





Dial No. 7 to Call Aransas Pass

The number of telephone circuits available for Rockport-Aransas Pass telephone calls has been tripled and, at the same time, the telephone number formerly dialed by Rockport telephone subscribers to reach the Aransas Pass switchboard has been changed from 257 to the single digit number, 7, Stan Bell, district manager of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.,

"Heretofore, telephone users in Rockport desiring to call Aransas Pass have dialed 257. Now, to call Aransas Pass, all that is necessary is to dial 7," Bell said. "This number is connected to the switchboard at Aransas Pass, and the operator there will answer when Rockport telephone users dial 7."

Faster calls, and improved service, are expected to result from the additional telephone lines between the two exchanges, the district manager said. It's another step to keep pace with the telephone needs of the city and the growth of the telephone system which, since V-J Day, has jumped from 300 telephones to more than 680."




