A post office opened in Fulton Wednesday, June 16, with Mrs. Lorraine Jones as acting postmistress. The office is located in the Fulton Red and White Grocery Store.

Only general delivery service will be available for the present, but boxes will be installed later. The present schedule for delivery will remain in effect which consists of six round trips a week. There will be no service on Sundays or holidays. However, the new office will enable the residents of Fulton to obtain money orders and stamps without coming to Rockport or stopping the rural mail carrier.

The office has a fourth class rating.

More Planes Use County Airport

M. G. Taylor, manager of the Aransas County Airport, reports that more planes have been using the airport during the past month than ever before. The summer months are the heavy months except for the hunting season.

Apparently many of the patrons of the airport are fishermen, as Mr. Taylor says the traffic is greater when the fishing is good.

An average of 50 planes come into the airport each week. They come largely from adjoining states and points in Texas.

Mr. Taylor is on the job at all times. A new home is being completed on the airport for the manager and will be ready for occupancy within the next two weeks.

The manager will keep a roster of all incoming and outgoing planes. 80 and 91 octane gasoline is available for the planes. At the present only the local taxi provides transportation to and from the airport.

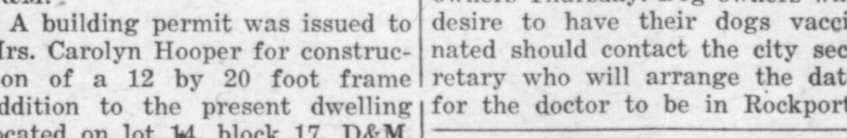

Two More Houses Moved to Rockport

B. T. Duncan was issued a moving permit to bring in a house from Ingleside for Henry Schmidt. The house, 29 by 36 foot frame dwelling, was moved to lot 10, block 16, D&M.

B. T. Duncan also obtained a moving permit for Mr. Schmidt to move a 20 by 30 foot dwelling from Ingleside to lot 3, block 16, D&M.

A building permit was issued to Mrs. Carolyn Hooper for construction of a 12 by 20 foot frame addition to the present dwelling located on lot 14, block 17, D&M, at a cost of approximately \$300.

Leonard LeBlanc was granted a permit to construct a frame and galvanized iron and sheeting warehouse. The addition will be a 24 by 32 foot building north of the present building on the Railroad Reserve, D&M, and will cost approximately \$700.

Walter Henshaw to Build Timber Wharf

Walter Henshaw proposes to construct a timber T-head wharf in Aransas Bay, on the west shore, within the city limits of Rockport.

The proposed wharf, 8 feet wide and 1184 feet long, with the T-head portion 12 feet wide and 16 feet long, would extend bayward approximately 1175 feet from the mean low tide shore line and perpendicular to Bay Street in the city at a location opposite lot 2 of block 26. The proposed wharf would have a deck elevation of 6.5 feet above mean low tide.

Atlantic No. 2 Gas, Oil Ratio Is 1115 to 1

Atlantic No. 2 State Tract 71, in the Fulton Beach Field and in the bay was completed during the past week at 7124 to 7129 feet. On a recent test on a 7/64 inch choke, made at the rate of 135 barrels for a 24 hour test run, with 1185 pounds of pressure on tubing, the gas oil ratio was 1115 to 1.

Wm. Herbert Hunt Trust Estate Graham has moved the rig from the Atlantic location on to the Spencer Kent Crane No. 6 and expect to spud in Friday night. Drilling of this well was deferred some 90 days ago awaiting field rules pertaining to spacing, hearing for which is scheduled for July 2.

Sullivan Garnet No. 1 George E. Shelley, located just east of the Lamar townsite, set 7 inch casing at 7600 feet and last week perforated 7430 to 7435 and on drill stem test where the tool was left open 40 minutes, recovered 1,200 feet of oil and 5,300 feet of salt water and cut mud with a built up pressure of 8 pounds. Operators then squeezed attempts to shut off salt water. Indications are that this is an edge well and shooting material indicates that the main structure lies to the north.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Copano, 9 miles northeast of Rockport, is setting 2,500 feet of 10 inch surface casing.

The Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 V. G. Gwynn, Salt Lake test, four miles northwest of Rockport is rigging up. Al Buchanan is the contractor on the test, scheduled for 10,500 feet.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 9 St. Charles Ranch, 20 miles south of Austwell, was drilling at 7,373 feet Friday.

The Stanolind Oil and Gas Co. have made a location on state tract 70, which is a 600 foot offshore from the Spencer Crane No. 8, and expect to begin operations immediately.

Trench Provides For Trash At City Dump

A bulldozer has been at work on the city dump this week. The trash which has been scattered over the lot until the road into the dump was block, has been piled in a trench. Another trench has been dug to facilitate the dumping of garbage in the future. A road is being provided to allow cars to get into the grounds.

The city officials have asked that the public use the trench provided for future dumping. There is a city ordinance prohibiting the dumping of refuse along the roadway as has been done in the past. If this is done in the future the ordinance will be enforced.

Mrs. F. B. Hunt was elected president of the Womens Civic Club Tuesday afternoon when 27 women met at the fire hall to organize a club for women. Other officers named were Mrs. J. Ed Moore, first vice-president; Mrs. Roy V. Rogero, second vice-president; Mrs. Bryon Baker, Jr., secretary; and Mrs. Chas. Roe, Sr., treasurer.

Raise In School Tax Rate Voted

The election to raise the school tax rate from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per \$100 tax valuation was passed 69 to 15, according to Mrs. A. L. Brundrett, judge in charge of the election, held at the school house Saturday, June 12. Mrs. Brundrett was assisted by Mrs. T. H. Ratliff and Miss Floy Kennedy.

Property now valued at \$1,000 has taxes assessed in the amount of \$15. This is an increase of \$2.75 over the previous rate of \$1.25 per hundred.

According to the members of the school board of the Rockport Independent School District, the \$4,800 which the additional tax levy of 25 cents will bring in, the schools can be maintained at the present standard.

Phillips to Barge Cuttings to Shore

Phillips Petroleum Co. will set a precedent when they start drilling in Copano Bay on State Tract 34. All cuttings will be barged ashore. Nothing will be placed in the bay. The Loyd Richardson Co. in Aransas Pass will be in charge of the towing.

The Game, Fish and Oyster Commission is making every effort to see that nothing is being placed in the bay that would pollute it.

Recently on the suggestion of County Attorney Weldon Cabaniss cuttings being placed in the bay waters from oil wells being drilled were chemically analyzed. It was found that the small amount of mud which reached the bay with the cuttings contained small amounts of chemicals. The small amount now reaching the bay from one or two wells is not destructive but should the number of wells being drilled at one time, increase, the destructive properties would increase. An attempt is being made to have all mud and cuttings from the wells placed on the shore.

Fines Paid For Pollution Cases

Butcher Arthur Co., of Houston, have paid a \$200 fine, which settled a charge filed against the captains of two of their tugs in April.

The law enforcing division of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission filed charges against the captains of two barges leaking oil, which were being operated up and down the intracoastal canal in April. The tug belonged to the Butcher Arthur Corporation who have paid the fine.

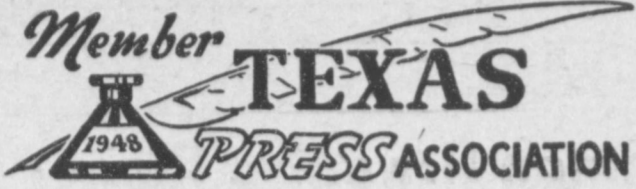

Aransas County Women Organize

The women of Aransas County have taken the initial step toward establishing a civic building in the area for public use.

The need of such a building, which would provide a recreation hall, kitchen and dining room, has long been recognized. This need was in evidence again Tuesday when 27 women crowded the fire hall and found that other meeting quarters would have to be arranged for to accommodate the membership.

The last community center in Rockport which was available to the public was established by an active Red Cross chapter which was working in the county after the first World War. This community hall served as a meeting place for the various organizations for several years. However the need for facilities has now gone beyond that of a building equipped only with chairs, piano and stage.

Such organizations as the Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce have difficulty in establishing headquarters sufficient to serve their membership regularly at their dinner meetings.

The forming of the womens club which took place Tuesday, has been the first organized effort to do anything about the situation. It goes without saying that a great deal of effort on the part of each member will be required to put over the project. And the women will need each man in the county strong behind them.

However, since it is a project that each man, woman and child in the community will benefit from, the project will not lack for enthusiasm.

Each woman at the meeting Tuesday was asked to bring a friend to the next meeting. All sections of the county were represented at the first meeting. Those at the meeting Tuesday, June 22, will be the charter members of the organization and it is hoped that there will be 100 women present to back the project.

Every woman in the county is needed and is cordially invited.

Busy and successful business executive, Wiley Akins finds time for the duties of good citizenship. He is on the Baylor University board of trustees, was chairman of the board of deacons of his church for five years, makes frequent speeches on "the training of youth" through 4-H Clubs and Future Farmers of America and is an honorary member of the FFA, an honor bestowed by the boys themselves in recognition of outstanding service.

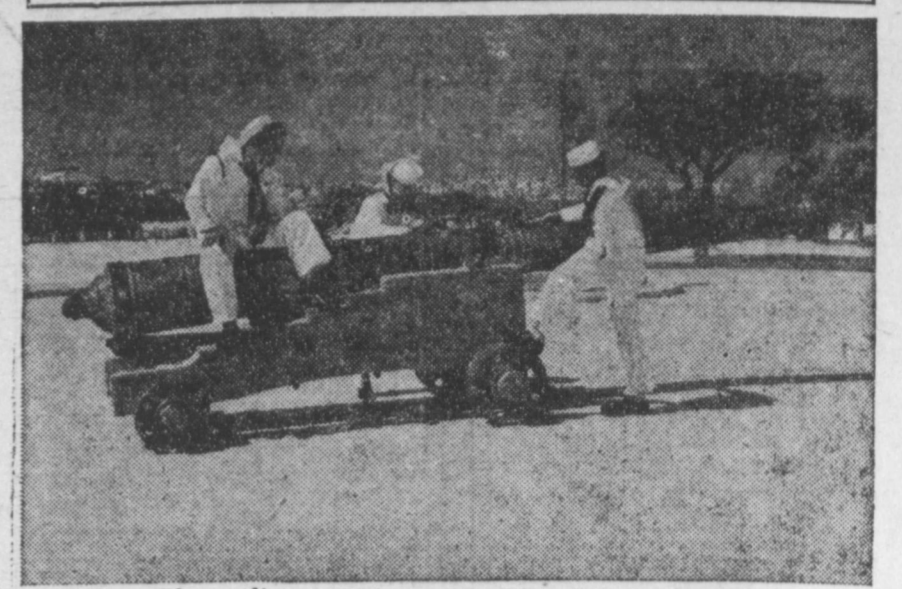

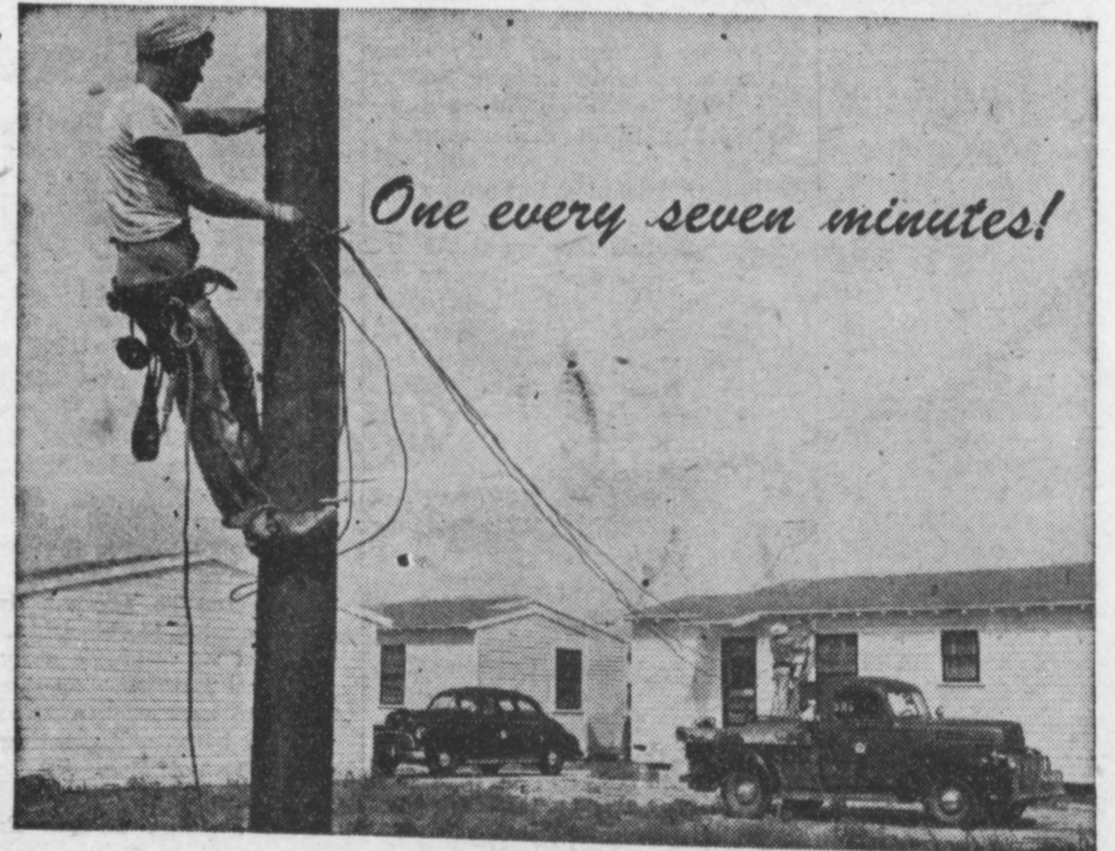

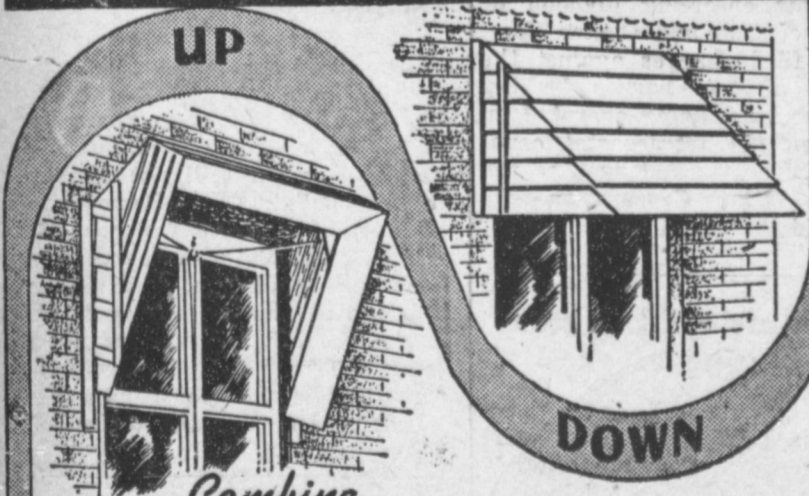

Hot Weather Causes Loss Of Body Salt

AUSTIN (Spl.)—There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse—chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Cox. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much

as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farmers, and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps.

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fag.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the same purpose.

Goose Island Park Draws Campers And Picnickers To Its Picturesque Woodland And Seashore By Hundreds

Goose Island State Park is drawing tourists by the hundreds as well as picnickers from Aransas County to its picturesque woodland and seashore located 10 miles up the coast from Rockport.

The Goose Island park offers everything the man or family, wanting to forget the city and civilization for a day, might desire. There bathing and fishing are at their best. Back of a long sand beach the big woods start, casting a mesh shade over the roadways and inviting relaxation and repose. A carpet of wild green grass, covered by oak leaves that have been falling and blowing for centuries, perhaps, add to the invitation for peace and quiet that only nature gives and man never has been able to reproduce.

Winding natural shell roads take the public to protected waterfront picnic facilities for the one-day of overnight vacationist.

There are ten picnic units, with thatched roofs that protect against the blazing gulf sun and allow for vacationists to enjoy the cooling breezes of the water. Two of the units are so constructed as to provide concrete floors for the cots of overnight visitors. There are tables in each and water from a well on the mainland has been piped to convenient spots for drinking and cooking purposes.

Tiny Goose Island, formerly inaccessible to automobiles, was converted into a State Park by CCC detachment in 1934, providing for the convenience of visitors, while none of the wild natural beauty of the place was destroyed. It took approximately 200 CCC volunteers one year to complete the project.

A shell road, wide enough for two cars to pass, leads from one end of the island to the other. The entrance to the camp on the mainland stands directly on the site of the once proposed city of Lamar, designated in 1854 to become the port and metropolis of the Texas coast. For varied reasons plans to build a city there did not materialize and until the arrival of the CCC boys the spot was only another part of a generally supposed wild stretch.

The island itself calls for several leisure hours, but it is the mainland, with its Big Tree and constant shade of other trees that beckons stronger still. The Big Tree, grotesquely beautiful, has been fenced off to prevent destructive individuals from building

damaging fires in its spreading limbs which reach approximately fifty feet in every direction from its gnarled and massive trunk.

The caretaker's lodge on the outer edge of the woods, which one passes on the way to the island and again into the shady forest, provides the connecting link between nature and man. The building provides a place where one may have lunch if he wishes, buy tobacco, or other little necessities and luxuries. There is a large long lobby room with fireplace centering one side. It is equipped with a juke box for dancing, which makes it a popular place both in winter and summer.

Like similar parks constructed through the state, the land has been leased free to the state for a ninety-nine year lease, and the park will remain under the supervision of the state and national park boards.

File A Claim At Age 65 When You Are Laid Off

Some firms in this area have gone back to pre-war practice of retiring their older workers. In such a case where a worker has passed age 65, he should file an application for retirement insurance payments soon after he is laid off, according to H. M. Cleveland, Manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

"Since a prudent man safeguards his possessions, one who has reached age 65 should find out about his social security payments, even if he is only temporarily out of a job," Cleveland advised.

"Of course, the Social Security Retirement insurance payments cannot be paid for months in which an employee works if he earns more than \$14.99 a month on social security jobs. But the payments will be paid to insured workers over age 65 who file applications for this insurance for those months in which they do not work, even though they expect to go back to work later on," he added.

Cleveland invites all workers who believe they may qualify for the retirement insurance to call or write to his office and find out exactly how they stand. The address is: Social Security Administration, 425 Wilson Building, Corpus Christi, Texas.

State Association Reports Shortage Of Teachers and Crowded Classrooms

AUSTIN, (Spl.) — Conditions improved slightly this year, but nearly half of the 1,500,000 public school children in Texas are still being taught in badly over-crowded classrooms.

A survey announced today by the Texas State Teachers Association indicates that 46.7 per cent of the children are getting inadequate educations due to a shortage of teachers and buildings.

Many schools, among them larger cities such as Amarillo, Corpus Christi and Galveston, are on a half-day schedule so acute is the situation, according to Joe Humphrey of Abilene, vice-president of the Teachers Association.

Thirty pupils is the maximum class for efficient teaching, the National Education Association and other organizations agree.

Classes with as many as sixty-five pupils were found in a survey which was conducted by Miss Willie Mae Floyd of Abilene, Texas representative on the NEA advisory committee on tax education and school finance.

Elementary schools are more badly in need of additional space and teachers than are junior and senior high schools, the Floyd survey disclosed.

A total of 58.7 per cent of the grade school pupils included in the survey are in classes of more than thirty pupils. Exactly half of the junior high pupils are over-crowded. The senior high schools have 32.9 of their students in over-sized classes.

"All educators recognize the fact that it is impossible for pupils to get the attention they need and adequate instruction in classes of more than thirty students.

"Large classes rob children of part of their American heritage, the right to obtain a thorough education."

Humphrey said some way must be found to interest more young people in preparing for a teaching career.

"Even with the increase in pay granted teachers by the last legislature, the inducements to enter the profession apparently are not sufficient," he declared.

"Our colleges are not training enough teachers to take care of the usual replacement needs, let alone add to our staffs."

Humphrey also said many schools do not have enough money to construct additional or new buildings.

"Others have voted bonds, but are reluctant to build during these times of high costs, when they can get only about half as much for their money," Humphrey said.

LIVE STOCK SHIPMENTS GAIN IN APRIL

AUSTIN, (Spl.) — Livestock shipments from Texas stations gained 19 per cent to 12,390 carloads in April, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Cattle shipments, totaling 10,001 carloads, jumped 64 per cent, for the only March-to-April rise. Movements of hogs fell 50 per cent; calves, 47 per cent; and sheep, 23 per cent.

Compared to April 1947, livestock shipments are up 5 per cent. Hog shipments stepped up 32 per cent; sheep, 18 per cent; and cattle and calves, 2 per cent.

ELECTRIC POWER CONSUMPTION RISES

AUSTIN, (Spl.)—Electric power consumption in Texas rose 4 per cent from March to April to 16 per cent above year-ago levels, the University of Texas Bureau of Research reported.

Industrial consumption gained 7 per cent in April; "other", 5 per cent; and commercial, 4 per cent. Residential consumption declined 3 per cent, however.

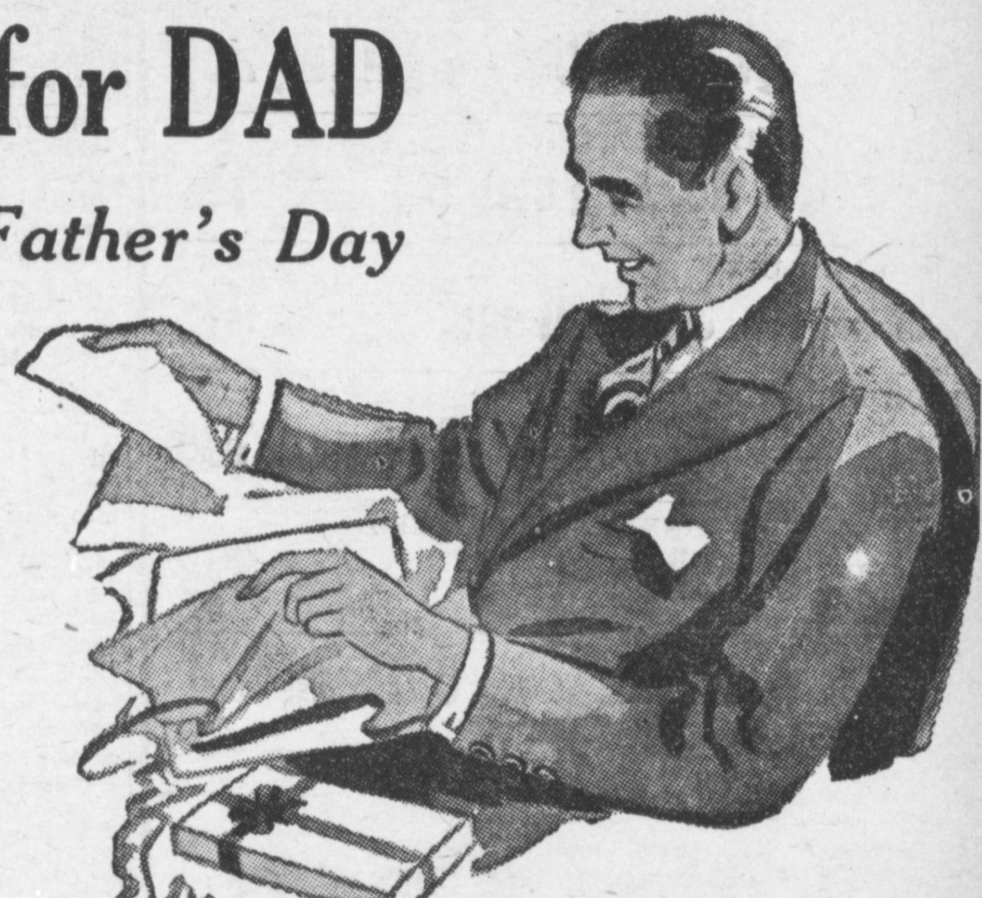

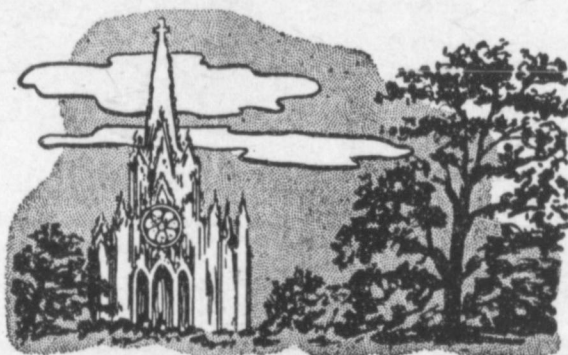

TIDELANDS MEASURE GOES TO SENATE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Legislation to give the coastal states outright ownership of oil-rich lands under their so-called marginal seas was approved by the senate judiciary committee Thursday.

The bill was sent to the full senate by a 6-to-5 vote. Senators Kilgore, Democrat, West Virginia, and Magnuson, Democrat, Washington, did not vote. Magnuson is out of town.

The bill, similar to one passed by the house, is on the Republican policy committee's list of "desirable" measures. No specific time has been set for its consideration in the senate.

The measure would vest in the coastal states clear-cut title to the submerged land in a three-mile belt behind the low-tide line.

The supreme court held last year that California does not own the land under her marginal sea. Sponsors of the bill contend this decision upset all previous precedents.—Houston Chronicle.
