### Too Much Oil and Debris In the Yacht Basin

Citizens of Rockport are losing sight of the fact that the city has gone to a great deal of expense to provide a dump ground outside the city limits so that we will have a place to dispose of our trash and garbage.

During the past few week the yacht basin has taken on the appearance that it is serving as the dump grounds for all kinds of trash instead of the designated grounds.

Besides the trash floating in the water, the basin has had a film of oil over it, which makes it obvious that a great deal of oil is going into the basin also.

The logical conclusion regarding the oil is that it is being pumped into the water from the bilges of the boats there. The state anti-pollution law imposes a minimum fine of \$100 on violators who insist on emptying their bilges into the basin.

The Rockport yacht basin has been a source of pleasure to residents and tourists alike. It has been anything but beautiful since it has come to look more like a public dumping

Local fishermen and tourists have complained loudly this year that the fishing there isn't what it's "cracked up to be" and it is quite possible that the debris and oil dumped there is one of the reason's responsible. This accumulation in certain sections of the basin ruins fishing lines and collects on the sides of the boats.

A few years ago the people of Rockport loudly protested the running of sewage, which had been properly pro cessed by chlorination to render it germ fee, into the basin. It is logical to assume that they will not set idly by and allow the basin to be polluted by other, much less sanitary means.

If the basin is to continue to be used as a place to pump bilges and as a dumping ground, the stench which will arise when warm weather comes should bring a louder protest that that raised when the sewage proposal was made. We hope that this situation will not exist until summer.

#### Yes, Education Is Your Business

Some time ago at a luncheon I asked several Rotarians if education was their business. Answers followed the same pattern. "No," said one, "I have an appliance shop." The second stated that his business was automobiles. A third replied, "Jim holds the education classification; I'm a dentist."


These were just about the answers I expected. Unless a person stops to think about it, education seems to be the business of teachers, principals, and occasionally, perhaps, of parents. But education, like good government, affects all of us . . . hence it is your business.

Have you ever though about where your profession or business would be without our schools? Can you vision what your market for cars, or electric ranges, or dental services would be if people weren't educated to want these things . . and at the same time equipped with the vocational skill to earn sufficient income to purchase them?

Say you sell refrigerators. It takes a good bit of money to buy a refrigerator. Not all people can afford one. Whether they can or not depends upon how much income they have. And the amount of income depends upon the extent of their education. This is a little known, but highly important, point which you'd do well to remember the next time you worry about that increased school budget . . . for it is a fact that the areas of higher per capita sales are almost conterminous with the areas of higher educational level. And, as this level of education increases, the level of per capita sales for retailers goes up.

If you are an American, about 10 percent of the population of your community are of school age today. Tomorrow they'll be buyers. If educated properly, they'll become independent citizens with good incomes which will enable them to purchase your products or services. Deny them educational opportunities and you may have to support them with some form of dole. This relationship of education to income is apparent everywhere. In the United States, for example, more than 76 percent of those who've had only a gradeschool education earn less than \$2,800 a year. People with low incomes are not the best buying prospects because of their limited purchasing power. Therefore in your community, education must be your business . . . just as it is

You can also support movements for increased school revenues instead of fighting them in the dubious name of economy. It would be short-sighted economy indeed if you refused to expand your business because of the cost of expansion. The same reasoning applies to the extension of education.

And if you really wish to get into deep water, you might look over the school system with your critical business eye and point out how it might be improved. Many times those of us who are close to it fail to see its defects. We've lived with them too long. You might suggest that we lengthen the school day to six or seven hours instead of the customary five. You might propose that we're not being very efficient in keeping school open only nine months of the year. You could even question the practice of erecting elaborate school buildings, many of which in the past have become white elephants within a decade.

Yes, education is your business. You have a stake in it, Good schools raise property values. Good schools attract intelligent, community-minded people. You're overlooking a good investment if you fail to include education in your business plans for tomorrow.

Austin, Tex. - Texas building permits fell 12 per cent from November to December, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Building permits in 54 Texas cities totaled \$26,971,401 in December, lagging 9 per cent from

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the bureau's index of building permits dropped 33 per cent from November to 417 per cent of the prewar (1935-39) base

Decreases from November were turned in by 28 Texas cities. Building permits dropped 86 per cent from the previous month in Borger; 83 per cent in Pampa; 82 per cent in Jacksonville; 81 per cent ville; and 71 per cent in Browns-

### **Rockport Needs Community Hall**

During the last several weeks the Pilot staff has been asked many questions regarding the community building that the Women's Civic Club is trying to raise funds to build.

Since the building is one that is vitally needed in the community, we went to the officers of the club to find out complete details.

Last June a group of ladies, realizing the need for such a building in the community, decided to organize and attempt to raise funds for the construction of one. The club was then organized for this purpose and every activity was to be devoted to this ideal. Every woman in Aransas County was and is urged to join the club and lend their efforts to the project which will need cooepration from every person in the community if it is to succeed.

At the present time the club has \$1,933.50 in the treasury, which they have raised since last June. There are 70 members at present and each pays \$1 in dues each month, all of which goes into the building fund.



Commenting on the necessity for individual cooperation in effecting the control of mumps, now widespread throughout the State, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, emphasises the fact that the contagion factor is present before any symptoms appear, and strict isolation of all patients is the surest means of controling the spread of this disease.

Mumps is transmitted by direct contact with an infected person or articles freshly contaminated by the secretions of the mouth or nose of persons having the disease. It takes from 12 to 26 days for mumps to manifest itself after the infection occurs. The disease can be easily transmitted, but one attack usually establishes permanent immunity and second attacks

very rarely occur. The most easily recognizable characteristic symptom of mumps is a painful swelling of the salivary glands. Sometimes there is an involvement of other portions of the body causing disturbances in the digestive, nervious, circulatory and genito-urinary systems. The disease is usually accompanied by a temperature rise which more

often than not is mild. "Patients suffering from this disease should be isolated from other members of the family immediately upon the suspicion that mumps exists, and the family physician should be called in promptly," Dr. Cox said. "In the meantime, complete rest in bed is indicated. The doctor's orders should be followed strictly. Violating his instructions can lead to serious injury, which may permanently affect the patient's health."






