## Allen Strickland Receives Lions Farm Award

Allen Strickland, of Haskell, cooperating with the California Creek Soil and Water Conservation District since 1958, was presented the Fort Worth Press Conservation of the Year plaque by Haskell Lions at the Tuesday noon-day luncheon meeting at Felker's Restaurant dining room.

J. C. Yearly, District Soil Conservationist, told Strickland's accomplishments and also showed slides of farm practices carried out on the land farmed by Strickland.

Yearly said that "Strickland believes that all farming and conservation work must meet high standards. Because of this belief, he has placed quality above cost. He practices sound conservation, and firmly believes that Conservation Doesn't Cost, It Pays."

Strickland is farming five units of land consisting of 783 acres. Two hundred ninety-five acres of this land belongs to Allen's mother, Mrs. Mary Strickland, and is the farm on which Allen and his brothers and sisters were born and raised.

"Strickland has virtually completed all management practices planned that would bring about an increase in fertility, moisture holding capacity of the soil, and basic intake rate of the soil," Yearly said.

President, H. S. Hartsfield presided over the meeting. Wallace Cox, Jr., led the singing with Judy Therlyhanger at the piano, and the invocation was given by Danny Tollison.

AUSTIN: The House Conservation and Reclamation Committee suspended its rules Tuesday night to give approval to a bill to let Knox City back into the North Central Texas Municipal Water District.

Haskell, Munday, Goree and Rule are other cities in the district.

Representative Bill Clayton of Spring Lake asked the committee to take hurried action on the bill by Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon without a hearing.

He said the district wants to build a reservoir on Millers Creek and that Knox City voted originally not to join the district, but that it now wants to.

After Clayton described the bill as an emergency, the committee agreed to suspend the rules and reported it out favorably to the House with a recommendation that it be passed.

## Rod Rust To Speak At 'All-Sports' Banquet Friday Night

### BRUSH CONTROL MEETING IS SLATED TUESDAY NIGHT

Buford Cox, Haskell, has been named chairman of the newly organized statewide Brush Control and Range Improvement Association for Haskell County. He has called a county wide meeting Tuesday night, April 15th, 7:30 o'clock, in the courtroom of the Haskell County Courthouse to explain the functions of the Association.

The BCRIA was established last November by a group of livestockmen to fight one of the state's major agricultural problems — brush invasion of land throughout Texas. Each county has a leader representing the association.

Cox said the BCRIA is a non-profit organization and is not directly associated with any university or company. The goal is to obtain 1 cent per acre, each year, for five years from landowners and other interested individuals and organizations to greatly increase brush control research. He said surveys show that Haskell County has

217,300 acres of Range and Pasture land of which 210,900 acres are infested with mesquite. Texas surveys show 82% of Texas range land are infested with brush that the condition cuts animal carrying capacity by 50 percent or more. Despite much research in the past, greater financial help will be needed if the problem is to be solved.

Funds obtained at the county level will be pooled and used to support research and education projects on brush control and range improvement. A project evaluation committee, appointed by BCRIA Chairman John Matthews of Abilene, will approve research projects submitted by universities and other agencies.

Rob Brown of Throckmorton, Secretary of the State BCRIA, will be on hand to explain the associations functions and answer any questions you might have about the association.

## Approximately 150 Persons Served At The H. D. Luncheon Held Here

Seven Haskell County Home Demonstration clubs pooled their efforts to prepare and serve the annual HD salad luncheon Wednesday, April 2.

More than 80 main dish salads were offered at the event staged in a vacant building east of the courthouse square.

General chairman was Mrs. C. C. Campbell. Her committee included Misses M. W. Phenix, J. P. Perrin, Lewis Corzine, chairman of the Haskell County HD Council, and Miss Ruth Ann Fansler, county HD agent.

The menu was planned around the "basic four" food groups stressed in providing nutritious meals.

Women from Haskell, Centerpoint, Jossilet, O'Brien, Waldrip, Rule, L. U. C. Y., Sagerton, L. O. C., Mattson and Weibert HD Clubs, participated in the project. Approximately 150 persons were served.

Other homemakers may want to clip these recipes four of the women used.

From Mrs. Carl Bailey of the Jossilet Club comes the recipe for All-in-One Salad:

- 2 c. cubed cooked meat
  - 1 c. diced celery
  - 2 hard-cooked eggs
  - 2 tsp. chopped pimento
  - 2 tsp. chopped green onion
  - 2 tsp. chopped green pepper
  - 1/4 c. French Dressing (recipe below)
- Salt and pepper to taste  
Mayonnaise (recipe below)  
Allow meat to stand in French Dressing 15 minutes; drain and combine with remainder of ingredients. Place on lettuce leaves.

- Basic French Dressing**
- 1/4 c. vinegar
  - 3/4 c. salad oil
  - 1/4 tsp. paprika
  - 1/4 tsp. salt
  - 1 tsp. sugar
- Combine ingredients thoroughly. Shake before serving. Makes 1 cup.
- Mayonnaise**
- 1 tsp. sugar
  - 1 tsp. dry mustard

- 3/4 tsp. salt
  - 1 egg
  - 2 c. salad oil
  - 3 tbsp. vinegar or lemon juice
- Combine sugar, mustard and salt; mix well.  
Add egg; beat with rotary or electric beater. Continue beating and gradually add 1/2 cup oil, at first by drops.  
Add vinegar or lemon juice and remaining oil alternately, beating well after each addition until mayonnaise is stiff enough to hold its shape.  
Makes 2 cups.

An easy but nutritious salad is the Carrot Salad prepared by Mrs. C. B. Sprayberry of the Lucky HD Club:

- Carrot Salad**
- 2 c. grated carrots
  - 1 c. finely chopped cabbage
  - 1 c. raisins
  - 1/2 c. mayonnaise
- Mix well and chill.

Macaroni adds substance to the tuna salad made by Mrs. Claude Stamper of the Mattson Club:

- Tuna Salad**
- 2 (8-oz.) pkgs. macaroni
  - 2 cans of tuna
  - 6 med. green onions
  - 12 radishes
  - 1/2 c. salad dressing
- Cook macaroni according to package directions. Blanch and let cool.  
Add 2 cans of tuna, onions and radishes to cooked macaroni.  
Add 1/2 c. of salad dressing. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

- Mrs. O. W. Whitaker of Centerpoint Club took a Bean Salad, combining green beans, yellow wax beans and kidney beans:
- Bean Salad**
- 2/3 c. vinegar
  - 1 c. sugar
  - 1/3 c. salad oil
  - 1 fresh onion, finely chopped
  - 1 No. 2 can green beans
  - 1 No. 2 can yellow wax beans

1 No. 2 can red kidney beans  
Combine all ingredients and let stand overnight in refrigerator.  
Drain well before serving.

### Farmers Urged To Report Income To Protect SS

Are you one of a number of farmers in the Abilene area who are not getting social security credit for their earnings? R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager, said recently that some farmers do not file tax returns because they don't earn enough to owe income tax.

These farmers are losing social security protection that they will need someday—or that their families may need tomorrow.

Tuley said even if a self-employed farmer does not have enough income to owe income tax, he still needs to file a tax return in order to receive social security credits.

If a farmer's gross profit is \$900 or more and his net profit is \$400 or more, the law says he must report his income for social security and pay the social security tax on his net earnings, Tuley pointed out.

If he has a net profit of less than \$400, or even a loss, but had a gross profit of at least \$900, he may file, using what is known as the optional method, and receive social security credits for his earnings.

### Under the optional method of filing, Tuley said, a farmer whose gross profit is between \$900 and \$2,400 may report and get social security credit for two-thirds of his gross, regardless of the amount of his net income.

If his gross profit is over \$2,400, but his net is less than \$1,600, he may nevertheless report and get credit for \$1,600.

Tuley said that a farmer who has not reported his earnings for social security has about 3 years to make the report, pay the back taxes due, and get the earnings credit to his social security record.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — It is almost axiomatic that one invites controversy when discussing religion or religious institutions unless in the confines of his own. It may, however, be acceptable to consider what appears to be non-religious aspects of an organization related to many of our churches.

Dr. J. Lester McGee of Centenary United Methodist Church of St. Louis feels that words from some pulpits and some religious teachings outside doctrine is partly responsible for riots and disorders.

As Dr. McGee is quoted: "We are seeking to reform the World rather than to convert the individual person. No, I don't think we are trying to reform the World, we are just doing our best to conform to the World. Many preachers have been finding of late that the gods of big Government, civil disobedience and the 'new morality' have feet of clay. Meanwhile, the moral fabric of our society has been torn asunder and a secularized church is baffled before the evils of our time."

Many devoted Christians were shocked recently at press reports that a study committee of the National Council of Churches has reported that violence is an acceptable tool for use by victims of injustice.

Apparently some of the most active and dedicated promoters of big Government, civil disobedience, the "new morality", and the various social action groups were formed within or attached themselves to the broad category of religion.

Over a period of time, the official publications of the National Council of Churches reveal that their "General Board" has issued policy statements on most controversial issues of the day. It is hardly likely that any real effort is made to learn the views of the millions of members whose churches are identified with the Council. The record indicates that the Council has supported practically all big Government spending schemes of the most liberal nature, such as an endorsement of the guaranteed annual income for everyone as a "matter of right." They have also called for legislation for the purpose of the "reallocation of national resources" to the "poor and powerless."

The Council has a very active lobby in Washington and exerts its pressures on Congress for big increases in programs which have failed to reach goals to any appreciable degree intended. The Council has recommended huge increases in foreign aid spending, most of which they would channel through agencies of the United Nations. Incidentally, it is the agency offshoots of the United Nations which have blurred and distorted its original intent of keeping World peace. Many of these organizations within the United Nations are like barnacles on the ship of good intent.

The council favors admitting Red China into the United Nations and would reduce and weaken United States military strength in areas near communist China. At the same time they recommend "an increase in and tightening of economic sanctions and political pressures" against little Rhodesia who is trying to mind its own business.

The National Council through its "Youth Ministry" seems to take pride that they were at the Democratic Convention in Chicago and took part in the riots. In explaining their presence they say they assumed a new role—"not as an observer of a

An estimated 720,000 bales of cotton, much of it West Texas cotton, worth over \$70-million and costing over \$1-million dollars a month to store, are now stacked at Texas ports, principally at Galveston and Houston. These two ports account for three quarters of all U. S. cotton exports in a normal year.

Textile mills all over the world are awaiting delivery of this cotton. But even worse is

the fact that there are also textile mills all over the world who are NOT waiting... they waited as long as they could, then switched their orders for cotton to Mexico, Brazil, Pakistan or some other cotton exporting country that could make delivery.

Obviously some of these mills will be pleased with the cotton and the service they are able to get from other exporters. And these will not be back to the U. S. as cotton buyers for years, perhaps never.

Cotton producers and allied industry in this country, especially in the Rolling Plains area where exports account for almost two-thirds of the cotton market, will feel the sting of the strike long after the stevedores go back to work and the shipowners return to making a profit.

Loss of export markets mean loss of acreage and loss of production. And cotton is not the only crop. The same sorry situation applies to grain sorghum, rice, wheat, some citrus fruits, vegetables and other agricultural commodities.

Deadline For Motor Vehicle Inspection Nears

Colonel Wilson E. Spehr, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today reminds motorists that only a few short days remain until the state motor vehicle inspection deadline.

State law requires that cars, trucks, and certain trailers be inspected at an approved inspection station, and that a current sticker be displayed in the lower right-hand corner of the windshield by midnight, April

15. The fee for the inspection is \$1.75, plus charges made by the inspection station for mechanical adjustments, if any.

The required inspection procedure requires that mechanics check a vehicle's brakes, lights, rims and wheels, horns and warning devices, windshield wipers, mirrors, steering and front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

Spurred motorists to get the inspection soon to avoid long lines which will develop at inspection stations as the April

15 deadline approaches.

Inspection stations in Haskell include Bailey Toliver Chevrolet, Bill Wilson Motor Company, Medford Buick-Pontiac, Perry Motor Company and Covey's Garage in O'Brien and Smart's Garage in Rochester.

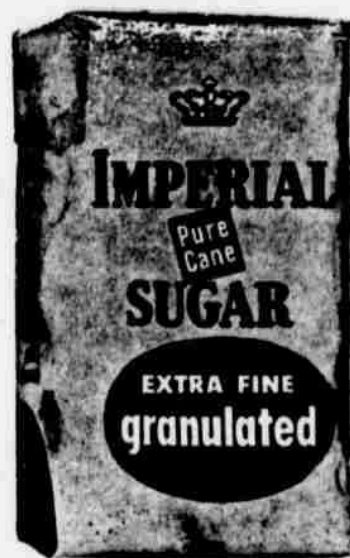

## Tax Questions And Answers

(This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.)

### Q—Where can I buy a copy of "Your Federal Income Tax"?

A—Most local offices of IRS have copies of this guide, Publication 17, or you can write the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402. It costs 60 cents.

### Q—How long should it take between the time I send in my return and my check comes?

A—If the return is accurate and complete, it takes five to six weeks to receive an income tax refund. To avoid delays, read the instructions that accompany the tax forms carefully.

If you are expecting a refund, file your return now for prompt action. Our offices are flooded with returns in April and refund claims filed then take longer to process.

### Q—I can't find my W-2. Is there any way I can get another one?

A—Let your employer know what has happened and ask for another copy of your withholding statement.

### Q—Is a tax refund income that has to be reported?

A—Federal tax refunds do not have to be reported. A state tax refund has to be reported as miscellaneous income if the taxpayer deducted the tax in a prior year.

### Q—I don't provide over half of my grandfather's support but when you add what I contribute to my brother's contributions, it does amount to over half. Can either of us claim a dependency exemption for this?

A—If each of you contributed over 10 percent of your grandfather's support and the combined total adds up to over half of this total support then either of you may claim him as a dependent. A special declaration must be completed by the one not claiming the exemption and sent in with the return of the one who claims the exemption. Use Form 2120, Multiple Support Declaration.

### Q—I paid off my home mortgage early and was charged a prepayment penalty. Is that deductible?

A—Yes, it is deductible as interest if you itemize.

### Q—Under what conditions can a person 65 or over sell a house and not have to pay any tax on the profits?

A—There will be no tax to pay if:

- 1. You were 65 or older before the date of the sale.
- 2. The adjusted sales price was \$20,000 or less.
- 3. You owned and occupied the house as your principal residence for at least five of the eight years preceding the sale.

If the adjusted sales price was over \$20,000 and the other conditions are met, then only a portion of the profit will be taxable. Details on this and other benefits are contained in the booklet, "Tax Benefits for Older Americans," Publication 554. For a free copy, drop a post card to your IRS district director.

## VIETNAM VIEW

(As reported by Marine Corps Combat Correspondents)

**DONG HA COMBAT BASE, Vietnam**—A local Marine, Lance Cpl. Robert Burns, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Burns, 170 34th N. W., Paris, Texas, has a new job in Vietnam.

After spending most of a year wheeling a five-ton cargo truck on "rougher" convoys throughout Vietnam's northern I Corps Tactical Zone, he is now fighting what he calls "the war for the people."

Often called the "other war" or the "pacification program," civil action is the name given to the program of helping the Vietnamese people help themselves.

Burns is a member of the Force Logistic Support Group Bravo's (FLSG-B) Civil Affairs Team serving in Leatherneck Square less than eight miles from the Demilitarized Zone.

"We're responsible for helping people who live in three hamlets. We also give assistance to a small orphanage in Dong Ha," he said.

"We're hauling scrap lumber and cement to the hamlets as the people need it," Burns said. He explained that more than 30 homes have been rebuilt or repaired since the team undertook the project in December. More than 300 homes are presently under construction.

Another part of their "helping the people" program is assisting in MEDCAPS (medical civic action program).

"I think this is one of our most effective means of directly helping the Vietnamese. When a doctor can heal sores, take a way pain and raise the level of personal hygiene," Burns said, "it's much easier for the people to realize our sincerity."

Burns likes to talk about the children's orphanage assisted by FLSG-B.

"Seldom does a week go by that we don't take a box of clothes out to the orphanage. The clothes are received from interested persons and church groups back home," Burns said. They also spend two afternoons a month treating cuts and bruises at the orphanage.

Burns attended the Defense Language Institute in Monterey, Calif., where he learned the basic Vietnamese language.

"I can get almost any simple point across, but my good old Texas drawl slows me down a little," he said.

"We sure have our ups and downs," Burns continued, "but little things come up every day that indicate we're making good progress. Maybe it's just a quick smile from one of the Vietnamese or just a heartier hand shake—we like to feel we are doing a good job."

**CHU LAI, Vietnam**—Cleaning your own weapon is one of the necessities of war. However, to have to clean someone else's, especially when that someone is "Victor Charlie" usually raises a few eyebrows.

Such is the job of Staff Sgt. Winfield S. Poole, 27, 329 West Main St., St. Albans, W. Va., who, in his eight years in the Corps, never suspected he'd be poking a cleaning rod down the barrel of an AK-47 assault weapon or cleaning a communist light machinegun.

Poole has the assignment of cleaning captured enemy weapons. He also cleans such items as VC gas masks, ammunition pouches and other communist equipment which is now used for instructional and display purposes at Marine Aircraft Group-12, Chu Lai.

The weapons, collected over the past three years from operations near the Chu Lai area, may not have been clean when acquired but they are now Marine Corps property and everyone knows that in the Corps, all weapons will be cleaned regularly.

Poole, whose regular job is in administration, has found that he rather enjoys cleaning the enemy weapons and has learned a lot about them. It might be interesting to be able to see the expression on his children's faces when Poole answers their question, "What did you do in the war, Daddy?"

**DA NANG, Vietnam**—The Marines had to make their move immediately. Pinned down by North Vietnamese Army (NVA) forces and nearly out of ammunition, they did the only thing left to do. They attacked the enemy in his own lines, using their rifles as clubs.

A platoon from "M" Company, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, had received word that a Marine patrol was pinned down by the NVA near Hill

10, seven miles southwest of Da Nang. They quickly moved out to aid their comrades.

As the platoon crossed a rice paddy, they received small arms fire from a nearby tree line. Engaged in a fierce fire fight when they ran low on ammunition, the Leathernecks turned to the kind of fighting every Marine learns from his earliest time in the Marine Corps—hand-to-hand combat.

Second Lt. Louis R. Platt, 23, 177 Hibiscus Pl., New Orleans, La., said "One of the Marines ran up to the enemy's position with his empty weapon and killed three of them using his rifle as a club. We kept up our clubbing tactics until the NVA decided the fighting was too much for them and they ran back into the tree line."

After the Marines were resupplied they continued on their way to relieve the beleaguered

patrol. Nearing the down Marines, the platoon countered more NVA fire fight, which was three Marines pinned in enemy's position, killing all NVA and routing the

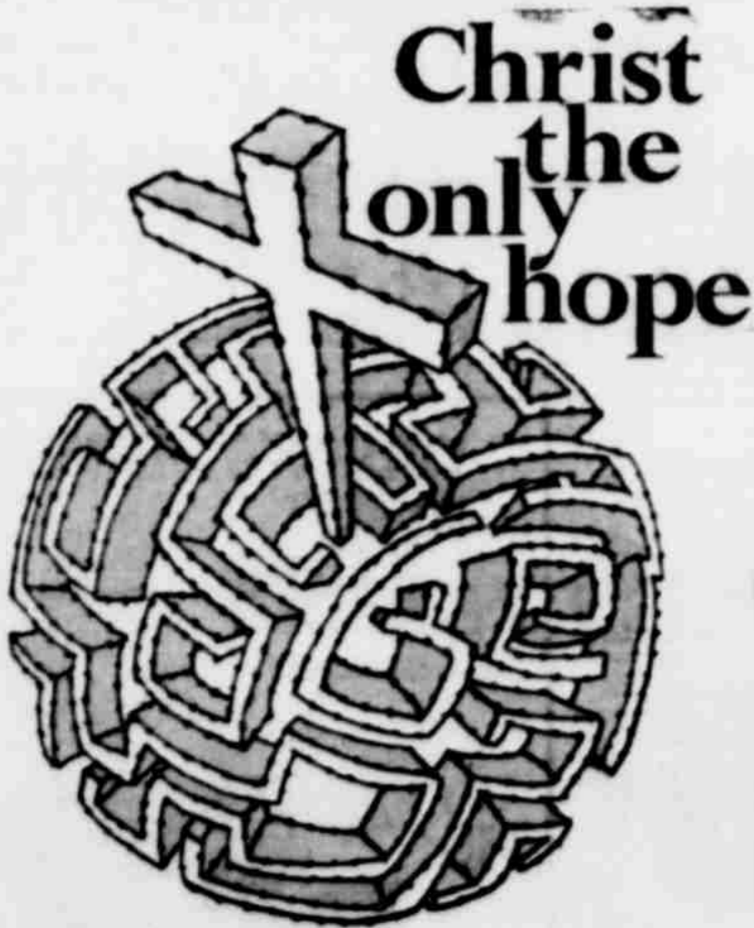

### May Draft Call For Texas Is Down From April

The May draft call for Texas is 1,453, down from 1,737 for April, Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Thursday.

This is the state's share of a national quota of 27,600 men, 25,600 for the Army and 2,000 for the Marine Corps.

A total of 8,234 men is scheduled to be forwarded for armed forces pre-induction physical and mental examination in May to prepare for future calls, Col. Schwartz said.

A total of 10,210 is scheduled for this purpose in April. In early March, a quota of 7,293 was announced for this purpose, but this was increased in mid-March.

The state received a reduction in its current call for doc-

tors of medicine from 18 during the period July 1969-January 1970 to 9, brought about by revised personnel needs from the Department of Defense.

The call for two optometrists in January 1970 was reduced to one, and the quota for one doctor of osteopathy in the last half of 1969 was not changed for Texas, despite a reduction in the national quota.

The order of selection to fill draft calls through May may be from among examined and acceptable men who are (1) delinquents 19 years old and older, (2) volunteers under age 25 in the sequence in which they have volunteered, and (3) non-volunteers 19 through 25 years old, single and married, oldest first, with those married after August 26, 1965, being selected ahead of those married on or before that date.

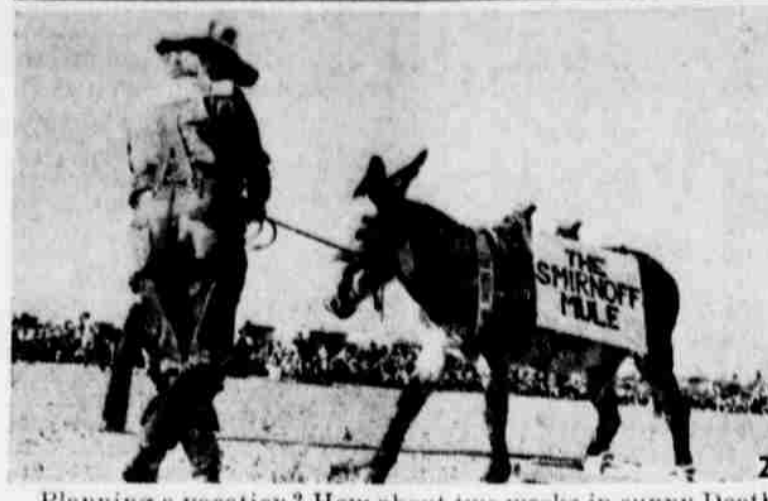

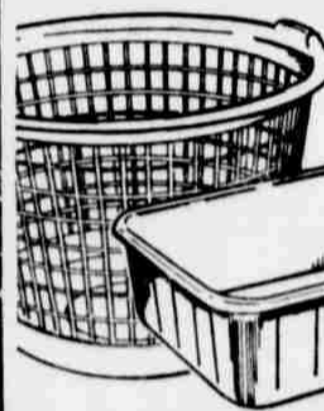

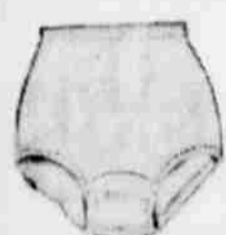
