

Along The Waterfront



A few hardy fishermen were at the basin Sunday braving the elements and were being rewarded with a few fish of medium size. However the 23 degrees was sufficiently cold to keep most fishermen away until the fish would bite with every cast, which they failed to do.

Early this week the best spot in the basin was out from Noah Smith's boat house. No spectacular catches were made but some nice fish were brought in. A few fish were being brought in along the beach at Fulton.

George Adolphus, Lyle Dietrich and Bill Gray ignored the below freezing temperature over the weekend and went fishing back in Copano Bay. They were well rewarded for their efforts as they landed 300 pounds of fish most of which were sheephead.

Port Little and George Devine flew to the Laguna Madre Tuesday and brought back 200 pounds of fish. They caught redfish, trout, drum and sheephead.

E. H. Beard wore caught eight reds which weighed 15 pounds while fishing in Aransas Bay Tuesday.

Jimmy Lingan reported in his column in the Houston Chronicle this week that it was rumored that fishing at the basin in Rockport was finished. If Lingan based his statement on the number of fish taken there during January he could have made the same statement last year.

The Pilot record shows that fish were caught only one week in January last year at the basin to any great extent. It is a well known fact around Rockport that it takes a severe and quick drop in water temperature to bring the fish into the basin. When it comes on slowly, as it did this year, prospects for fish being there are poor.

The best catches at the basin last year were made later in the season and the day that topped them all came in March. There are fishermen here who have caught from 30 to 40 fish at the basin this year in a few hours time and this was achieved without live bait.

City Extends Date For Tax Payments

The city clerk, Mrs. E. W. Townsend, announced this week that residents of Rockport will not be charged interest if they pay their taxes during February. Due to the cold weather which was suffered during the latter part of January, the city officials decided to extend the date that taxes could be paid without penalty.

Figures show that collections in January were high; \$4,496.84 was collected during the month as compared with \$2,952.66 collected in January of 1948.

Included in the amount collected in January of this year were \$1,775.52 paid for taxes delinquent. Current taxes paid were \$2,731.32, which brings the figure to \$16,591.32. The current collectable taxes amount to \$18,930.68. \$1,582.87 was received from the county for property sold in the delinquent tax sale in December. This figure is included in the delinquent taxes paid.

In 1948 the city received only \$579.80 as a result of the tax sale.

Surveying for Farm-Market Road Nears Completion

The Texas Highway Department has nearly completed the survey for the farm-to-market road which will extend 13.8 miles in a north-westerly direction from Rockport to the San Patricio County line and intersect with the highway at Bayside. The road will start with the back road between Rockport and Aransas Pass, swinging westward across Port Bay by the new causeway.

When the surveying is completed the information will be turned over to the county who has agreed to provide the right-of-way.

The district engineer for the Highway Department believes that the actual construction will get underway sometime in May and that the road should be completed before the fall rains set in.

The road will be constructed and maintained at the expense of the state under the 1950-51 Federal-State Farm to Market road program, as part of the designated system of highways of Texas.

Potluck Supper For Tourists Wed.

There will be a potluck supper for tourists at the school gym next Wednesday night at 7:30, Feb. 9. All tourists are asked to bring a covered dish and enjoy the supper after which games will be played.

Miss Gladys Shubert, stenographer at the marine laboratory, was called to Raymondville Sunday after receiving word that her father, M. F. Shubert, 46, of Corpus Christi, died Sunday morning in his automobile near San Antonio.

Shubert was returning to Corpus Christi from San Antonio about 3 o'clock Sunday morning and it is believed, stopped at the side of the road to sleep awhile. He was found dead in the back seat of the car about 8 a. m. with a home made charcoal burner between his legs. Death was reported to be due to asphyxiation.

His body was sent to Raymondville where funeral services were to be held.

Directional Well Into Copano Bay Completed at 7,236

Renwar-Fogelson No. 1 State Tract 106 was completed this week in the 7,236 foot sand. The directional well made 165 barrels of oil on potential test through 9/64 inch choke, with 1,100 pounds pressure on casing and 1,060 tubing, and was pinched back. The gas oil ratio was 260 to 1 and no salt water.

The 24 hour test was made Tuesday in the B4 sand which is a new sand. The Renwar Oil Corp. has requested a new field allowable.

The well is the first in the field to complete a directional into Copano Bay. Before Christmas the well had reached 7,350 feet, but lost a directional survey line in the hole, later recovering this but sticking drill pipe. Pipe was cut out to 4,500 feet and the well was plugged back to 3,700 feet for the second well.

Credit Bureau Membership Gains

The membership of the Aransas County Retail Merchants Credit Association has doubled since the meeting of the merchants 10 days ago, Henry Juergens, head of the association, reported today.

Mrs. Mary Juergens will be the executive secretary of the bureau.

Houston Co. Proposes Seismic Explorations In San Antonio Bay

The McCollum Exploration Company of Houston has been issued a permit by Judge D. R. Simmons to conduct seismic exploration in San Antonio Bay, in an area approximately three miles wide and four miles long, opposite Mustang Lake, adjacent to the southeast shore of Black Jack Peninsula and central to a point approximately 22 miles northeast from Rockport.

The work would be done by drilling holes to depths varying from 50 to 75 feet below the bed of the waterway at intervals of 500 feet along straight intersecting lines spaced at intervals of one-half mile. A temporary buoy (a five gallon can) will be used to mark the shot holes and would be held in position by a flexible line and standard small sand anchor. Casing would be placed in the holes extending from the bottom of the holes to an elevation of three feet above the surface of the water.

After the casing has been placed, charges of explosive would be detonated near the bottom of the holes and seismic recordings made. The applicant proposes to remove all obstructions from the waterway immediately after seismic recordings have been made. If not removed promptly, the casing would be marked by flags during the day and by lights at night. No casing would be placed within 500 feet of dredged channels, bridges, wharves or other improvements in the waterway. The work would be conducted in accordance with regulations issued by the State General Land Office.

Corporation Charters Issued to 273 Texas Firms

Austin, Tex.—Charters were issued to 273 Texas businesses in December, with a total capitalization of \$6,198,000, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

A total of 228 charters were issued in November, and 301 businesses were formed in December, 1947.

Totaling 67, merchandising businesses received the greatest number of charters in December, followed by manufacturing, 35; and real estate, 34.

Corporations with a capitalization of \$5,000 to \$100,000 received 111 charters, the largest number of charters issued to one group.

There were 3,801 firms incorporated in 1948, compared with 3,247 in 1947.

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National Children's Dental Health Day

Austin, Tex.—Observance of the first National Children's Dental Health Day on Feb. 7 has been approved and commended to Texans by an official memorandum signed by Governor Beauford H. Jester.

The dental health of children is of prime importance to their general well-being, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, says that every child should be under the regular care of a competent dentist from the time he is thirty months of age.

"Much can be done in the way of tooth decay prevention by dentists of today," Dr. Cox said, "and studies are under way at present which may lead to still further advances in the control of dental caries. Two Texas cities with almost identical flourine content in their city water supplies are being used in one experiment. Sodium flouride is being added to the supply of one city, and the results in the reduction of dental caries checked against that of the city whose water supply is not treated.

"This experiment has been in progress only 29 months and it is too early to establish a positive evaluation, but the results checked so far have demonstrated a decided tendency to caries reduction in the city where sodium flouride is added to their drinking water."

Early training of children in good dental hygiene will materially aid them in keeping their teeth and gums in good condition, and their regular visits to the dentist will enable him to make any corrections as soon as they are needed.

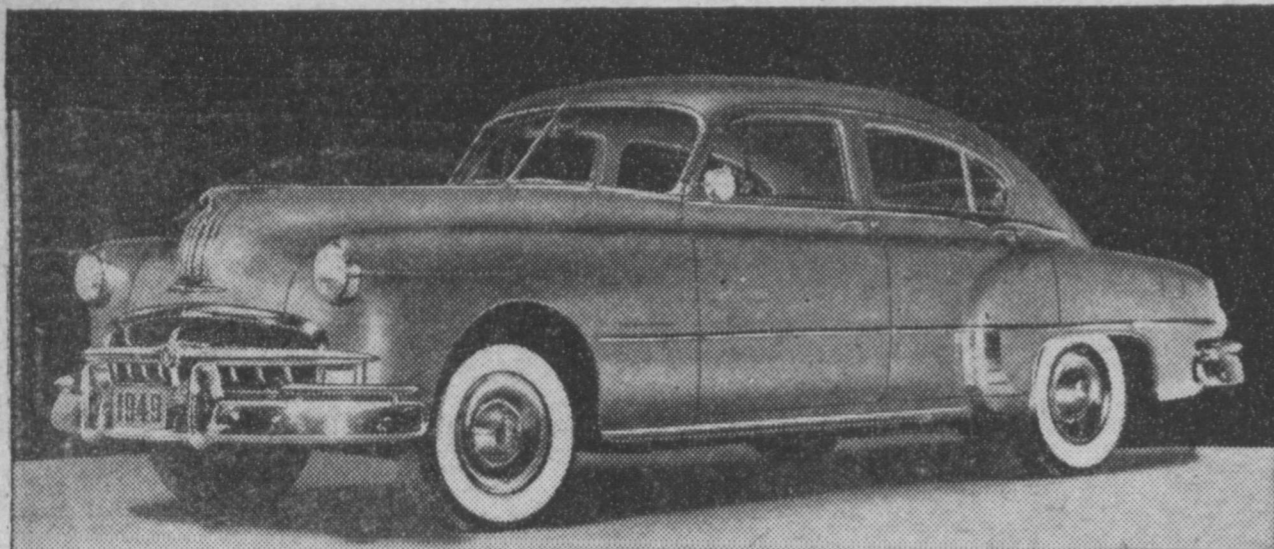

The main building which has changed hands many times, is reported to be four years older than the Fulton Mansion. Originally constructed as a private home, it was later known as the Shell Hotel before it was taken over by the Oak Shore Club.

Mr. Sorenson reports that some day he hopes to tear down the old building, build more cottages and put the bowling alley back into shape.

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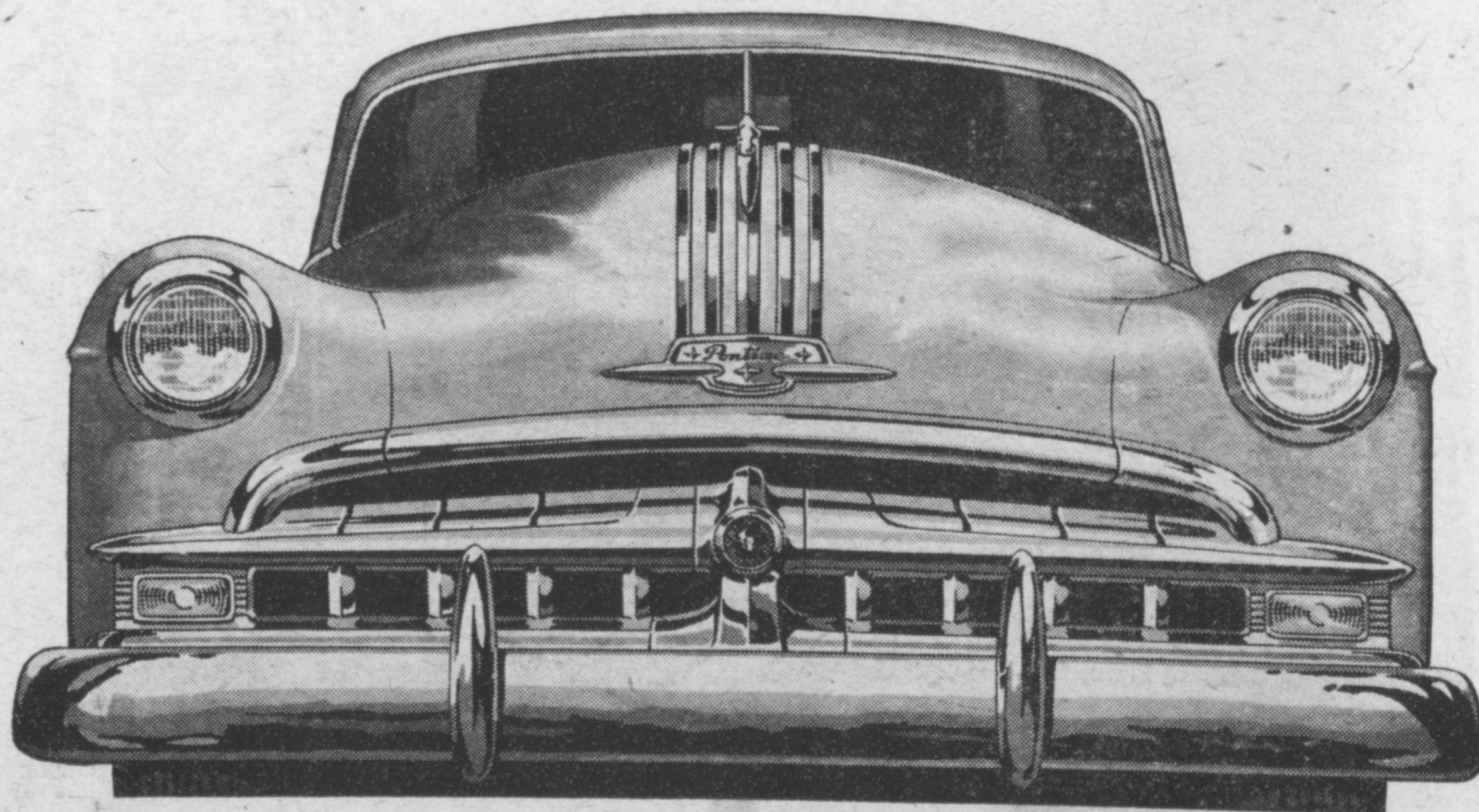

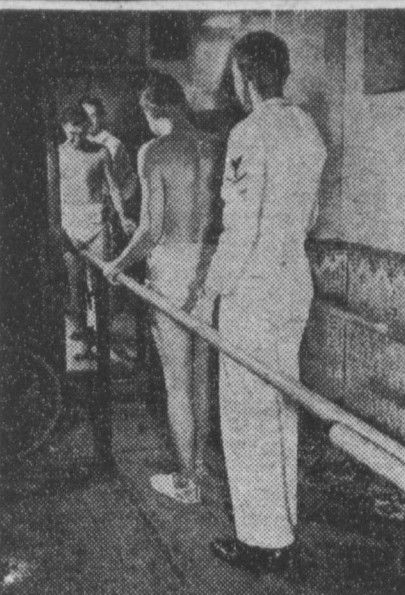

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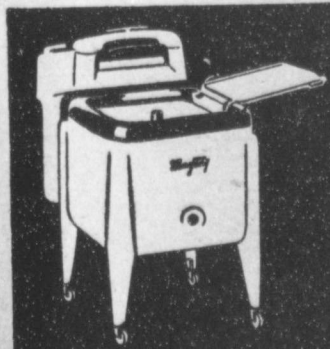

Social Security Is Insurance

The purpose of federal old-age and survivors insurance is simple: To give working families a measure of financial protection when regular wage income stops due to old-age or death.

The benefits which are paid through this insurance plan are in no sense charity or relief. The payments are made to those who qualify, as a matter of right, the same as private insurance.

The cost is met by a 1 per cent deduction from the worker's wages, plus an equal amount contributed by his employer.

The latest figures show that more than 2 million men, women, and children are now receiving monthly payments of retirement or family insurance at the rate of more than half a billion dollars a year.

Although this social security program has now been in effect over 12 years, many workers still don't know what they or their families may expect from it. On the other hand, some folks say, "I don't have to save any money now, because social security will take care of me when I get old."

The Social Security Administration wants to correct these mistaken ideas.

Old-age and survivors insurance was not designed to provide the luxuries of life, and it was not intended to take the place of private savings and insurance.

Under present conditions, the average social security benefit scarcely provides a bare subsistence. Planning and saving for the future are still necessary.

The point is that old-age and survivors insurance, augmented by personal savings, is lessening the financial worries of millions of American families.

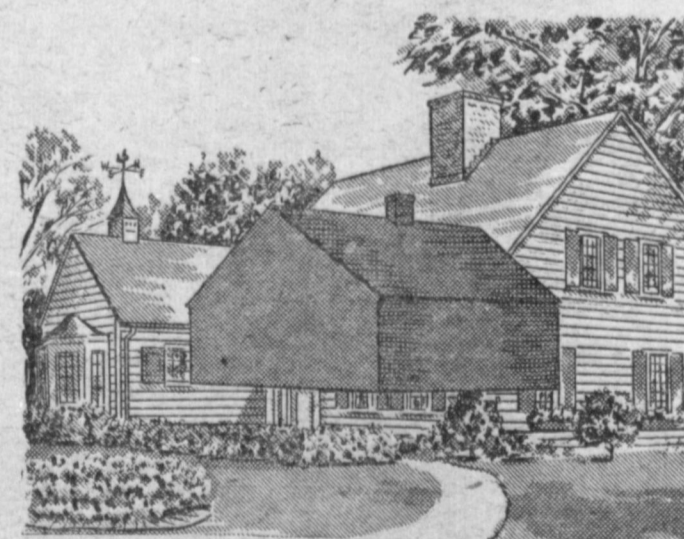

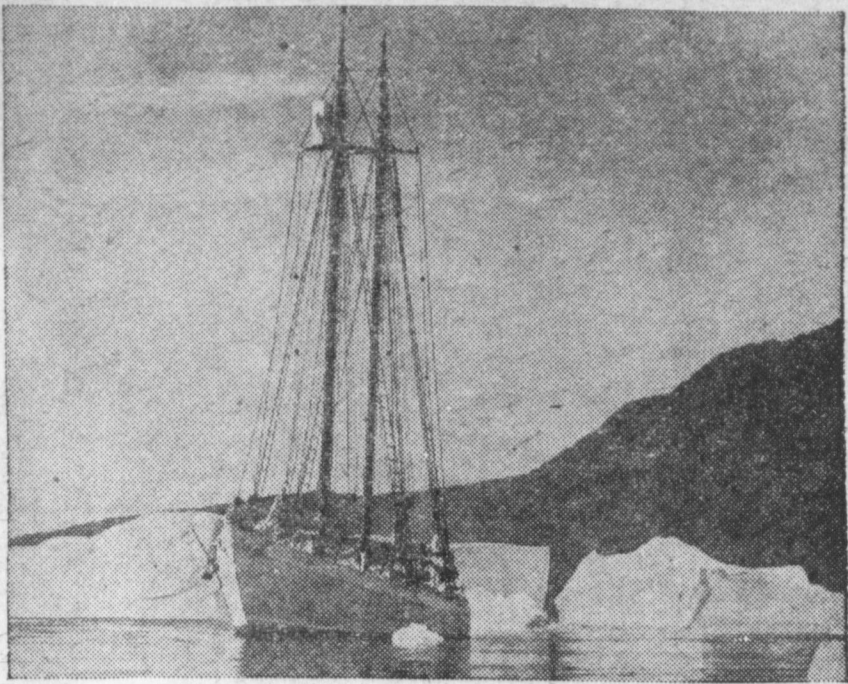

Plans are being made to hold community meetings throughout Southwest Texas starting immediately after the state meeting in San Antonio.

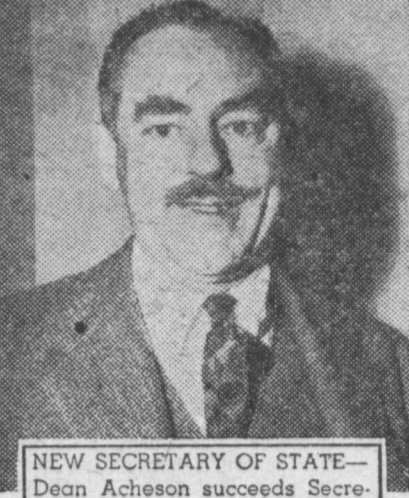
Presbyterian Hour On Radio Next Sunday

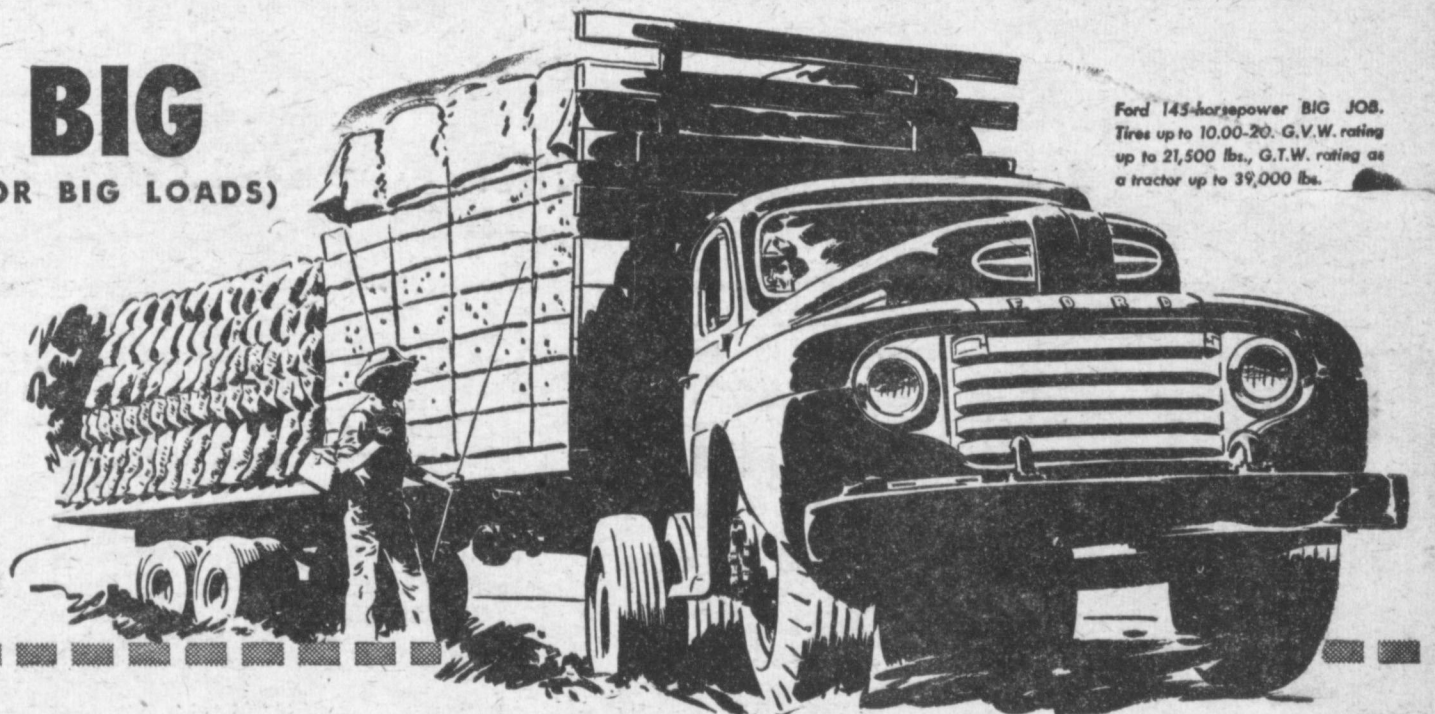

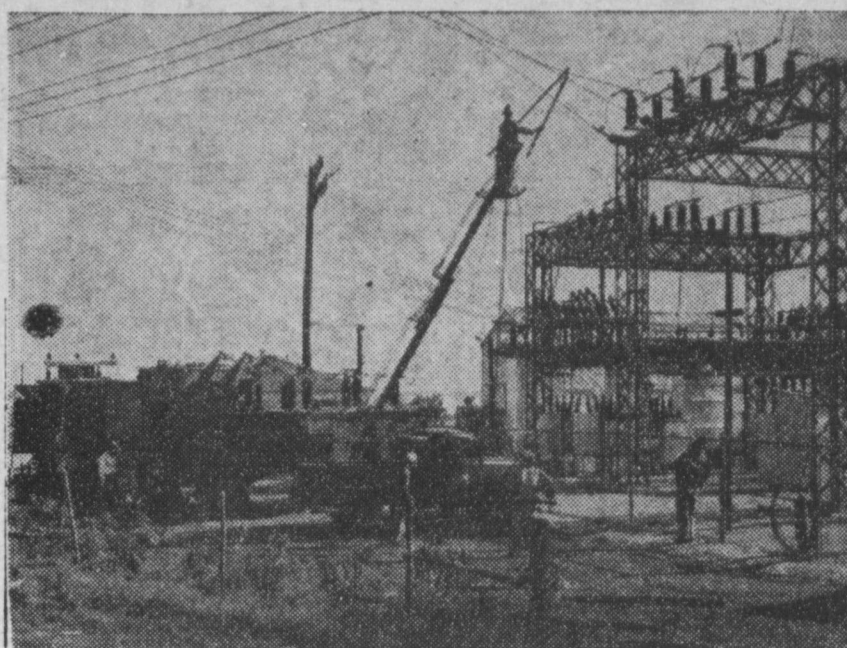
