

Aerial Census Shows More Than Million Ducks and Geese On Coast

40,000 Ducks Observed in Aransas and Copano Bays; Geese in St. Charles Bay Area

Apparently the opening week of the duck season with hunters bagging their limits didn't influence the waterfowl population but merely moved the birds around as according to figures tallied Wednesday on an aerial survey made by Biologists Bob Singleton and Gus Engeling, there are in excess of 1,000,000 ducks and geese along the coast. This figure compares favorably with last year, the coastal waterfowl men report.

The largest concentration of waterfowl in the immediate area was found in St. Charles Bay area where 2,000 geese, most of which were Canada, and 25,000 ducks were spotted. The largest portion of ducks were pintails.

In the Copano Bay area, which included Port Bay, Mission Bay, Copano Bay and Swan Lake, about 20,000 ducks were seen. These were pintails and redheads for the most part.

Of the 20,000 ducks observed in the Aransas Bay area, mostly pintails and redheads were seen. This area included Redfish and Little Bays.

Waterfowl counted in the area from the Guadalupe River to Brownsville numbered 750,000. The largest concentration of ducks seen this year was in this area. 500,000 ducks were observed in the area between Redfish Landing near San Polita and Port Isabel. Most of these were redheads and blue bills (scaup).

In the Aransas Refuge, including Hynes Bay and San Antonio Bay, 50,000 ducks and geese were seen. Geese, which were mostly snow geese, numbered 15,000.

Another large concentration showed 20,000 ducks and 40,000 geese in the Laguna Larga, below Corpus Christi. The Snow geese were in the majority here with some Canada geese.

350,000 ducks and geese were tallied in the area from Galveston to the Sabine River. The largest percentage of the ducks were mallards and pintails with some gadwalls. The 190,000 geese counted showed 170,000 of them to be snow geese with the rest blue and Canada geese.

Ducks and geese numbered 55,000 in the area between Freeport and Galveston. Snow geese were predominant with 20,000, about 1,000 Canada geese were observed. The ducks were mostly pintails.

Figures from the area from Freeport to the Guadalupe River have not been turned in.

Dr. G. A. Petrides, new unit leader of the Texas Cooperative Wildlife Unit, flew the area with Engeling.

The Tourist Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce met at the fire hall Tuesday night and arranged to hold seven parties during the winter months for the entertainment of winter visitors. The first party will be held in December, two will be held in January, two in February and two in March.

Albin suggested that each tourist be asked to fill in a card listing their home, business, local newspaper and hobbies. The cards could be turned into the Chamber of Commerce and a local item prepared and sent to the visitor's home town newspaper, which would provide a source of advertising which has been ignored.

The cards would also prove valuable in that activities missing in Rockport could be provided if the demand proved great enough.

Albin was appointed chairman of a committee to arrange for this project. Those to assist him are Leon Carleton and Mrs. Byron Baker.

Rogers-Ray to Extend Seismic Work In Bay Area

Rogers-Ray, Inc. have applied for a Dept. of the Army permit to conduct seismic explorations in Aransas, Red Fish and Corpus Christi Bays, between the north end of Aransas Bay and a line approximately five miles southwest from and parallel to the channel to Aransas Pass, the entire area is central to a point approximately five miles south from Rockport.

The work would be done by drilling holes to depths varying from 20 to 50 feet below the bed of the waterways at intervals of 1,320 feet along intersecting straight lines. Three inch casing would be placed in the holes extending from the bottom of the holes to an elevation of 3 feet above the surface of the water. After the casing has been placed, charges of explosive would be detonated near the bottom of the holes and seismic recordings made. All obstructions would normally be removed immediately after seismic recordings have been made. If not removed promptly, the casing would be marked by flags during the day and by lights at night. No casing would be placed within 500 feet of dredged channels, bridges, wharves or other improvements.

The applicant was granted authority in October to perform seismic explorations in Aransas Bay in the vicinity of Mud Island.

Port Little Victim Of Auto-Truck Crash

Port Little and Miss Ida Kenny were the victims of an automobile-truck crash on Highway 9 about eight miles from Corpus Christi early Sunday afternoon.

Little, driver, and Miss Kenny, owner of the new Studebaker, were able to walk away from the wreckage after the accident. The car turned over and landed on its top. Both were admitted to Spohn Hospital where attendants said that both suffered numerous bruises and concussions but neither were seriously injured.

Little notified his mother, Mrs. O. D. Little, that he was released from the hospital Wednesday and would be in Rockport Thursday.

The driver of the produce truck involved in the accident was not hurt.

T. L. Winn Thrown by Horse On Island Wed.

T. L. Winn, owner of Matagorda Island, was thrown by a horse and stepped on by the horse on the island Wednesday evening.

A doctor was located in Aransas Pass and taken to the island by Harry Mills. According to the doctor Winn was badly bruised but there were no fractures apparent. The horse stepped on Winn in the back below the shoulders.

The doctor flew back with Sterley Rozzell Wednesday night. Winn will remain on the island to recuperate.

Mrs. Esther McNeil, secretary of the Aransas Pass Credit Association and Chamber of Commerce, told the group at the meeting Monday night that the success of the organization would depend upon the efficiency of the secretary.

Mrs. McNeil told the group that the state association requires that the dues be at least \$3.00 per month. For \$10 per year a local association can belong to the Retail Merchants Association of Texas; this membership entitles the association to transferral of credit cards from other associations in the state on newcomers to this community. State bulletins are sent out by the state organization each week which keep the secretary informed.

Mrs. McNeil invited the secretary to visit her in Aransas Pass where she could acquaint her with the technicalities of the work.

Standolind Proposes To Drill In Aransas And Copano Bays

Standolind Oil and Gas Company proposes to drill a well for oil and gas in State Tract No. 82 in Aransas Bay adjacent to the north shore of Live Oak Peninsula at a location approximately six miles north from Rockport. The location is approximately 1,050 feet S. 87° 17' E. from U.S.C. & G. Triangulation Station "Causeway 1931" and approximately 800 feet southeast from the Copano Bay causeway across Aransas Bay.

The applicant for the Dept. of Army permit proposes to construct a shell filled drilling base, 138 by 160 feet, connected to shore with a shell filled road, 20 feet in width. The drilling base and 87 feet of the shoreward extension would be enclosed by a timber bulkhead. The bulkhead and shell fill would have a top elevation of four feet above mean low water. A derrick with a top elevation of 160 feet above mean low water would be erected for the drilling of the well approximately in the center of the drilling base.

Standolind also proposes to drill a well for oil and gas at a location in State Tract No. 70, Copano Bay, adjacent to the west shore of Live Oak Peninsula at a location approximately six miles north from Rockport. The location is approximately 2,526 feet north from the south boundary of State Tract No. 70 and 330 feet off shore from Live Oak Peninsula.

The company proposes to construct a shell filled drilling base 138 by 160 feet, connected to shore with a shell filled road 20 feet in width. The drilling base and 87 feet of the shoreward extension would be enclosed in a timber bulkhead. The bulkhead and shell fill would have a top elevation of four feet above mean low water. A derrick with a top elevation of 160 feet above mean low water would be erected for the drilling of the well approximately in the center of the drilling base.

Atlantic Completes Salt Lake Test As Oil Well

The Atlantic Refining Co. has completed its No. 1 V. G. Gwynn Salt Lake wildcat as an oil well at 7,209-7,214 feet. No official test has been run but unofficially the well is making between 75 and 100 barrels daily on 9/64 choke with 450 pounds flowing pressure on tubing. The rig which drilled the well and which belongs to Al Buchanan Drilling Co. was released at 4 p. m. on Tuesday and the drilling contractor is tearing down. No additional locations have been announced by Atlantic.

On perforations at 7,209-14 feet the well flowed oil on drill stem test under 550 pounds working pressure, but salt water broke in and the perforations were squeezed preparatory to a new test. On 12-hour gauge before squeezing, the well made 68 barrels of 38 gravity oil through 1/8 inch choke, plus 22 barrels of salt water. Earlier, perforations at 7,265-69 feet had made gas, with 2,500 pounds working pressure and were squeezed. Those at 7,310-13 feet, made oil and salt water and were squeezed as were those at 7,360-65 feet, which made salt water and oil. Perforations at 7,758-65 feet made gas on drill stem test with 2,500 pounds pressure on 1/4 inch chokes and recovered 60 feet of 46 gravity oil. Perforations at 7,792-99 feet tested gas with 3,500 pounds pressure on 1/4 inch choke.

Hunt-Graham Spencer-Kent-Crane No. 4 was deepened to 9,000 feet and Schlumberger run at that depth. Operators have plugged back to 7,550, set a liner and plan to test an oil sand that came in at 7,225.

Atlantic No. 3, State Tract 71 has drilled to 7,300 feet after circling the 7,100 section and is ready to set the long string of casing. This is an inside well between their numbers 1 and 2.

Standolind No. 1, State Tract 82, at the south end of the Copano Bay causeway, has set conductor pipe, Gus Glasscock, drilling contractor, has the contract to drill the well. Extraordinary precautions are being taken to prevent "blowouts" in view of the experience of Placid Graham on their A. C. Glass No. 2.

Renwar-Fogelson No. 1, State Tract 106 is directionally drilling at 6,200.

On St. Charles Peninsula, Western Natural Gas Co. No. 9 St. Charles Ranch was completed for 118 barrels of distillate and 4.2 cubic feet of gas daily through 3/16 inch choke from perforations at 10,840-904 feet. Gas distillate ratio was 36,000 to 1. Location is being made for the No. 10.

Man Shot While Duck Hunting

Dr. Charles T. Stone, Jr., of Galveston was accidentally shot while duck hunting Monday morning at the Port Bay Hunting and Fishing Club, six miles west of Rockport on Port Bay.

G. M. Harrell, manager of the club, said that Stone, his father, Dr. Charles T. Stone, Sr., and Pete Ramirez, a guide, were hunting from a skiff in one of the club blinds when the accident occurred. Stone received wounds in both hands and across the stomach when his gun accidentally discharged. Apparently Stone had fallen while raising up to shoot, falling in the water, when the gun discharged. The men in the boat could not tell clearly how it happened as they were watching the flight of ducks when the gun went off.

Stone was taken to Galveston in a Cage Funeral Home ambulance. The elder Stone said the wounds were not serious, according to word received at the Club Tuesday.

Harrell said the accident was the first he had experienced at the club.

Greek Girl Runs Ashore In Gulf

The Greek Girl, captained by Gano Marshall, had engine trouble near the Gulf shore of St. Joseph Island Saturday morning about 4 a. m. and later ran ashore. When Marshall threw out the anchor, the line broke. He then tried throwing out the nets for an anchor but they would not hold. By the time the Coast Guard arrived the boat was too far ashore and could not be pulled off.

The boat belonged to the Johnson Fish Company. The motor and other movable parts have been removed from the boat. The hull will not be removed.

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Marine Lab Is Active In Aiding Educational Work

Since the formal opening, in April, of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission's Marine Laboratory at Rockport, it has been active in aiding educational institutions, both in this country and elsewhere, according to J. L. Baughman, chief marine biologist.

Biology classes from the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, Sam Houston State Teachers' College and the University of Texas have all been visitors. These classes, in addition to becoming familiar with the laboratory and its work, have spent a good deal of time collecting and classifying marine forms, to be used in teaching and study at the various schools. Graduate students from all three of these institutions have also been aided on various problems, among which may be listed the bacteriology of shrimp, refrigeration of sea food, study of the effects of the sediments from dredges on oysters, plankton studies, and a study of boring and fouling organisms.

In addition, an effort has been made to interest the primary and high school children of the area in the laboratory. Conducted tours have been arranged for them, and lectures suitable to the various age groups have been given from time to time. Study collections of fishes have been prepared for high schools away from the coast and members of the laboratory staff have given talks before civic clubs and other organizations throughout the state.

During the year, also, the San Antonio zoo has been helped in the establishment of its aquarium and many salt water fishes have been presented to that institution. Aid was given Sister Gerald M. Shea, of the Catholic University, in Washington, in her protracted studies on Sacculina, an infection which seriously affects our blue crab population. Moreover, in response to requests, study material has been given the American Museum of Natural History, New York; Audubon Park Zoo, New Orleans; the University of the West Indies, Jamaica, B. W. I.; the British Museum, London; the Museum of Comparative Zoology, Harvard University; and the University of Michigan.

A museum at the laboratory, which is in the development stage, is one of the most important projects in operation. This is an open, growing presentation of the marine fresh water and land animals of the Texas coast, and its value to schools and scientists is beyond the scope of mere dollars and

cents, for it contains study specimens all with bonafide accurate data.

At the present time there are approximately 200 fish, 220 invertebrates, and 90 snakes, frogs, turtles, toads and lizards in the museum, and new specimens are being added every day.

Because no institution of this sort can function properly without a reference library, much attention has been paid to this department, with the result that the laboratory has one of the most complete collections of books, periodicals and reprints on the Gulf to be found in the South.

This library has been made available to other scientists, educators and educational institutions.

Another important feature of the educational program, as far as the general public is concerned, consists of a small, public aquarium where many of the common and a few of the uncommon marine fish are shown, as well as several tanks of the fresh water fish of the area.

This display has been very popular, not only with tourists, but also with the local residents. On a normal week day approximately 30 people visit the aquaria. However, on the 4th of July weekend, there were nearly 1,000 visitors a day for three days.

Dr. Cox Comments On Rheumatic Heart Disease

Austin, Tex.—Rheumatic heart disease, a crippling and killer of children, is one of the leading causes of death and disability among children and young adults in the age group 10 to 25 years.

No vaccine such as those that prevent typhoid, diphtheria, smallpox, and whooping cough has as yet been developed for its prevention and control, but we do know some of the danger signals and with a physician's early diagnosis, some of the damaging results of this disease may be prevented.

Quoting Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, "in general, the early symptoms of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows or wrists. The pain is felt usually in one of these joints and spreads to the others. Often a child gets irritable and cross without any apparent cause; he may cry easily and develop habits indicating nervousness. These symptoms may mean the beginning of an attack of rheumatic fever, and a physician should be consulted immediately."

Predisposing causes of this disease, which include frequent chilling, damp or overcrowded living quarters, poor diet, colds, an attack of scarlet fever or other infections caused by certain streptococcus germs, should be carefully

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Some Businesses Have Not Registered Under Regulation W

In accordance with the provisions of Regulation W, persons and firms engaged in certain classes of business are required within a sixty-day period to file a registration statement with the appropriate Federal Reserve Bank or branch. For persons engaged in the business of making instalment loans or instalment sales of listed articles on Sept. 20, 1948, the period within which the required registration statement should be filed expires on Nov. 19, 1948.

While a substantial number of persons and firms have already submitted registration statements others apparently subject to the regulation have not done so.

The following persons must register:

Those engaged in the business of making instalment loans in a principal amount of \$5,000 or less; those making instalment sales of any articles listed below which result in credits in a principal amount of \$5,000 or less; and those discounting or purchasing or lending on the security of obligations arising from instalment sales or loans of the kind described.

The list of articles include (articles having a cash price of less than \$50 are exempted):

Cooking stoves and ranges designed for household use; dishwashers, designed for household use; ironers designed for household use; refrigerators of less than 12 cubic feet rated storage capacity (including food freezers); washing machines designed for household use; combination units incorporating any listed article in the foregoing classifications; air conditioners, room unit; radio or television receiving sets, phonographs, or combinations; sewing machines designed for household use; suction cleaners designed for household use; furniture, household (including ice refrigerators, bed springs, mattresses and lamps) floor coverings, soft surface; and automobiles including taxicabs.

For persons who become subject to Regulation W after Sept. 20, 1948, the Registration Statement should be filed within 60 days after they become subject to it.

Persons required to register should file their registration statements with the Federal Reserve Bank serving the district in which the main office of the registrant is located. A map showing the boundaries of the Federal Reserve districts appears on the back cover of Regulation W.

Those desiring further information or registration statement forms should communicate with the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas or the branch (El Paso, Houston or San Antonio) which serves the territory in which the registrant is located.



Highlighting the orchestra's program will be American premiere of a newly-discovered Symphony by the early master, Josef Haydn. It is Symphony No. 53 in D Major subtitled "The Imperial." One of the most important musical events in years, the recent Haydn discovery by the German-born conductor and musical "explorer" Edvard Fendler has created a stir both here and abroad.

Mr. Reiter was the first of many conductors to seize the opportunity of presenting the symphony to American concert audiences. Beginning next month more than a score of other symphony orchestras will perform the Haydn. These include the New York Philharmonic, under Stokowski; the Philadelphia Orchestra, Ormandy; and the Boston Symphony, all of which have scheduled performances in January.

Also on the November 27 program will be the Prelude to "Lohengrin" (Wagner) and the ballet suite, "La Boutique Fantasque" (Rossini-Respighi).

Menahem Pressler, the brilliant young Palestinian pianist, will be soloist with the San Antonio Symphony in the Nov. 20 concert.

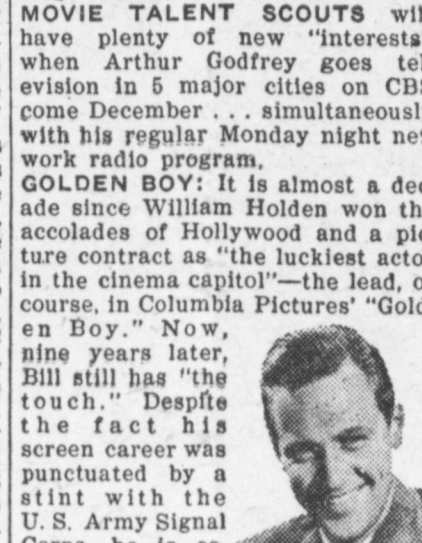

Farm commodities now being contributed in this state to the Christian Rural Overseas program (CROP) will be distributed overseas on the basis of need alone, with much of it going to children such as those shown above, according to John D. Metzler, national CROP chairman.

These five Chinese orphans recently were picked up on the streets by CROP's sponsoring church agencies, and are now being nursed back to health, although their ribs still stick out like ridges on a washboard. Children, widows, the aged, and those in pre-tubercular centers are among those who benefit most by CROP contributions—which are distributed in 43 different countries.

More than a score of states, including this one, will have assembled trains of food for CROP by late November or December. The effort is nationwide and is sponsored by Catholic Rural Life, Church World Service, and Lutheran World Relief.
