It was payday in Rockport and Fulton this week as the bay shrimp season opened Tuesday morning. A check by The Pilot showed 100,000 pounds caught and run through the local fish houses after the first days run. Over one hundred boats went out from Rockport and Fulton besides those from Aransas Pass.

\$1,600 Paid On **Pollution Charges**

All fish houses agreed to that but they also found that the shrimp were much larger, running in the third bracket with 36 to 45 tails to the pound, which bring 16 cents. One company reported a load of 22-cent shrimp. None were in the small 12-cent size. Last year the shrimpers had to throw many loads back as they were under the

> legal size. In dollars and cents the catch netted about the same amount as last year. While there were not as many shrimp, they were much

The fact that the catch was much smaller than expected was blamed on the high tide which followed the bad weather last weekend. While the catches should be better as the tide goes down they will probably be more scattered.

UNCLE SAM'S SELECTIVE SERVICE

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Below is one installment of a series of questions and answers on the second peacetime military training program. It has been prepared under the direction of the Texas Director of Selective Service, Maj. Gen. K. L. Berry)

Q.-What does classification of registrants mean?

A .- It means that every man between the ages of 19 and 26 who registers will be classified accordng to his availability for 21 months of military training.

Q .- What will be the classes in which registrants will be placed?

A .- There will be five basic classes instead of the four used in the 1940 operation. The main class-Class I-will be composed of those who are available for training immediately. Persons whose services in essential civil occupations are of great importance will be placed in Class II, and their call to training will be deferred. Those with dependents (wife, children, etc.) may be placed in Class III, and deferred on grounds of dependency. Certain individuals will be placed in Class IV when their services are undesirable on moral, physical, or other grounds or because the law defers them (ministers, etc.), Class V is intended to provide a class for all men who register at the age of 25 and who reach 26 before induction.

Q .- How will this classification be made?

Q .- Suppose some citizen of the community is not satisfied with the classification given to a registrant. What can he do?

A.-In each local board area a government appeal agent will appeal from any local board decision he believes is wrong. A citizen can present his facts in secrecy to the government appeal agent, who will then act. The government appeal agent will also help those registrants who do not completely comprehend to secure justice.

Q.-Will local boards order a physical examination for regis-

A .- Within the full and usually accepted meaning of the term, there will be no physical examinations conducted by or at local boards. The armed forces will conduct physical examinations for inductees which generally will be final for purposes of the Selective Service Act.

Q .- How will the registrant know how he has been classified? A .- The local board will notify him of his classification on the date on which it is done.

Q.-What if a registrant claims in his questionnaire that he has a mental or physical defect which he believes would be disqualifying?

A .- In that case, he will be ordered to appear before the medical advisor to the local board for interview. This medical advisor is appointed by the President on advice of the governor. After the interview, the medical advisor will recommend for or against sending the registrant for final examination by the armed forces.

Q.—Can the registrant appeal from the action of a local board? A .- Yes. If the registrant is not satisfied with the classification he receives from the local board, he may carry his case before the state board of appeal. If there is a dissenting vote on this board of appeal, the registrant may appeal to the President of the United States in certain restricted cases. Q.-How long will a registrant

have in which to make an appeal? A .- He will have 10 days within which to appeal from any determination by a local board, except that he cannot appeal from a medical determination. The filing of an appeal will not operate to delay the armed forces physical examination. On the contrary, when an appeal is noted, the registrant will be required to have an armed forces physical exami-nation before the case is forwarded to an appeal board.



Texas July Postal Receipts Fall Below Those of June

Austin, Tex. - (Spl.) - Texas postal receipts in July slid fractionally below the June level, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Totaling \$3,071,447 in July, receipts from 60 Texas cities rose per cent from a year earlier.

The bureau's index, adjusted for seasonal variation, increased fractionally from June and climbed 13 per cent from July 1947 to stand at 246 per cent of the prewar (1935-39) average.

Palestine reported an increase of 26 per cent, the greatest gain over the month. Lubbock postal Fulton receipts stepped up 24 per cent from June, followed by Brownsville, 20 per cent, and Snyder, 17

The Navy issued a warning this week that bombing and gunnery practice is being conducted by naval aircraft on the off-shore bambing range of the Naval Air Station. The Navy said that it has been noted recently that fishing parties have been sighted in this area. Invading these waters is extremely hazardous. No person, vessel or craft of any type should enter this area.

The hours of bombing and gun nery operations are from sunrise to sunset daily, except Sunday.

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





Ship to Be Named For Texas Hero

A Texas infantryman who won the nation's highest award for heroic action that cost his own life will have a ship named for him when the Transportation Corps cargo vessel Acon Knot steams into its home port at San Francisco and is redesignated the USAT Sergeant George D. Keathley.

A native of Olney, Tex., Sgt. Keathley was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for his exploits as a member of the 85th Infantry Division on the Italian front.

He was killed on Mount Attuzzo on Sept. 13, 1944, after forcing back three enemy counterattacks in which all commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the second and third platoons of his company had become casualties. Sergeant Keathley is survived by his widow, Mrs. Geneva Keath-




