In six months, the Rockport Chamber of Commerce has successfully completed 13 major projects for the benefit of Rockport and Aransas County. This fact was set out Monday in a report from Secretary-Manager Hugh V. Haddock to the Chamber's Board of Directors.

C. OF C. PRESIDENT INVITES MEMBERS

A general invitation to business firms not now members of the Rockport Chamber of Commeree to join the organization was voiced this week by President Roy V Rogero.

Rogero pointed out that the membership committee has been prevented, through press of personal business, from calling on those who are eligible for membership and who will profit through the Chamber's work.

Most of the right-of-way already has been obtained and condemnation suits have been filed to obtain the remainder. Legal notices covering these suits appear elsewhere in this issue of The Pilot. Fences have been reset along much of the route between Rockport and Aran-

sas Pass. All information as to plans, however, is concentrated in Corpus Christi and was not immediately available here.

Under the contract, either the company may withdraw, or the city may order removal of the concessions on 30 days notice.

The current contract, with the city and the Navigation Board joining in granting permission will run until September 15. Any extension of that date or renewal for next year will depend upon the outcome of the waterfront settlement between the Navigation Board and the City Council.

The six-months' report of accomplishment by the Rockport Chamber of Commerce, appearing on page 1 of this issue, merits considerable thoughtful attention by Rockport citizens and business men.

For one thing, the report pretty well outlines the functions of a Chamber of Commerce. These are too often not well understood.

Primarily, a Chamber of Commerce should not take over any of the functions of government, nor use its funds newsmen were unable to agree on for any of the jobs which city and county government should the form of an organization at the Thumb Rides But Don't finance. It is not the function of pleted. a Chamber of Commerce to directly make sales for individual business firms nor to handle a reservations service for tourist courts. All of these might help briefly in specific cases and benefit a few. But in the aggregate, the effect would be comparable to taking a six-inch cannon out to kill while, the lots increased to nearly a sparrow.

A Chamber of Commerce has a duty and a chance for service in planning, and in helping public officials to find men did agree that something a way to carry out those plans. It has a duty in the study of public finance and government and in placing the results of those studies at the service of the public. It has the duty in Rockport, of promoting the tourist traffic for the whole town and thus insuring that all tourist courts get a share of the business and stay occupied, and that the tourist in Corpus Christi on business Friincome which supports this area so largely continues to grow.

The Chamber of Commerce should help set up such projects as the gymnasium-community center building, and the beachfront improvement projects, then join with other forces in carrying through those projects.

It is seldom that any one member of a Chamber of Commerce can put his finger on a single transaction and say: "This business came from my membership in the Chamber." If he can, the chances are that the Chamber of Commerce concerned is not being well conducted. The chances are that favoritism has crept into the set-up.

On the other hand, every business man's books at the end of the year should reflect a profit from the overall work of his town's Chamber of Commerce in town building and town promotion. Every citizen should have a little more income for the year, or a little more convenience, or a little better chance for enjoying life as the result of the Chamber of Commerce operation.

This is the job that the Rockport Chamber of Commerce is trying to do. It is the job that the present membership of the Chamber invites others to participate in.

Time Changes Everything

Bill Kittrell of Dallas, secretary of the state Democratic executive committee, provided observers of state politics this week with what can be conservatively described as a diverting spectacle.

Persons who recall the Texas Regular uproar of the 1944 state campaign probably recall that Sen. W. Lee O'Daniel brought his sound truck to Texas and actively campaigned for the Regulars. And when "Pappy" Lee actively campaigns, he pulls no punches and drops the curtain on

One of the best side-shows in connection with O'Daniel's campaign was the bitter denuncation by Chairman Harry Seay, Secretary Kittrell and others of O'Daniel as an archreactionary. Kittrell was among the group that all but read "Pappy" out of the party.

Of course, at that time, Seay, Kittrell and others were so closely allied with the Rainey-Wallace-New Deal faction that was raising Old Ned in the University of Texas controversy that they jumped every time the faction yelled "Frog." Incidentally, Jimmy Allred was the hero of the faction at that time. But over-shadowing all else was the bitter animosity of this group toward Coke Stevenson because of his refusal to illegally interfere in affairs of the university.

One may draw the conclusion that such feeling lay behind Kittrell's flip-flop of last week in which he endorsed O'Daniel for re-election to the United States Senate. Kittrell cast a sour eye upon Stevenson's candidacy and described O'Daniel as a progressive in his public statement. Of course Kittrell's definition of a Progressive may have changed in two and a half years. If so, there can be only congratulations upon his mental agility.

Or it could be that Kittrell and his political backers figure that election of Coke Stevenson, should he run, means curtains for their political career. What makes the situation all the more interesting, however, is Kittrell's failure to endorse Allred, his hero of 1944 and an expected contender for O'Daniel's place on a frankly New Deal platform. Maybe somebody else can figure that one.

Stand on Pavement

Austin, Tex .- Contrary to inaccurate reports, the new uniform traffic code does not prohibit hitchhiking, George Clarke, managing director of the Texas Safety Association, said this week in Aus-

The code, which goes into effect September 5, was supported by the Texas Safety Association and statewide cooperating groups in the recent session of the legislature as a safety measure.

The two-line subsection of the traffic code pertaining to hitchhikers reads:

"No person shall stand in a roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride from the driver of any vehicle."

Clarke emphasized that the bill does not forbid any person to stand on the shoulder of the road for the purpose of soliciting a ride from a driver.

He said that it is a practice of hitchhikers to stand on the concrete or corrugated surface of the road, and that this action constitutes a definite hazard to the Political Announcements hitchhiker, as well as to traffic. Penalties for violations of the For State Senator act range from \$1 to \$200.



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

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
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How to Improve Your View

Antelope Hunts Set For Fall


Four controlled antelope hunts have been scheduled for October by the Game, Fish and Oyster

The first hunt is slated for Brewster, Jeff Davis, Pecos and Reeves Counties on October 2, 3, and 4. The second hunt is set for October 6, 7, and 8 in Presidio County, south of the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks. Jeff Davis County gets the third hunt on October 9, 10," and 11. The final hunt will be in Hudspeth and Culberson Counties on October 13, 14, and 15.

Present plans call for the issuance of 600 antelope hunting permits. This number may be increased or decreased after a count of the antelope is made in August.

Owners of the land on which the antelope are to be hunted are authorized to charge each hunter not more than \$40.00 for the privi-

lege of hunting on his premises. Rules of the hunt are the same as they were in 1946. Antelope may be stalked, but not chased by an automobile, nor can a hunter take a shot at a pronghorn from an automobile, or shoot blindly into a herd of antelope. Only antelope bucks may be shot and one buck is the bag limit.

Drilling Firm Delays on Well

With the water shortage beginning to bear down again on Rockport, the Layne-Texas drilling company still had made no start on a new well for the municipal water system Thursday.

The company was a week overdue, and Mayor Bruhl and members of the City Council were doing everything possible to hurry the drilling crew into town.

Representatives of the company first told the city officials that the firm was delayed through lack of materials. The latest report was that a tool fishing job on a well being drilled for another town was preventing the move to Rockport.

The city has no funds to pay for the \$4200 well drilling job and has been unable to finance it except through the Layne-Texas company. This effectively prevents the employment of another firm and puts the city in no position to bring pressure on Layne-Texas for quick fulfillment.
