HOLIDAY CHEER

Every holiday season, fire brings tragedy to a long list of American homes. The special hazards that come into being at this time are responsible for a ghastly toll of death, injury and property damage. Yet every one of those hazards can be easily controlled.

One of the gravest dangers is to use lighted candles on trees, or in places about the home where they may ignite decorations or be tipped over by children. Only electric lights, of an approved type, should be employed.

Another danger is to keep trees in the house after they have dried to the danger point. They should be disposed of immediately after New Year's.

Flammable decorations should never be placed where they might burst into flame at the touch of a cigarette. And children should never be left alone in rooms where holiday hazards exist.

The normal home hazards are present during the holidays as at every time, and in some cases they are intensified. Take special care with cast-off wrapping paper, heating plants, smoking materials, and electric cords and appliances. Remember that it is comparatively easy to prevent fire—but difficult and sometimes impossible to stop it once it starts.

There will be no cheer in the homes that fire strikes this holiday season. Make sure that yours is not among them.

TOWARD BETTER MEDICAL CARE

If anyone has an idea that the physicians of this country are fighting any and all plans that would give the American people better medical attention at a cost which is within their means, he is sadly misinformed.

It is true that the great majority of doctors are strongly opposed to compulsory government health insurance, and kindred schemes which would open the gates wide to completely socialized medicine. The basic reason for this opposition is found in a statement issued by the American Medical Association, which said: "The experience of all countries where government has seized control of medical care has been progressive deterioration of the standards of that care to the serious detriment of the sick and needy."

The wholeheartd cooperation and support of doctors, on the other hand, has been one of the biggest factors in the remarkable growth of the low-cost voluntary prepayment plans, which now provide a vital protection to tens of millions of citizens. These plans represent the most positive and most successful idea yet devised to lessen the economic pressure that follows unexpected illness or accident.

There is, of course, a small proportion of the population which cannot afford any kind of protection. The medical profession is aware of this, and is working to do something about it. According to Medical Economics, the private physicians are developing a national health program of their own, and adequate care for the indigent will be one of its important provisions.

The typical doctor, in other words, is interested in the best possible medical attention for the most possible people. He knows that political medicine is not the way to attain



2,531 Texans Die From Pneumonia in '47

Austin, Tex .- A statement from Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer, discloses the fact that 2,531 Texans died from pneumonia during the year 1947, and emphasizes his often repeated warning that this disease is a killer.

Pneumonia is caused by the pneumoccus germ which is present in the bodies of almost everyone, and ready to start trouble if the

resistance becomes lowered for any reason. We can build up our resistance by avoiding undue fatigue treme weather conditions. When we go outside in cold weather, sufficint clothing should be worn to keep the body warm. Keeping the temperature of our homes and offices as low as is consistent with comfort will greatly lessen the difficulties encountered in adjusting ourselves to the cold when we leave the house.

Another method of prevention n pneumonia is to never neglect a cold, for the common cold often opens the door for pneumonia if it is neglected. A person with a severe cold should stay at home and call his physician for advice, if temperature persists and the cold lingers on. He should follow his physician's advice until the cold has entirely disappeared.

Another advantage of consulting a physician when suffering from a cold is the fact that what the patient mistakes for a severe cold may be beginning pneumonia. If this is the case, the doctor will ment early, which adds materially to the patient's chances for re-

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



Texas Building Permits Gain 6% Oct. to Nov.

Austin, Tex. - Texas building permits gained 6 per cent from October to November, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Building permits in 53 Texas cities totaled \$30,829,734 in November 1948, or 14 per cent under a year ealier.

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the Bureau's index of building permits climbed 33 per 627 per cent of the prewar (1935-39) base period.

Lockhart, and Greenville increased three-fold in November, and more than doubled the October level in Lubbock, Harlingen, Midland, Borger, San Angelo and Childress. On the other hand, sharp month-

Watch eyes pop wide open at Sunday brunch as hot, crusty brown popovers move straight from oven to table.

These crisp shells are more than a delicious bread, for they mexcellent containers for creamed foods. Cut the tops of the popov almost off with a sharp knife, and fill the split cases with creame turkey, chicken, scrambled eggs, creamed ham, or chipped beef.

Because popovers are a quick bread, you can get them into the oven in about fifteen minutes. Taking a few precautions will help make sure they "pop"

Precaution No. 1: beat the batter with a rotary egg beater until

Precaution No. 2: heat either greased iron pans or glass custard or pottery cups sizzling hot. Take them from the oven and pour in the cold batter. This contrast in temperature helps popovers go high-best individual cups on a tray so they will be easy to take out of oven. There are also wire racks that come with some kinds of custard

cups. If your oven has sliding shelves, pour the cold batter into the hot cups as they sit on the oven shelf. This saves fingers and spills.

Precaution No. 3: bake popovers first at a high temperature to pop them, then at a low temperature to dry them out and finish to a

As soon as you take popovers from the oven, make a small slit in the side of each to let steam escape. Serve at once with butter, jam, and coffee, and your family will take over from there.

Such an index is already widely used by business concerns and other state governments. The committee is proposing an economic index to be used in dividing up the local tax effort between districts, and is saying that the total local effort

should be 45 million dollars. Third in the plan is provision for most school districts to have ample local tax resources left after paying their shares toward the minimum foundation program. The total amount raised by local taxes for schools in 1947-48 was above \$150 million. The \$45 million required to be applied toward a minimum program leaves ample resources for providing enrichment locally. Every school tax
