

(Pug) Mullinax said that several thousand pounds of shrimp had been dumped because they were under legal size, but that most of the boats had moved down the bay toward Aransas Pass where the shrimp were larger and that less trouble is being experienced. The undersize catches were made toward the

Spencer said that no prosecutions would be entered against men who had undersized first day catches because they were acting in good faith and were victims of the law's bad sections.

The county attorney added, however, that he will file charges where circumstances warrant.

"That goes, even if the man is my best friends," Spencer said. Meanwhile, Mullinax said, "nearly 75 per cent of the commercial fishermen want the bays closed

WASTE DEPLORED

The fishermen, Mullinax said, deplore the waste incidental to bay shrimping. They realize that the shrimp taken, barely within legal size limit, would grow by the time they had reached the open Gulf to where the corresponding catch would be better, and the price considerably higher. Price for the bay catch is running about 9 cents a pound. "Bull" shrimp now commands 32 cents a pound.

#### Payoff Publicity

St. Petersburg, Fla., is setting the nation a shining example of plain dumbness in public relations. St. Petersburg spends thousands to get itself favorably mentioned in the magazines and newspapers. It is readily understandable that the shock of seeing-and smelling-great piles of dead fish on its beaches would leave the civic boosters most unhappy.

In that unhappy state, St. Petersburg and its surrounding county apparently take the attitude that what the tourist doesn't know before he gets there doesn't hurt St. Petersburg. What happens to the tourist after he gets there and the impression he takes home with him seem to have escaped the boosters' notice.

The mysterious "red tide" that has killed fish up the Florida coast has posed a definite health menace to St. Petersburg on the word of Dr. Robert James of the Clearwater, Fla., Research Laboratory. He asked fo rthe declaration of a state of emergency in order to obtain federal aid in disposing of the millions of rotting carcasses. Authorities of the county and of beach communites have refused such a declaration for the second time. They are afraid that it might hurt the winter tourist business.

One wonders if the boys think they have kept word of the condition a close secret that nobody will discover. Or if they think tourist noses lose their sense of smell, and tourist bodies lose their susceptibility to disease, once they leave northern climes. Or, on the other hand, if the Floridians just don't give a darn what happens to the tourist, once they've had one chance at his purse.

Certainly it is difficult to believe that people will go back to a high priced resort if they've gone there once under a false impression.

The example set by this section of the Texas coast provides the very opposite of the Florida case. Most important of all, it is paying off right now.

Last winter millions of pounds of fish died in waters off Rockport and in the Laguna Madre because of the January freeze. It was a hard blow to the sports interests from more than one point of view. There were some who thought those millions of fish, strung out for 200 miles, could be hidden. Newsmen knew they couldn't be, that the word would go out, regardless.

So, over the vigorous protests of many well-meaning persons, they sent out pictures and stories to the news services and metropolitan newspapers. The accounts were straightforward and aimed at telling the unvarnished truth.

Results were not slow in coming. A very few persons decided not to come to the Texas coast this year, because they thought the fishing might be hurt. But others wrote the Rockport Chamber of Commerce:

"We didn't know you even had fish like that down there," was the tenor of many letters. Others simply asked if there were any fish left. Replies and follow-up news accounts, telling of the huge summer die-offs in the Laguna and how Nature, in her marvelous bounty, restored the fish each year, re-assured most.

If anyone was left unconvinced, it probably was just as well. So far from suffering, Rockport got every tourist and vacationer who could be crammed into the town from the moment the spring winds died and summer fishing

Hurricanes provide another case in point. Newspapers and publicity men in this section have freely admitted that House in Rockport, and all per- habit of regular health examinathis year may bring hurricanes, while Florida resorts have almost voted the word out of the dictionary. At the same time, the newspapers hereabouts have publicized the fact that hurricanes are well-watched, and that plenty of warning is given for each big blow. Considerable has been made of the South Texas Emergency Network, set up to provide emergency communication in time of storm.

There is every indication that frankness has again paid off. Those in contact with tourists find they prefer to know facts, rather than believing the lurid rumors and vague alarms spread by the poorly informed. The vacationers know they can safely come and safely depart.

From this section's point of view, the most important thought planted in the tourist mind is that we not only appreciate the vacation business, but that we are interested enough in getting a repeat that we will be frank and fair.

All of which brings to mind something somebody once said about honesty being the best policy.

If it's very painful for you to criticize your friends, you're safe in doing it. But if you take the slightest pleasure in it, that's the time to hold your tongue.

#### Social Security (HOW IT WORKS)

INSURANCE PAYMENTS TO SURVIVORS

This is the fifth of a series of nine articles which were prepared for our readers by H. M. Cleveland, Manager, Social Security Administration, Corpus Christi, Tex.

Certain members of a deceased workers family are eligible to receive monthly survivors insurance payments, if the worker had worked on covered jobs long enough to be insured. These survivors payments may begin with the month of death, but they must be applied for. Applications should be filed promptly after a workers death, since payments cannot be made for more than three months before they are claimed.

Survivors benefits are always based on the worker's primary insurance benefit (explained in the last article) figured from the wage record shown in his account. A widow's benefit is three-fourths the amount of her husband's and for each of the others who qualify the monthly payment is one-half of the worker's primary insurance bene-

Total monthly payments on one warker's account cannot be more than twice the primary insurance benefit or 80 per cent of the worker's average monthly wage, with the provision that in no case may the payments exceed 85 a month.

If a worker dies leaving no one who is immediately eligible for monthly benefits a single death payment may go to the widow, or if none, to the person who pays the burial expenses. This lump sum payment to a widow is six other cases it cannot exceed the funeral expenses.

As an illustration of the family insurance benefits, let's suppose an insured worker dies leaving a widow and two children under 18. If his primary insurance benefit figured \$28.60 at the time of death, say his family would get the following:

Widows monthly payment \$21.45 Child's monthly payment

(1/2 or \$14.30 for each) 28.60 Monthly total for family \$50.05 These payments would all cease when the youngest child reaches 18, but when the widow becomes by order of the Commissioners' ments for the children would not be affected.
