

## Democratic Primary Run-off To Be Held Saturday

### Two Candidates In County Judge Race Claim Spotlight

PRECINCT 2 WILL NAME COMMISSIONER  
PRECINCTS 1 AND 2 TO CHOOSE CONSTABLE

Aransas County voters will go to the polls Saturday, August 28, to name the next County Judge, County Commissioner from Precinct 2, Constable from Precincts 1 and 2, and to vote for State Senator.

The polls will be open from 8 o'clock Saturday morning until 7 o'clock in the evening. Polling places will be open in each precinct. Their locations are listed as follows:

Aransas Pass, Precinct 1, Box 2—Sportsman Court with Joe Kring as Judge.

Rockport, Precinct 1—City Hall with Mrs. Alvin Brundrett as Judge.

Rockport, Precinct 2—Court-house with Supt. J. F. Harbin as Judge.

Fulton, Precinct 3—School house with W. J. Moss as Judge.

Lamar, Precinct 4—Concession hall at Goose Island State Park with Green Fleming as Judge.

Johnnie D. Wendell and Reid Simmons are the candidates in the run-off for County Judge. The final count in the Democratic Primary held in July gave Wendell 623 of the 1287 votes cast. Simmons received 345 votes to place him in the run-off, with 319 going to the late J. Ed Moore.

J. M. Sparks, Jr. and Fred M. Hunt will seek election to the office of County Commissioner from Precinct 2. Two candidates for the office were eliminated in the July election. Mr. Sparks is seeking re-election to the office, while this the first time for Mr. Hunt to seek election to a public office.

G. M. Harrell and D. E. Hollewell are candidates in the run-off for the office of constable in Precincts 1 and 2.

Coke Stevenson and Lyndon Johnson are candidates in the race for a seat in the U. S. Senate. Coke Stevenson carried Aransas County as well as the State in the July election. Johnson received the second largest vote with 11 contenders for the office.

### Monday Busy Day For Firemen

Members of the Fire Department had a busy afternoon Monday. About 2 o'clock they were called to the home of Mrs. W. N. Hooper on the beach road to extinguish a fire which started in the brush by the back fence and spread to a wood pile between the fence and the servants quarters. The fire was put out in a short time with no damage done to buildings but the fence was burned in places.

By the time the men were back at work, a second alarm called them to a somewhat larger blaze which was gaining momentum in brush out on the Sparks Colony road across from the home of Guy Barber. The men fought the blaze from 3 o'clock until 7. By this time a path had been burned from the Colony road over to Copano where the high line goes through. Plowed up dirt along the right of way helped to stop the blaze.

The fire fighting was plain hard work as only one of the trucks could get to the fire and it only part of the way, due to the fact it bogged down in the sand. The men had to resort to beating it out with wet sacks, and the alarm rang three times to get enough men out to handle this long, tedious job. No homes were endangered by the fires.

The election will be held at the City Hall. Presiding officer is Mrs. Alvin Brundrett. Clerks will be Mrs. Fred Diederich, Miss Floy Kennedy and Miss Violet Percival. The polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m.

### Registration Time Scheduled For Rockport Schools

Fulton School Starts Wednesday, Sept. 1

Superintendent J. F. Harbin has released the schedule for registration of grade and high school students, which will take place Thursday and Friday, September 2 and 3.

Grades one through five will meet in the school auditorium at 9 o'clock Thursday morning for orientation and will go from there to their respective rooms to register.

Juniors and seniors will convene in the auditorium at 9:15 Thursday morning, after which they will register for classes.

Friday, the sixth, seventh and eighth grades will meet in the auditorium at 9 o'clock, after which they will report in their respective rooms for registration.

Freshmen and sophomores will go to the auditorium at 9:15 Friday and the short meeting will be followed by registration.

Buses will run both days to take students to register. They will run at 8:30 in order to get students to the school by 9.

The faculty will meet Wednesday, September 1, at 9 o'clock.

Classes at the Fulton school will begin Wednesday, September 1. Mrs. C. O. Lowry will have the fourth, fifth and sixth grades and Mrs. Golda James will teach the first, second and third grades.

Supt. Harbin reports that the Rockport school grounds have been cleaned and that several loads of black dirt have been hauled and the grounds leveled. However, there are still many grass burrs over the grounds and it has been suggested that youngsters be prepared to avoid them by wearing shoes.

Repair work is being done on the school buses to get them ready for the school term.

### Nearly 400 Attend Health Clinic

About 400 persons took advantage of the typhoid shots and small pox vaccinations offered by the Free Protective Clinic sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association held here Wednesday. Thirty-eight persons obtained small pox vaccinations, which was about twice as many as were expected due to the large number that received the vaccination last year. Many received the initial typhoid shot with the intentions of returning to their family doctor for the other two shots.

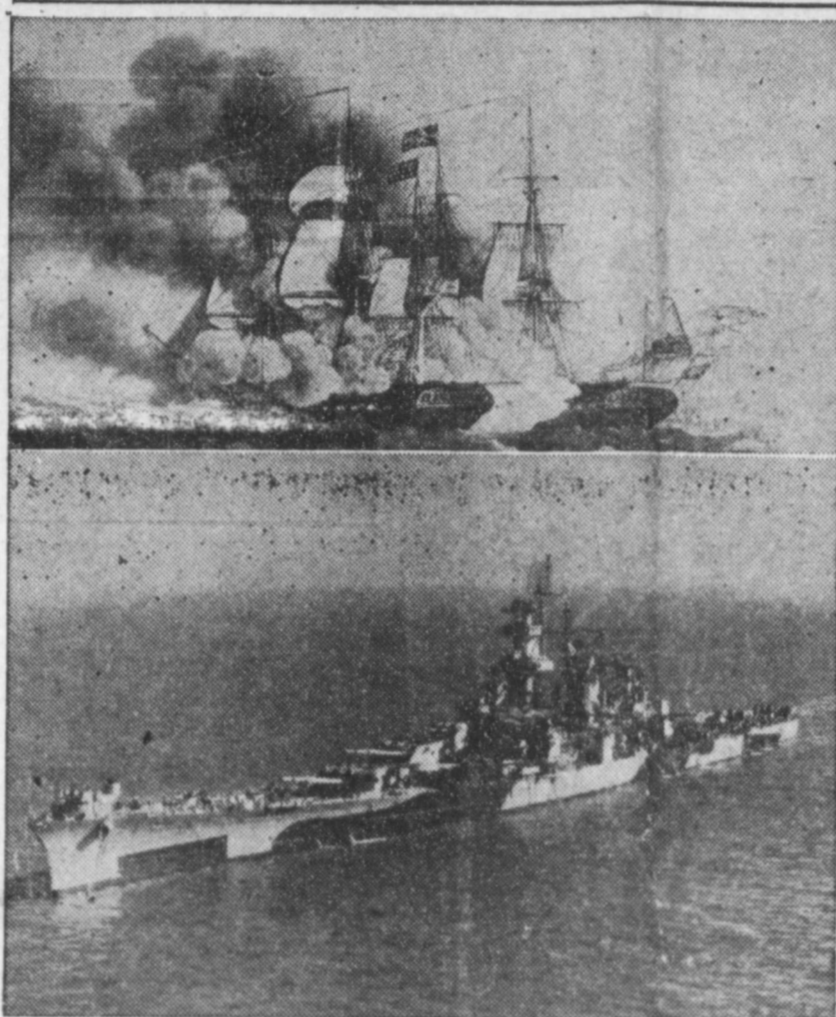
Out of the 700 persons who received the typhoid series last year, close to 300 failed to show up for the booster shot. The vaccine is still available and can be obtained free of charge from the local family physician. However, it will be necessary that those who come for the shot to pay the doctor for his services.

Mrs. Simon Lee Sorenson, chairman of the social hygiene unit in the P.T.A., stated that with the cooperation of the doctors, nurses, and mothers the Association feels that they have had another successful clinic this year.

### Council Asked to Relieve Low Water Pressure Problem

Six home owners living in the Hunter subdivision met with the city council Tuesday night to discuss the lack of water pressure in their section of town.

Due to the congestion along the line going to the subdivision, there are about 15 homes, the pressure is low during the day and between 4 and 7 p.m. there is practically no water at all during the summer months. The men came to the council to see if anything could be done to remedy the situation.

The city officials pointed out that pipe has been on order since March and should have been delivered the first of June. However, it has not arrived. The council informed them that every effort would be made to obtain enough pipe to complete the line from the Catholic church to their homes as soon as possible. The laying of this new line would relieve the congestion which has resulted on the other one.

### Col. Davis Tells Draftees To Come Early, Not Late

Col. C. M. Davis, in charge of selective service in Aransas County, has stated that boys in the 18 to 25 age group who will be required to register can come into the office and register at any time between August 30 and September 18, as long as he precedes the date set by law.

Colonel Davis believes that it will be more convenient for some to register earlier than the date scheduled and if the man scheduled to register the 14th, comes in the 10th, he will be taken care of. The Colonel says the important thing is that all the men in this age group get registered and if they are a day early, as long as they register between August 30 and September 18, the forms will be filled in. While the young men will be allowed to register prior to the date assigned for them according to birth dates, they are not supposed to come late for registration.

### V. F. W. Officers to Handle Emergency Service Cases

Chester Johnson, post commander of the Stewart-Wendell V.F.W. Post, met with the County Commissioners last Friday to discuss the successor to the office of veterans county service officer. The office was left vacant last week upon the death of F. C. Simpsn.

It is the policy of the court to take recommendations of the veterans organization before action is taken. Mr. Johnson reported that the veterans had no recommendations at this time.

However, Bill Gray and Mr. Johnson have agreed to take care of emergency cases until the time when another service officer is appointed.

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### UNCLE SAM'S SELECTIVE SERVICE

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Below is one installment of a series of questions and answers on the second peacetime military training program. It has been prepared under the direction of the Texas Director of Selective Service, Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry)

Q. Who must register under the Selective Service law?

A. All male citizens of the U.S. and every other male person residing in the U. S. who on the days fixed for their registration are between the ages of 18 and 26 must register unless they are specifically exempted by law.

Q. Suppose a registrant is away from home on his registration day. What procedure does he follow?

A. Some registrants, such as college men, traveling men, and business men, will be away from home on the day they should register. Their registration cards will be forwarded to the proper places.

Q. Suppose a registrant is sick on his registration day. What should he do?

A. He should register with his local board just as soon as he is able to do so.

Q. Suppose a man is married or suffers from some physical ailment which would make it impossible for him to perform military service. Does he have to register?

A. Yes. All males between the ages of 18 and 26, regardless of physical handicaps or conditions of dependency, must register on their appointed days.

Q. Can a man register late without being penalized?

A. Only if he can produce sufficient evidence to justify his failure to register on time.

Q. What is the penalty for failure to register?

A. Imprisonment up to five years and fine up to \$10,000, or both, is provided for conviction of violation of provisions of the Selective Service Act. Conviction of violation of industrial provisions is punishable by higher fines.

Q. Who is exempt from registration?

A. Members of the armed forces on active duty, including members of the Coast and Geodetic Survey and the Public Health Service; cadets of the U. S. Military Academy and Coast Guard Academy; midshipmen, U. S. Naval Academy, also foreign diplomatic consular representatives and members of their families.

Q. What exactly will the man who registers have to do on the date set for his registration?

A. He will report to the nearest registration point set up by his local board between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. to answer questions on a registration form which will be asked by registration officials.

Q. How long will this registration take?

A. About 10 minutes usually.

Q. What questions will be asked?

A. Questions as to name, age, mail address, telephone number, employer's name and address, place and date of birth, citizenship, name of a close relative.

Q. Is a physical description required on the registration blank?

A. Yes. Race, height, build, color of eyes and hair, complexion, and obvious physical defects will be noted.

Q. Will the registrant swear to his answers?

A. Yes. After the form is filled in, the registrar will read the answers back to the registrant; he will then sign the form with the declaration that his answers are true. The registrar will sign the form also.

Q. What proof will the individual have that he has registered?

A. After the form is filled in, each registrant will be given a certificate showing that he already has registered.

Q. Will it be necessary to keep these registration certificates?

A. Yes. The certificates must be carried at all times.

Q. Will it be the duty of all registrants to keep their local boards informed of changes of address and status?

A. Yes. If he changes his address, it must be reported. If his status, for example, changes from that of a single man to married man, that fact must be reported.

### Regulations On Consumer Credit Effective Sept. 20

The Federal Reserve System has issued regulations on consumer installment credit which become effective September 20, 1948. The regulations cover installment sales of and loans for 12 kinds of consumers' durable goods, providing the cost is more than \$50. It also covers installment loans for most other consumer purposes. Installment credits, up to \$5,000 are subject to the regulation.

The goods for which down payments are prescribed are as follows: 33 1/3 down payment on automobiles and 20 per cent down payment on the following articles, cooking stoves, dishwashers, ironers, refrigerators, washing machines, combination units incorporating these five items, air conditioners (room unit), radio and tele-

vision sets, phonographs, sewing machines, suction cleaners, furniture and soft-surface floor coverings.

Maturities on all installment credits subject to the regulation, whether to finance the purchase of these articles or not, must come within the following requirements: Credit not exceeding \$1,000 has a maximum maturity of 15 months. Credit above \$1,000, except that monthly payment on amounts over \$1,000 must not be less than \$70, has a maximum maturity of 18 months.

Since Nov. 1, 1947, when the old regulations ended, terms offered by merchants and lenders extending credit have been relaxed considerably. The requirements of the new regulation are somewhat less restrictive than those of last Nov. but considerably tighter than terms now generally in effect. The down payment requirements on appliances are lowered from one-third to one-fifth. Also, to take care of late-model automobiles and certain other items where the expenditure must necessarily be

large, the maximum maturity for credits above \$1,000 is set at more than 15 months, running up to 18 months. At the same time, the scope of the regulation is broadened to include all credits up to \$5,000 whereas \$2,000 had been the limit under the previous regulation.

Instalment credit for home improvements was eliminated from regulations after the close of the war, and it is at present not covered in the regulation. Because of the current inflationary situation, however, the Board is considering the advisability of an amendment to bring such credit under the regulation. Before deciding whether to do this, the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System wishes to give all who are interested an opportunity to express their views. Accordingly, the Board will publish in the Federal Register an invitation to interested persons to submit comments on the question whether such an amendment would be desirable.

### Insist On Proper Sanitation Of Eating Places

AUSTIN (Spl.)—The Texas State Department of Health cannot maintain daily inspection of all eating places and the public is urged by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer to insist on the proper sanitation of the establishment where they eat. If the public is careless in this respect the incentive to maintain clean food service will be lessened and operators will only maintain the level the public is willing to accept. He urged that the public patronize "eating establishments which measure up to a high standard of cleanliness."

The State Health Department is making every effort to improve sanitation of eating places, Dr. Cox said, and there is "no excuse

for cafe owners not taking advantage of the food handlers schools which are being offered all over the state." He added that there are laws, rules and regulations which require the use of approved equipment and methods in such establishments.

"The public should be aware of these sanitary rules and regulations and insist that restaurants observe them. Patrons should realize that tables and counters will be many times cleaner than the kitchen and other places out of sight," he warned.

He urged milk appraisal by the patrons also. Texas law requires that a milk bottle cap state the grade of milk, and whether it is raw or pasteurized. "Insist on having the milk served in its original container, with a covered cap and a legal label," Dr. Cox urged.

"Obviously," he said, "the best in sanitation can be had only by close co-operation between the public and the investigators of the State Health Department."

**Waco Guests Tell of Trip to Texas Coast**

Guests at Hooper Haven, the bayshore home of Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Hooper, of Houston, recently reported highlights of their trip which were published in their home town paper at Waco. The guests included Miss Mary Mayfield, Mrs. Belle M. Green, Mrs. Eugene Llewallen and Miss Kate Edmond.

"The seaside cottage is quite spacious, and well adapted to summer living. It has a huge living room, paneled in knotty pine, a favored mural treatment throughout the home, with ivory woodwork on the bedrooms, and sun porch walls being the exception. Curtains and couch covers carry the pilot's wheel and ship anchor motifs and the chandelier in the living room is a huge pilot's wheel. From its spokes suspend ship lanterns.

"Shadow boxes brought by Kyle Vick Jr. from Pacific ports he visited when he took General McKean from Guam to Tokyo are unusual finds. The Hoopers have made a collection of interesting pictorial maps. One of Hawaii suggests their trip around the world.

"The map of the Texas Centennial with Austin, Houston and the men whose vision opened up Texas to colonists, has a central place on the dining room wall.

"The group visited Corpus Christi, the Naval aviation base and had luncheon at the Robert Driscoll hotel. They motored to historic Copano Bay, which was a pirate's retreat during the early days of Texas; remains of an old warehouse in which the Texans of those historic times cached their supplies, remains, also graves of the pioneer Plummers, New Englanders who came in their ships visiting Galveston, Port Arthur, Rockport and Corpus Christi.

"They visited the historic Fulton Mansion which stands bereft of paint by many face washings of the lashing winds from the bay. It is three-storied, built by George Fulton, son-in-law of Henry Smith first provisional governor of Texas, who said Live Oak Point, was comparable to the Elysian fields. Today shafts and turrets of oil rigs mar the terran, but perhaps will reveal fortunes to the prospectors.

"George Fulton built his home on the bay at Fulton, along lines of Masonic tradition and the hope has been expressed that Masons will take the place over for a Masonic hall. Etched brass fittings on heavy paneled doors, locked out the world at large. The gardens and carriage house, the pigeonaires, all but one, are gone from the grounds, the dumb waiter makes no more lifts from the kitchen and cellar. The gas in the chandeliers no longer flickers on scenes of luxury; on tessalated floors, on bay-windows filled with exotic flowers. The mirrors clouded now by spider webs, no longer depict finely costumed guests. Rose-patterned carpets have lost their luster and the inside blinds are closed against the too ardent sun.

"From a turret above the top floor, one can view the ever-changing water of the bay, ever-changing, like the way of life which made such a mansion home to the pioneer, Fulton."

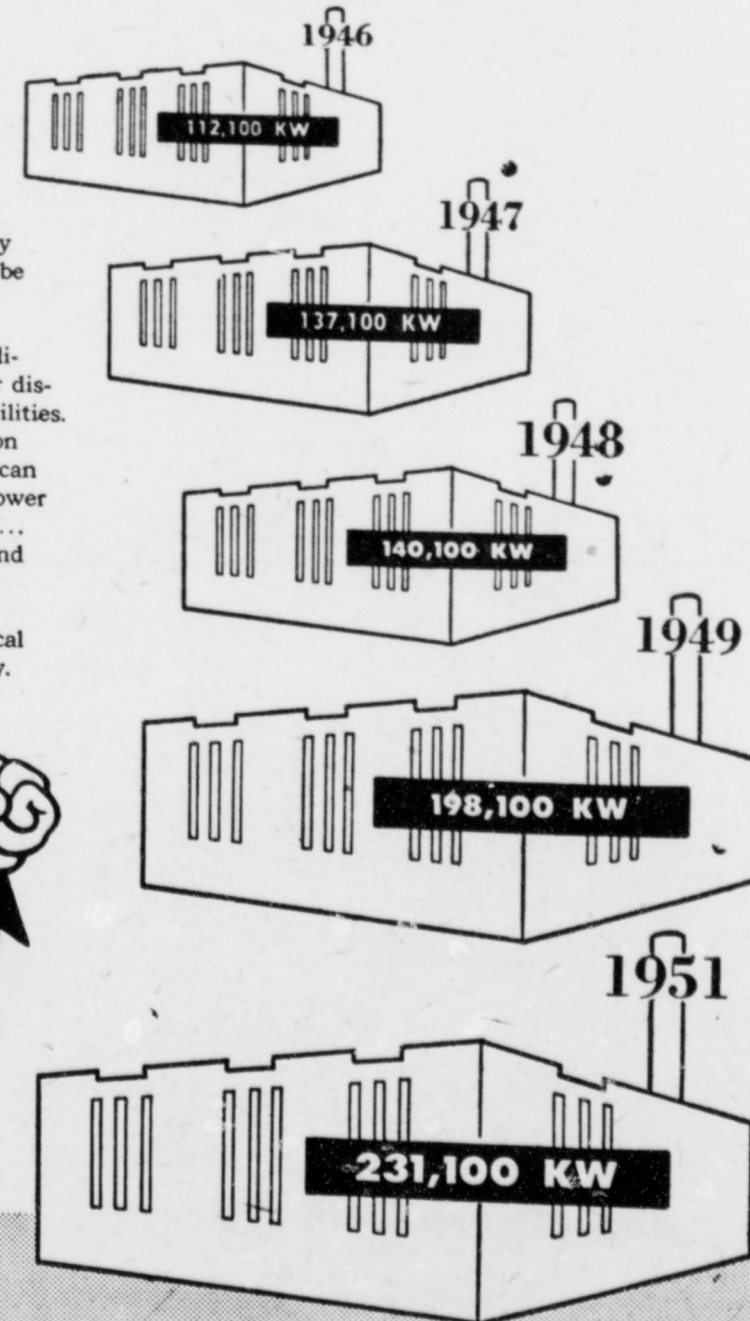

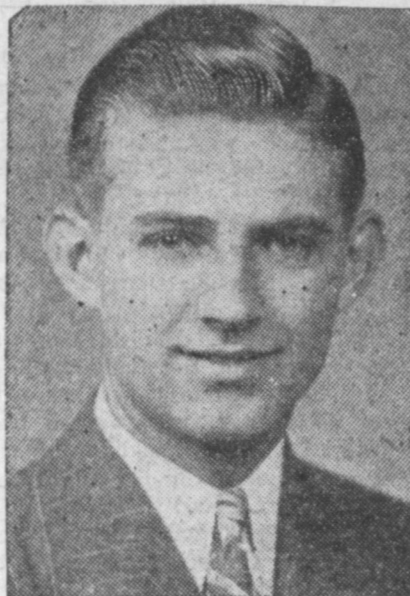

**Texas Schools Must Prepare For More Students In the Next Decade**

AUSTIN (Spl.)—Texas must adequately prepare for 150,000 more children in its schools in the next decade or lower its education standards.

Charles H. Tennyson, director of public relations for the Texas State Teachers Association, sounded that warning here recently.

The huge increase in the birth rate during the last few years will add to the enrollment in Texas schools by nearly 82,000 pupils four years from now and by 152,000 in 1957, Tennyson said.

"The vastly accelerated birth rate throughout the United States since 1941 has cheered business men, but it is causing great concern among educators," the TSTA official declared.

"Texas is no exception. From figures on the annual birth rate provided by the United States Bureau of Vital Statistics, we know that births increased 1,549,601 throughout the United States from 2,360,399 in 1940 to 3,910,000 in 1947.

"Enrollment started increasing throughout the country last year. In Texas it was up more than 7,000 pupils. The State Department of Education this week estimated an additional 8,000 students would enroll this fall.

"That is just the beginning. Enrollment will snowball from then on. The situation will become acute in 1953. An accurate estimate places the hike in enrollment in Texas that year as 81,568 pupils. Nine years from now we will have 152,004 additional students in our school or a total of 1,660,004."

Federal and state bureau and insurance company statistics show that nearly 80 per cent of the children born each year reach school age. Those experience figures make accurate estimates of future enrollment possible, Tennyson explained.

"An increase of 80,000 pupils in the short time of four years and 150,000 in nine years does not seem so tremendous until it is realized that we will need 2,719 more teachers by '52 and 5,066 classroom instructors by 1957," Tennyson declared.

"It stands to reason we will have to have that many more classrooms.

"Leaders in school districts and state government should take careful note. The situation calls for planning along practical lines in order that adequate provisions be made for education of those children.

"That is particularly necessary in more than half of the Texas schools in which children are already over-crowded.

"It will call for expenditure of large sums of money. If each of the 5,066 additional teachers was paid only the present minimum salary of \$2,000 annually, that would increase expenditures by \$10,132,000.

"No one can hazard a guess as to how much additional money must be spent on classrooms and equipment."

A recent survey disclosed that about 50 per cent of students in Texas schools are in over-crowded classes. Educators agree that pupils cannot be given adequate instruction when there are more than 30 or 32 pupils in a class.

Some Texas cities have already recognized the impending situation. A recent survey made by Fort Worth school officials disclosed that by 1953 the district will need 367 more teachers and additional classrooms, according to B. C. Shulkey, assistant superintendent.

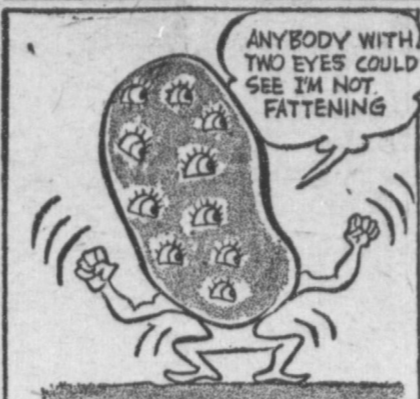

**Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users**

Certain changes in charges and practices pertaining to long distance calls within the State of Texas will be made effective September 1.

**Report Charges**

Report charges, applied to person-to-person calls under certain conditions since 1919, will be discontinued beginning September 1.

**Basic Station-to-Station Day Rates**

In 74 of the 800 air line mileage distances, rates will be increased 5 cents. These involve about half of the distances up to 146 miles. Basic rates for longer distances are not affected.

**Person-to-Person Day Rates**

Person-to-person rates are based on the station-to-station rates. The differential between rates for station-to-station service and for person-to-person service has varied from a minimum of 10 cents per call under 31 miles to an average of over 43 per cent on calls between 31 miles and 150 miles and an average of 35 per cent on calls over 150 miles. The differential will be established with a minimum of 15 cents per call under 45 miles and a uniform differential of about 40 per cent on all other calls. Report charges will be discontinued.

**Night and Sunday Rates**

A discount of approximately 20 per cent from the station-to-station day rate will apply on all station-to-station calls costing over 40 cents completed during night hours and all day Sunday. The night and Sunday discount on person-to-person calls generally will equal in amount the discount on station-to-station calls between the same points.

The principal changes to be made are described above. More detailed information may be obtained at any company business office.

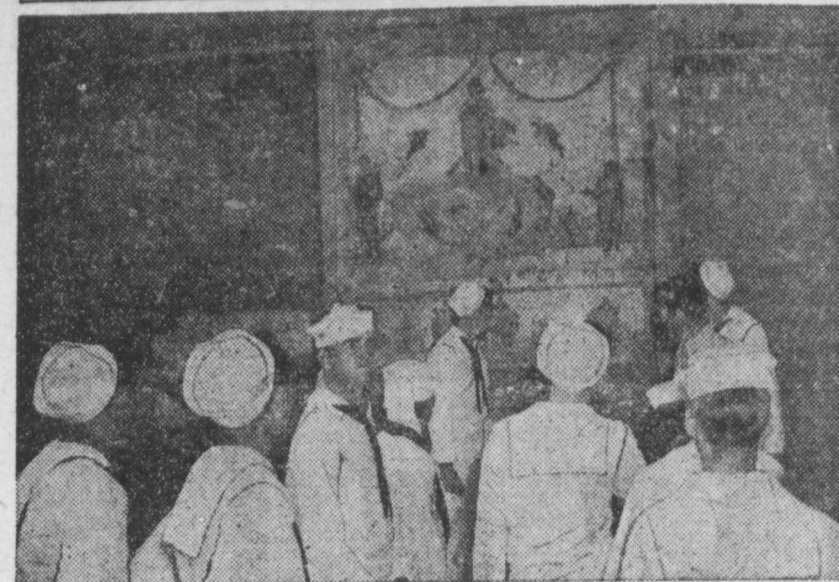
