin was dredged and temporary boardwalks were placed over the oyster shells on the beach to prevent injury to swimmers.

Both the City and County collected a large amount of delinquent taxes and the city tax rolls were very thoroughly gone over and brought up to date to facilitate the collection of taxes. A large number of streets were improved with mud-shell while others were paved, the drainage system was improved. The committee for roadside improvement made Rockport conscious of some of its eye-sores.

All of these things and many more were accomplished and other improvements were either started or at least discussed. The local Chamber of Commerce was at least made aware of a great number of the needs of Rockport in the line of civic improvement.

Let's see that they stay aware of these needs and keep working, talking, and attempting to get these things done that will improve our town for ourselves and our visitors. Let's be sure to keep the gains we have made and keep working on others. As one of our visitors has said, "I like them (Texans). They are not trying to sucker the visitor, all the time. They seem honestly to like the tourist."

He was only one of the many who visited Rockport during 1946 and had some mighty nice things to say of it and its people. Let's keep them saying these things about us. It is the best advertising we can get. But at the same time, let's keep on working to improve the facilities for our visitors—particularly recreational facilities for them in addition to fishing, boating and hunting.

Let's support the Chamber of Commerce in its attempts to improve Rockport and let's not hesitate to make suggestions to the Chamber when we think something should be done. Since the chamber is the only civic organization in Rockport, let's try to build it up by becoming members and working with the other members to further their work.

During 1947 Rockport will have a great deal of room for improvement and with the beginning that was made during 1946 there will be untold opportunities for the citizens of our town to help it progress. Let's carry our ideas and suggestions not only to the chamber but also to the City and County officials who can be of aid to the chamber in accomplishing these goals.

Let's make Rockport the most popular resort town on the Texas coast. It certainly has all the advantages of position, and climate and is a natural playground. There are few of our visitors now who do not want to return, but let's make sure that every one of them likes it so well here they

will all return time and again and bring their friends. This can be done during the coming year if every one of us will do our very best to improve Rockport and by doing so we will be doing ourselves a great big favor. However. it will require that we work together and not at cross purposes. Let's all get on the team.
