It looks to us like the cleavage between political parties will be along the lines of moral issues in the future. We are glad to see this progress.

The Dallas News will begin publishing an evening paper on April first. The whole press of the state are looking forward to this enterprise as a boon to them. The publishers, A. H. Belo & Co., will give Texas a cheap and excellent journal.

The best element of both the old parties have at times been dominated by overwhelming numbers of reactionaries. The tendency is toward a cleavage between the grafting, lawless element and the better class of voters. This will be good for the country, and better men will be elected to office. There is a

large class of men in this country bordering on anarchy and the tendency is for them to get into a party to themselves. They can not do the harm in a party to themselves they can do by holding the balance of power in one of the leading parties. The political situation is interesting to the close observer and student of current conditions.

Wheat and oats that have been pastured is being double harrowed in Central Texas. The stock was taken off about three weeks ago. Good farmers always harrow their grain after having packed the ground with pasturing.

Gov. Colquitt has offered \$1,000.00 reward for the slayers of Clemente Vergara. The Washington authorities are afraid the reward will induce someone to violate the law by kidnapping the murderers, and bring about international complications. Gov. Colquitt says he is not concerned by Washington's troubles.

We don't take any stock in the one idea talk. Ball will be a business Governor. If Ousley is the man you may depend on it he will do his best to give Texas a business administration, and no one can question Jim Ferguson's intentions to give Texas an all around administration if he lands. Elimination has done a lot of good anyway you take it.

The heavy pro majorities are furnished by the rural districts. If the Farmers Union follow Peter Radford, it may have the effect of cutting into the pro majorities. If the campaign the anti made against the pros sticks on their constituency, a big lot of anti will vote for Ferguson and against the nominees of the two Fort Worth conventions. It will be an even chance for Ball, Ferguson and Ousley.

The Free Press does not want to be partisan, but we like to give expression to what we think the political situation shows to be. We are not partisans, though we have the deepest convictions. We always try to be fair, and address the intelligence of our readers, and not their prejudices, if any of them have any prejudice. We have little respect for that class of journals that appeal to the prejudices of ignorant people.

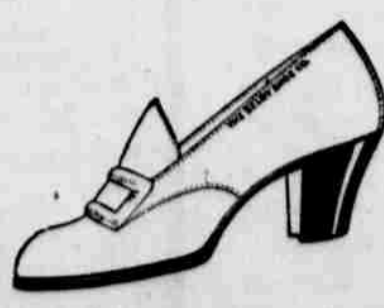
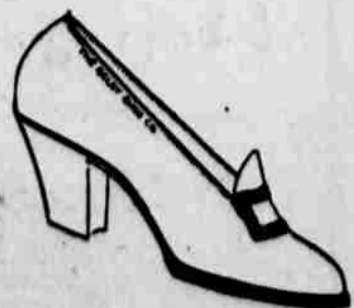
