

Haskell Co. included in disaster declaration

Service Agency (FSA) Acting based on the U.S. Drought Executive Director James Monitor during the crop B. Douglass announced that 207 counties in Texas, including Haskell County, were declared a disaster on Jan. 9 due to drought and heat using the new, streamlined Secretarial Disaster Designation process. Under this designation, producers with operations in any of the 157 primary disaster counties or 50 contiguous disaster counties are eligible to apply for low interest emergency loans.

The streamlined disaster designation process issues a drought disaster declaration when a county has experienced a drought intensity value of at least a

year. Under this declaration 157 counties in Texas have reached that threshold since Nov. 1, 2012.

"The disaster designation is welcome relief to producers because it allows all qualified operators in primary and contiguous counties to apply for a low interest emergency (EM) loan," said Douglass.

Emergency loans help producers recover from production and physical losses due to drought, flooding and other natural disasters or quarantine.

Producers have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for emergency loan assistance. D2 (severe drought) level FSA will consider each

USDA Texas Farm for eight consecutive weeks loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. Producers can borrow up to 100 percent of actual production or physical losses, to a maximum amount of \$500,000. The current emergency loan interest rate is 2.25 percent.

> Producers with operations in counties that did not receive a disaster designation could be eligible for emergency loan assistance if they suffered at least a 30 percent loss in crop production or a physical loss to livestock, livestock products, real estate or chattel property.

Health Agency Most people are surprised to learn they have hypertension (high blood pressure). But I feel just fine!" they say, and often think that it can't be very serious as long as they don't have symptoms. Unfortunately, you can have it for years without knowing it, but all the time it is making your heart work hard and raising your chances of heart attack and stroke. For this reason, high blood

What is blood pressure?

Every time your heart beats, it pumps out about 5 ounces of blood, less than a cup. But because the blood must travel through about 12,400 miles of blood vessels, the heart pumps with a great deal of force. This produces a high pressure wave of blood through your arteries. Normally, the arteries are elastic and expand with each heart beat. When the heart relaxes between beats, the arteries also relax, and the pressure is lower.

pressure has earned the title of "The Silent Killer."

What do the numbers mean?

Blood pressure readings are always given as two numbers, for example, 120 over 82 (written as 120/82). The first number (systolic blood pressure) is always higher and measures the pressure during the heart beat. The lower second number (diastolic blood pressure) is the pressure in the arteries while the heart is relaxed. These two numbers tell much about how hard your heart is working and the condition of your blood vessels. The harder it is for blood to flow through your arteries, the higher both the systolic and the diastolic readings will be.

Senate panel holds first hearing on budget

AUSTIN-A state budget gradually will be attached to the framework provided by SB 1, the general appropriations bill authored by Tommy Williams, R-The Woodlands, chair of the Senate Finance Committee.

In a hearing spread over three days last week, the Senate Finance Committee absorbed invited testimony given by officials representing institutions of higher education, the state comptroller's office, III, D-San Benito, is much the Legislative Budget Board, the Teachers Retirement System and more.

John Heleman, chief revenue estimator with the comptroller's office, said collections from tax and non-tax revenue sources are expected to total some \$96.2 billion, minus \$3.6 billion that will go into the so-called Rainy Day Fund.

The figure Heleman gave increases to \$101.4 billion available for general-purpose spending in 2014-2015, when a projected ending balance of \$8.8 billion from the current two-year budget cycle is added.

But this is only the beginning of a long process to deliver the Legislature's most basic obligation: the budget.

Bill would reform testing

Rep. Mike Villarreal, D-San Antonio, on Jan. 23 filed legislation that would cut to four the number of assessments upon which students must achieve a cumulative passing score in order to graduate from high school. The current number of assessments that students must pass is 15.

Villarreal's HB 596 also would:

•Limit the number of school days spent on testing students;

•Cut the requirement that plants and drift into other end-of-course tests count for states, negatively affecting air 15 percent a student's final quality. grade in the course; and •End the practice of using test scores to calculate the "recognized" or "exemplary" rating of a campus.

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


