Jarboe Requests Time to Study **Levy Proposal**

Six-Year Moratorium Suggested to Allow Firm to Profit

The City Council moved, Tuesday night, to levy a two per cent gross receipts tax on any gas franchise which may be granted in Rockport. The decision was reached as Maj. James Jarboe of Fulton presented his request for a franchise

Jarboe said that the prospect of such a levy would have to be studied by himself and associates before proceeding further.

Mayor Bruhl suggested the figure. When Jarboe objected that any gas supplier would probably operate at a loss at the start, and at small profit for some time, the council agreed that such a levy would not be applicable until Jan. 1, 1954.

That date was considered as allowing a year for Jarboe to ob tain pipe and install a system here, tain pipe and install a system here, plus four to five years operation in 'Shots' At Second which the company would have chance to get on a profit basis.

Oil Play Moves To Aransas Bay North of Fulton

The Fulton Beach oil field, whose name has irked a number of residents of Fulton Beach, moved over practically against the town last week-end with the signing of an mportant new oil lease.

Hunt Oil Co. and George Graham, developers of the two wells at Live Oak Point, took a lease on the 260 acres between Highway 35 and the beach a strip 7,600 feetabout a mile and a half-long, running south from the end of the peninsula.

The compromise offer, received from Attorney Victor Bouldin, member of the Houston law fir. of Vinson, Elkins, Weems and Francis, indicated that ideas of the Navigation Board and the City Council were not as nearly uniform as previous conferences and assurances had indicated.

The City Council had believed that the Navigation Board was willing to lease the breakwater area to the city on a 50-year proposition with only one restrictionthat beer and liquor should not be sold on the property. In return, the city would have turned over to the Navigation Board a tract of land north of Albin's.

Bouldin's letter seemed to assume that the city would turn over the tract in question. But the proposed settlement would operate, also, to keep the board in full control of the property which the city wants, and tighten the board's control on the entire area.

Rockport Needs Zoning

The City Council has made a good start in considering the advisability of zoning, not only the beach road north of the yacht basin, but the entire city. The Chamber of Commerce may well get behind the idea. Together, the two groups should see that the plan does not die.

Thus far, true, Rockport has gotten along very well without zoning restrictions. But the next two to five years will see vastly different problems arising here. The coming of oil and the oil industry to this immediate area is already raising the shadow of a few and pointing to their becoming reality sooner than any of us had heretofore expected.

A well thought-out zoning ordinance will hurt no one. It should help practically everyone. Constructively written, such an ordinance would encourage business and direct it along the streets most suited for its development. It would protect Rockport's fine homes and residential areas.

As matters stand now, personalities enter each time new business starts to locate in any given area. Residents of the neighborhood naturally try to look ahead and figure what the new business may turn out, ultimately, to be. The division of thought too often takes on a retaliatory tinge.

The town has a number of areas which are eminently suited to development as beauty spots. It has a number of areas which are already under business development and which are suited to business and others in the logical course of business development.

The smart course is to plan now the kind of a town we want ten years from now. That course would include assuring business men that there are certain areas in which they may establish certain types of business. It would assure owners of nice homes that objectionable types of business will not arise in their neighborhoods. It would stabilize both residential and business real estate values. It would lay down the same rules for everyone.

What is probably just as important is that zoning would take heat off the City Council, heat that now comes on, full force, with almost every new business.

Test or Racket?

The death toll on Texas highways and the constant threat from a horde of incompetent and irresponsible drivers demand some quick and drastic remedy.

Even without reading a recent national magazine article, anyone who drives the highways in this state knows that thousands of people are being licensed to drive who have no earthly business behind a steering wheel. This writer was forced off the pavement by four of them in a recent trip from Rockport to San Antonio. Most of the deaths and injuries in this area this summer have resulted from such persons being permitted to drive.

As long as driver's licenses are issued with a free hand an no real tests, we will continue to have shocking automobile death tolls. The Department of Public Safety lists 1070 killed, 30,024 injured in seven months of 1947. No matter how careful you may be, you may end up by being just another story in the next day's paper and another corpse in some morgue any time you go out for a country drive.

Sheriff Curry and the over-worked officers of the Texas Highway Patrol should be commended for their arrest and prosecution of drunken drivers. But our machinery should be so set up that reckless driving convictions, as well as drunken driving, are considered cause for license revocation. Such convictions should be counted heavily when the man who has an accident comes up for his license the next time.

The driver's license was set up originally to weed out the THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT unfit. In too many states, including Texas, it has simply become a revenue measure. Anybody with the price of a license is given the nod to get behind the steering wheel until he kills somebody. Even then he frequently is still permitted to drive. It's time to stop that sort of thing.

Check Your Insurance

The Texas City disaster of last April illusrated the fact that every home owner should have his fire insurance checked by an expert to make certain that it adequately covers possible contingencies.

In Texas City, most of the damage was the result of concussion—and concussion damage is not payable under an ordinary fire policy. However, Texas City was in a known hurricane area and so, luckily, the great majority of the policy holders had taken out what is known as extended coverage -an endorsement to a fire policy which, for a small sum, provides coverage for a wide variety of special hazards, including windstorm, smoke, riot, off-the-premises explosion, etc. Had they not had the endorsement, recovery would not have been possible.

Texas City also demonstrated the splendid service provided by fire insurance companies in a time of emergency. A representatives of the National Board of Fire Underwriters went to the scene immediately. A Catastrophe Plan was put into effect, under which experienced adjusters dispensed with many formalities and made payments on policies in a extraordinarily short period of time. This voluntary "superservice" prevented great economic hardship for a legion of families.

Shivers' Becomes Foodcraft Store





The licenses will be on sale from 3 a.m. until 5 p.m., except for the noon hour, Mulinax said.

Sports fishermen in this county, of course, do not require a license unless they go outside the county to fish in fresh water. There is no fresh water in Aransas County.

Neither do local residents need hunting license, Mulinax pointed out for hunting in Aransas County. Those who plan to go out of the county for the dove season, or who plan duck hunting in nearby counties later, must have a hunting license, however. These may be obtained at the Game Commission offices.

But regardless of the requirement for a hunting license, anyone who goes hunting ducks or geese or other migratory waterfowl must have a federal duck stamp. This can be purchased at the postoffice.


