Callahan County Commissioners To Decide on Insurance

The Callahan County Commissioners met Tuesday Oct. 14 in their regular meeting. Numerous items were on the agenda including a discussion of the insurance the county now has. It has been recommended that the county have one agency handle all of the counties insurance needs with a package deal. The commissioners took it under advisement but did not make a ruling. At the present time the county has insurance with four area agents. In some instances, more than one agency is involved in the same piece of property insured. One alternative the commissioners are considering, is to designate particular pieces of county property and real estate to one agency.

The commissioners appointed Jon Hardwick Election Judge of Precinct

No. 1 and Betty Hardwick as alternate, to replace Curtis Sutphens who resigned.

In other action, the commissioners voted to purchase six fire alarm, smoke detectors, for the county jail.

Voted to Pay the Cross Plains deputy mileage to transfer prisoners to the county jail from Cross Plains.

The Commissioners also voted to pay the employees share of Social Security in lieu of a pay raise. By doing this, the county will not have to pay as much for payroll, yet the employees will realize more money in their paycheck.

In final action, the commissioners voted to allocate \$1,200.00 in Revenue Sharing Funds to the Putnam Study Club. This money will be used to repair the Community Center of Putnam.

Baird City Council Approves Board of Equalization Proposal

The Baird City Council met in regular session Monday night, October 20, 1980. There were five councilmen in attendance along with seven citizens.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Brame. The minutes of the last meeting were read by Kenneth Neel and approved by all councilmen in attendance.

In a unanimous vote the council appointed themselves as a Board of Equalization. By doing this they will be able to examine adjust, correct and equalize the property of all residents of Baird. A special meeting was set for Thursday

night at 7:00 p.m. for the purpose of checking and setting property values.

The council also voted to accept a Lighting Contract with West Texas Utilities. W.T.U. will be responsible for replacing bulbs, lamps, etc. on all city street lights.

Before the council adjourned, City Manager Kenneth Neel announced his resignation effective Friday, October 24. Mr. Neel thanked the City of Baird and its citizens for all they had done for him and also for their friendship. He will move to Abilene, where he will be working for an oil firm.

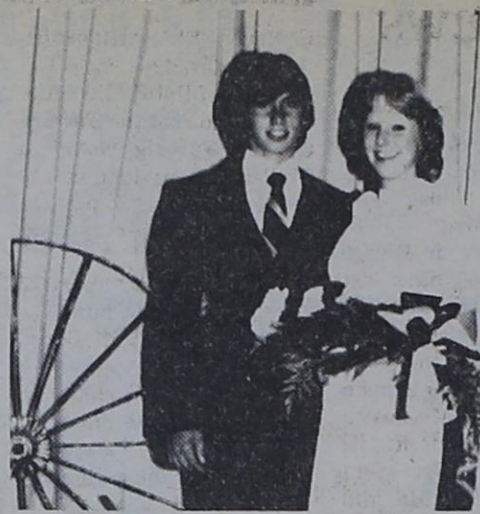

Proposed Rule Making For 81 Peanut Program

This is to provide each peanut producer in Callahan County an opportunity to be aware of the proposals being considered by the Secretary and a chance to offer whatever comments they may have concerning these items to be effective for 1981.

The following proposed determinations are to be made with respect to the 1981 crop peanuts: National Poundage Quota: To be

announced not later than December 1, 1980. The latest available data indicated that a national poundage quota of 1,440,000 tons should be sufficient to meet total requirements for domestic edible use and a reasonable carryover during the 1981 marketing year. National Acreage Allotment: To be announced not later than December 1, 1980. A minimum average allotment of

1,614,000 acres, should be sufficient to meet total requirements for domestic use, exports and a reasonable carryover during the 1981 marketing year. Apportionment of

National Acreage Allotment To The States; The 1981 crop of peanuts will be apportioned to the states on the basis of their share of the 1980 national acreage allotment. Date Or Period Of Marketing

Co. Communities May Enter Improvement Program

The Texas Community Improvement Program is a joint program sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Public Utility Companies of Texas. The purpose of the program is to recognize the accomplishments of small communities in Texas. This program is open to all rural communities of less than 1,000 population. There are several communities in Callahan County that could benefit from enrollment in the Texas Community Improvement Program, says Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent.
