Seven Ball Teams Being Organized, First Game To Be Played April 19

County Casts 543 Votes With Sixty-Six Votes Against Issue

Four hundred and seventy-six votes were cast Saturday for the issuance of the \$45,000 bond issue for completion of the harbor at Fulton Beach. Sixty-six of the 543 votes cast were against the issuance of the bond.

The total votes polled in the four precincts were: Precinct 1, box 1—96 votes cast, with 68 for the issuance and 28 against; Precinct 1, box 2—21 votes cast, with 15 for the issuance and 6 against; Precinct 2—187 votes cast with 158 for the issuance and 28 against; Precinct 3—216 votes cast with 212 for the issuance and 4 against; Precinct 4—23 votes cast, all for the issuance of the bond.

The \$45,000 will be used to extend the breakwater at Fulton Beach north about 600 feet, build a 500 foot bulkhead across the north end, build a 600 foot bulkhead to hold a fill next to the shore from Bracht's Grocery to one block north, and build a shell drive around the bulkhead and out to the bathing beach.

The federal government has authorized the dredging of the turning basin to a depth of eight feet, making it 200 feet wide and 1,400 feet long, and the construction of a 1,000 foot protective dike on the north end of the turning basin, connecting the north end of the existing breakwater with the shore of Aransas Bay.

The government has also authorized the construction of an entrance channel eight feet deep at mean low tide and 100 feet wide, extending from the south end of the turning basin to the natural eight-foot depth of water in Aransas Bay.

The government estimated \$29,800 as the cost for this work and will set aside an annual maintenance fund of \$3,000.

The rodeo committee is also planning a bathing beauty contest to be held at 4 p.m., May 1. There will be contestants from approximately 15 towns in this contest. Each Aransas Pass merchant is sponsoring a bathing beauty, and it has been suggested that some of the Rockport merchants might like to do the same. Rockport is asked to send one or more contestants.

Aransas County Pays Final Tribute To Veteran County Judge, B. S. Fox

Aransas County citizens paid their final tribute Monday morning, to Judge B. S. Fox when they jammed the Sacred Heart Catholic Church and churchyard at 9 o'clock for the funeral services, with Rev. J. H. Kelly officiating. Burial was in the Rockport cemetery.

Judge Fox died at his home at 3:20 o'clock Friday afternoon; after a heart attack occurring three weeks ago had confined him to his home. Friday morning the Judge had visited his garden to the rear of his home to give instructions for the days' work on the care of his plants, which interest was second only to his work as county judge.

Rosaries were recited Saturday and Sunday nights at the Cage Funeral home. Active pallbearers at the funeral Monday were Chas. T. Picton, J. E. DeWitt, A. C. Bernard S. Fox was born in San Jose, Calif., in 1881. His parents came to California from Dublin, Ireland, and established

one of the first commercial nurseries in California.

Upon graduation from Santa Clara University, the Judge went to Mexico in 1902, where he worked on the Hearst Ranch until 1912. From 1912 until 1914 he was employed by the Corralitos Cattle Company. He left there in 1914 to go into the mercantile business in Casas Grandes, Mexico, where he remained until 1916. From 1916 to 1917 he served with General Pershing as interpreter and scout during the Pancho Villa uprising. After serving with Pershing he returned to the Hearst ranch as manager where he remained until 1926.

In 1926 he came to Rockport with Wm. Ferris and they started truck farming. He was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Judge Spencer, created by his death, in 1932. He was elected that same year to fill the post which he filled for 16 years until the time of his death. The Judge was an unopposed candidate for re-election.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Theresa Fox of Rockport; two sons, Richard J. Fox of Rockport and Bernard V. Fox of Mexico; two brothers, R. D., Jr., and James Fox, both of San Jose, Cal.; two sisters, Mrs. Ada Fox, San Jose Cal and Mrs. Vernon Curlin, Oakland, Cal.; and two grandchildren.

247 VOTES CAST, MARKS SECOND LARGEST VOTE CAST IN CITY ELECTIONS IN 20 YEARS

Jack Collins, owner and operator of the Del Mar Grill, was elected to the mayoralty of Rockport by a margin of 37 votes in the city election Tuesday, April 6. Of the 247 votes cast, Collins received 142 with 105 votes going for

Fred Christilles, the other candidate for mayor.

T. D. Picton received 94 votes for councilman in Ward 1. Arlie Shivers got 145 votes for councilman of ward 2; with 143 votes in Ward 2 going to John Ray. One vote was cast for W. C. Stevenson.

This year's high of 347 votes marks the second largest number of votes cast in the last 20 years. The record high was established in 1940 when 455 votes were cast for candidates for mayor, J. Ed Moore and Ed Barnard. In all but three of the last 20 years, less than 100 votes have been cast at a city election. Only 17 voted in 1931.

Mr. Collins came to Rockport from Temple, Texas in 1946, purchasing the Del-Mar Grill in October of that year, which he has been operating since that time. He was employed by the Good Year Tire and Rubber Co. in Temple prior to serving with the Army Air Corps ground forces for three years.

Danish Scientist Speaks To C. of C.

Thirty-eight members of the Rockport Chamber of Commerce and their guests met at the Fulton Cafe, Wednesday night, for their monthly dinner meeting. Dr. Paul Heegaard, Danish scientist who arrived at the marine laboratory this week, addressed the group. Dr. Heegaard outlined the work which he plans to do at the laboratory during his stay here. He explained that he is interested in the shrimp in their larvae stage and providing that he can find a sufficient number of them in the Gulf at this stage, he will study them here at the laboratory. He pointed out that if conditions make it possible for the work to be carried out, it will prove of value to the commercial fishermen, in that it will result in a means of predicting the catch to be expected from one year to the next.

Hugh Morrison reported that he is coming along nicely with donations for the Chamber sponsored luncheon scheduled for April 14, which will be given for guests during the marine laboratory attending the dedication at that time. President Sorenson invited all members of the Chamber who are interested in attending. Mr. Morrison pointed out that at the first meeting which he attended 10 years ago this month, one of the objectives outlined was the obtaining of such a marine laboratory for Rockport. But he stated that the lab as it stands now is far more than the chamber had hoped for or dreamed of at that time and that Rockport is justly proud of it.

It was suggested that the next project for the Chamber might be the placing of street markers and house numbers. It will be taken up at the directors meeting to be held Wednesday at the Fire Hall.

DeWilton Jeffries announced that the playground equipment consisting of one merry-go-round, one all metal stainless steel slide and a swing set accommodating four had been ordered and delivery should be June 30. In the meantime the Chamber will see that one and possibly two shuffle boards are placed on the triangle and the ground made ready for use this summer.

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Rockport Pirates Win 73-B Track Meet; Orange Grove Finishes Second

Rockport squeezed out a victory over Orange Grove in the District 73-B track and field meet at Odem Saturday, where eight records were rewritten, one was tied and another was established in a new event, the 220-yard dash.

Rockport took a commanding lead in earlier events and then staved off a strong Orange Grove bid to win the meet captured last year by Woodsboro. Rockport tallied 36 points to 34 for Orange Grove.

Bishop, 24, Calallen, 21½, Ingleside, 13, Woodsboro, 11, Sundeen, 7, Flour Bluff, 4, and Odem, 3½, trailed.

In the junior division, Woodsboro swept to victory with 14 points. Flour Bluff, Tuloso-Midway, and Ingleside were tied with eight points each. Rockport 5, Gregory, 4; Calallen, 3; Violet, 2; Petronila, 2; and Orange Grove, 1, followed.

Two records were shattered in the preliminary events when Jimmy Jones skipped the 120-high hurdles in 16.4 seconds and Orange Grove blotted the old record with a mark of 47 seconds.

Melvin Smith, husky Orange Grove combination track and field man hogged scoring honors for the day with 14½ points.

Gene Wilson, Bishop speedster, checked in with 11½ points. V. J. Schulte, Orange Grove, had 10½ points.

Truman Proclaims Health Nursing Week, April 11-17

The State of Texas is planning to observe national "Public Health Nursing Week" April 11-17, as proclaimed by President Harry S. Truman. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges high school graduates to consider public health nursing as a career.

"Public health nursing offers young women opportunities for life-time careers which are highly useful and satisfactory. The demand for professional nurses now exceeds the supply in public health and other fields of work," Dr. Cox said. "Possibilities of travel, worthwhile service, income, and other features of the nursing profession compare very favorably with those open to women in other careers."

Education for nursing is available in 33 schools in Texas and enrollment is now under way for fall classes, which open about September 1. All schools still have vacancies. Applicants should be graduates of high school or have some college credit, with a record of good scholastic standing, be in good physical condition, and of high moral character. An interest in people and their problems, also ability to work well with one's hands is necessary.

Details regarding nursing education can be secured from hospitals, physicians, nurses' organizations and local health departments, as well as the Texas State Department of Health.

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Read Labels On Drugs Before Taking Them

"To much emphasis cannot be placed upon the need for reading labels on drugs and medicines before taking them," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "Frequent reports are received of accidents, some of them fatal, affecting people who have formed the hazardous habit of taking medicines without carefully reading the labels."

Equally dangerous is the habit of taking medicine after the directions on the label have become obliterated, which many people do, thinking that they can remember what the bottle contained. Reaching for a bottle and taking medicine in the dark is another dangerous practice. It is important to remember that the law requires labels to be attached to drugs and medicines in order to protect the public.

Dr. Cox urges people to follow the simple rule of reading the label before using anything from a carton or bottle, either as food or as medicine. In brief, his advice to the public is: "Be sure you know what you are taking, and when in doubt, DON'T TAKE IT."

Local Boy P.O.W. Where Officer Plead Guilty

A former Japanese Army lieutenant pled guilty to charges involving command responsibility for the beating and abuse of allied prisoners of War and was sentenced to four years imprisonment at hard labor by a Yokohama Eighth Army Military Commission, March 24. Pfc. S. L. Baker of Rockport, Texas, was held captive as prisoner of war at the same camp where the accused was stationed.

The accused, Tsuneo Ishikawa, stated at the trial that he had read and understood the charge and specifications against him and that although he did not personally commit any of the violations, his subordinates had done so. He therefore pleaded guilty, accepting responsibility for the atrocities committed by his subordinates.

Many severe beatings were meted out to prisoners at the Naetsu Camp by personnel under Ishikawa and on at least two occasions prisoners were beaten into insensibility, even though one of the men was sick.

Among the Japanese personnel named in the specifications against Ishikawa as having committed atrocities were Hiroaki Kono, the camp interpreter, and Yuzu Aoki, medical sergeant at the camp. In a previous Yokohama trial Aoki has been sentenced to death by hanging, while Kono received a sentence of life imprisonment at hard labor.

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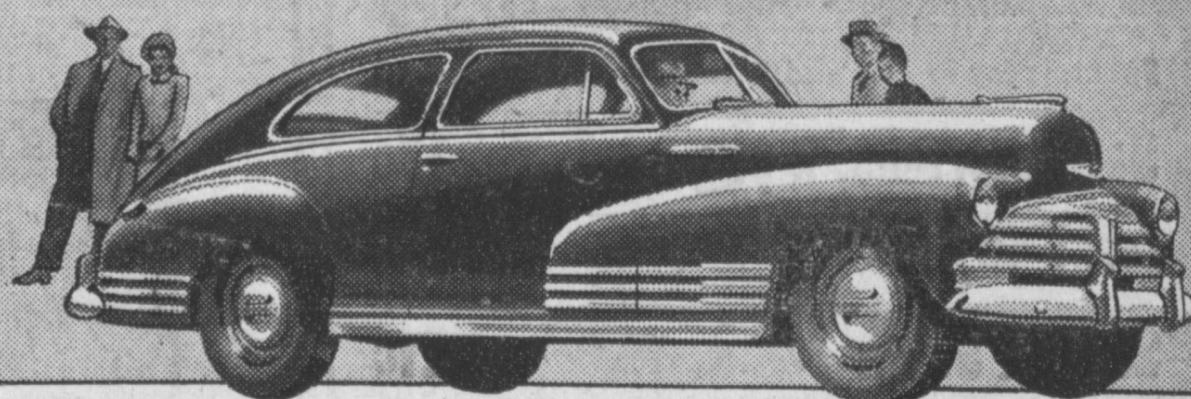

Positions To Be Filled In Dept. Public Welfare

Gardiner pointed out that application to take an examination must be made on an official application blank, which may be obtained by writing the Merit System Council, 808 Tribune Building, Austin, Texas, or from the Employment Commission and Department of Public Welfare local offices located throughout the State. "The closing date for submission of applications is April 24, 1948, and applications post-marked after midnight on the closing date will not be considered," he added.

Gardiner also stated that these examinations present to people the opportunity for permanent employment with the Texas Employment Commission and the State Department of Public Welfare.
