Trustees Favor School Districts Consolidation

Materials Are Moving In For Aransas County Wildcat

George W. Graham and Emory M. Spencer

To Drill 8,500 Foot Test On W. H. Wheeler Lands

Location was staked over the week-end for Graham-Spencer No. 1 W. H. Wheeler in the John Smith Survey, Abstract 187, Aransas County. The exact location is the common line of Lots 10 and 11, Block 3, Lucas Ranch Subdivision projected 660 feet southeast. The well is to be drilled by the T. G. and M. Drilling Co. and materials are being moved in at this time. The location is an offset to the 70 acre tract owned by A. C. Glass and J. F. Bullard.

The test well is being drilled on a block of acreage of approximately 3,500 acres assembled since the first of the year by George W. Graham and Emory M. Spencer. Mr. Graham is an independent oil operator of Wichita Falls, Texas, who brought in the discovery well in the Fulton Beach Field in July 1947. The block of acreage is strictly a wildcat block being 5 or 6 miles from nearest production, either in the McCampbell field on the south or the Fulton Beach Field on the North.

The contract depth is 8,500 feet which should thoroughly test all of the producing sands in both the McCampbell Field and the Fulton Beach Field. Hunt-Graham No. 1 F. G. Huffman made 10 barrels per hour of 45 gravity pipe line oil on a 6 hour test at 7171-7179 feet. Gas-oil ration was 850-1 and flowing pressure was 900 pounds.

Location for the Hunt-Graham No. 2 F. G. Huffman has been made. It is 2975 feet from the north line and 467 feet from the east line of the Huffman 1200 acre tract. The location is 1233 feet south of the No. 1 well.

Atlantic No. 1 F. G. Huffman is still testing at 7241-66 feet. Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 72 has set surface casing. The directional hole is being drilled 330 feet from the east line and 330 feet from the south line of the tract. Renwar-Fogelson No. 2 State (Continued on last page)

Development Of Fisheries Urged At C. of C. Meeting

Ruel McDaniel, editor of the Seafood Business magazine and just returned from the National Fisheries Association meeting in Chicago, told the Chamber of Commerce at their dinner meeting Tuesday night that more than \$40,000,000 is invested in commercial fishing along the Texas Gulf Coast and that more than 29,000 persons are employed in this industry.

Out of this sum, McDaniel estimated that \$1,000,000 was faken in and spent in Rockport and Fulton last year. McDaniel said that every man on the coast owes it to himself to familiarize himself with commercial fishing which is a permanent industry. He pointed out that the progress of the commercial fishing industry continues unnoticed because it is a permanent year-round industry while he termed the sports fisherman and tourist as fickle, claiming that they are patronizers of a community only as long as they catch fish there—one fishing trip with poor results and they can be found up the country the next year boasting the location of their latest catch.

McDaniel said that there are great possibilities for development of the following fisheries: 1. The mullet industry needs encouragement. Since the red tide did great damage to this fishery in Florida, two Florida fishermen have started mullet fisheries along the Texas coast which are thriving.

2. The Texas blue crab is unknown although it is the same crab as the famous Chesapeake Bay blue crab.

3. The menhaden industry could soon be a \$2,000,000 industry in Texas if the bill passes the legislature permitting the fishermen to use the proper type of seine.

4. The oyster industry has dropped to 10 per cent of the amount which was produced about 15 years ago, mainly because no one is interested in what happens to the oyster.

The commercial fishing industry is one of the 15 largest industries in the United States and McDaniel insisted that this industry should be encouraged and assisted locally in every manner possible.

Future Farmers Visit Detroit

Social Security Insurance Payments Lost

Monthly insurance payments totaling \$7,429.65 were lost to thirty persons in this area who delayed filing applications for the funds. Payments were lost for an average of seventeen months by each of the thirty. These facts came to light as the result of a six-month study which has just been completed by the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration. During the six months, a total of 463 persons applied for the retirement and family insurance payments, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office.

The study was made in an attempt to find ways to reduce the lost payments, Cleveland said. To avoid loss, he emphasized that the payments must be applied for within three months after the retirement of a worker who has reached age 65, or within three months after the death of a worker

at any age. That requirement is one of the provisions of the Social Security Act.

Of those who lost payments, eleven reside in Corpus Christi, and nineteen are residents of the other sixteen counties which are served by the Corpus Christi office.

According to a summary of the analysis, the following reasons were given for failing to apply for the payments promptly; thirteen said they had no prior knowledge of the old-age and survivors insurance; five didn't file because they thought they had to retire permanently, and they intended to go back to work; three didn't know a claim had to be filed; and three others didn't know the filing date made any difference; two said they were too sick to call at the office and didn't know a representative would call at their home; two thought the benefits were charity; one did not know that he could draw benefits while working in non-covered employment; and one widow thought that her husband had not worked long enough to be insured.

Information which finally led them to inquire about benefits, sources by those who filed applications; newspapers and radio, twelve; other government offices, six; the Social Security office, friends, and others, twelve.

Every person who believes he may be eligible for the retirement or family insurance is urged by Cleveland to get in touch with the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.

Common Housefly Causes Thousands of Death

Austin, Tex. — Countless thousands of lives are lost annually throughout the nation, from diseases that are transmitted by the common housefly. Dysentery, typhoid fever, diarrhea, tuberculosis and many other disabling and even fatal diseases are spread by flies, and the control of houseflies becomes of great importance when considered in the light of public health.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, says that in order to protect our families we should make sure our homes are fly-proof through proper screening, and then concentrate on eliminating filth, garbage, and other breeding places for flies.

"See that your windows, doors, and porches are screened so that the stray fly from some careless neighbor cannot molest your family," Dr. Cox said, "and make sure that your grocer observes proper sanitation standards and keeps your meat, food and vegetable supplies screened from flies.

"Then direct your efforts to eliminating all fly breeding places such as open garbage pails, open privies and other filth that offers the fly proper warmth, moisture and food. Flies thrive on filth, and inasmuch as one female housefly will lay from 600 to 1,000 eggs per season, it can easily be seen

The pupils of Mrs. Bertha Harper, third grade teacher held their annual birthday program Monday morning with Mrs. Jack Hagar, guest speaker.

Mrs. Hagar lectured on birds and other wild life in this Gulf Coast area and told the pupils that more migrant birds have been seen here this spring than ever before, due to the very severe winter and late spring, and that during the month of April more than 50 authorities on bird life from the northern states have been her guests to observe the habits of these migrants.

Health Clinic Uncovers Many Visual and Dental Difficulties

T. Houston Foster, grade school principal, reported this week that more visual and dental difficulties were found as a result of the Health Clinic sponsored by the P.T.A. April 25 to 28 than were anticipated.

Examinations included that of the eyes, ears, tonsils, teeth and heart. Out of 442 pupils enrolled in the grade school, 410 were examined. The largest number of defects recorded were of the teeth. However, Mrs. Simon Lee Sorenson, social hygiene chairman in charge of the clinic, reported that a large number of cases reported as defects needed cleaning only, and as a result the figure is misleading.

The examination showed 113 children with enlarged or slightly enlarged tonsils. Visual defects were reported for 160 of the children tested. Twenty-four were reported to have defective hearing and twelve were reported to have a heart defect, out of these 12, nine were in the first four grades of school.

Thirty-eight out of 66 pre-school age children who will be eligible to enroll in the first grade school next fall were checked for heart and tonsils. Tonsils of 24 out of the 38 were reported to be enlarged or slightly enlarged. No heart defects were found in the group. Tests for sight and hearing were not checked but the P.T.A. hopes that these tests can be made in the fall.

Only 50 high school students out of a total of 132 enrolled took advantage of the clinic. The P.T.A. did not have available this week the results of the tests made for the Fulton school children.

Dr. Fred Chastain and Dr. H. A. Thomas, dentists from Aransas Pass, donated their services so that the dental examination could be included in the clinic. Examination of the heart and tonsils were made by Dr. L. G. Wood and Dr. H. F. Elliott. Eyes were examined under the supervision of registered nurses Mrs. J. P.

State Land Commissioner Offers Aransas County Public Land for Sale

Austin.—State Land Commissioner Bascom Giles states there is still public land for sale in Texas. However, not much of it, as Texans measure land. Less than one per cent of the once colossal public domain is available to high bidders as the unsold acreage has dwindled to a total of 1,025,875.70 acres. (The total acreage of the state is 172,687,000).

The unsold land includes 115.10 acres in Aransas County.

Not all of the million acres can be purchased, Giles explains. The domain is administered by the School Land Board, of which Giles is chairman.

"No school lands within five miles of oil or gas production can be sold," Giles points out.

When there is sufficient demand the School Land Board authorizes the sale of specified tracts. A public sale is advertised and information about the tracts supplied by the General Land Office upon request.

Sale is by sealed bids. The high bidder, if conforming with all regulations, is the new owner.

The terms are 20 per cent down with 40 years to retire the balance at five per cent interest. The Permanent School Fund retains one-sixteenth free royalty in all oil production and one-eighth free royalty in sulphur production.

New Biologist At Marine Laboratory

Wm. L. Haskell joined the staff of biologists at the marine laboratory this week where his work will be concerned chiefly with oysters.

Haskell is a graduate of Oregon State University, served in the South Pacific during the war and has been employed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Alaska and Oklahoma. He has also done work on the Yakima oysters beds off the Oregon coast.

Haskell with his wife and child are at present looking for a place to live in Rockport.

Army Offers Graduates Technical Training Prior To Actual Enlistment

"The Army has now perfected a plan enabling the high school graduate to choose his specific type of technical training prior to his actual enlistment," according to T/Sgt. Vincent T. Rocha, local Army and Air Force recruiter.

"This plan is expected to prove very attractive to those young men graduating this month," he said. Although most graduation exercises in this area will not be held until the latter part of the month, those young men expecting to graduate may apply immediately for their choice of training and avoid delays in securing the school they desire. Such application at this time does not necessarily obligate the graduating senior to enlist," Sgt. Rocha stated.

Application blanks are now available for the prospective applicant to choose his specific type of technical training. The application is then sent to the training division of this area for approval. It will then be returned authorizing a reservation for the applicant to attend the technical school upon completion of his basic training. In the event that the school does not have a vacancy, the high school graduate will be so informed.

Sgt. Rocha pointed out that this plan either guarantees the applicant his choice of training or specifically states that no opening exists in that particular field at the present time thereby informing the applicant as to his future course before he ever actually enlists in the Army.

This plan is in line with the Army's policy of accepting enlistments from only the highest type of applicants. Those young men interested in applying for this specific schooling offer may contact the local post office for information as to Sgt. Rocha's next visit in this area.

Social security benefits are earned insurance, not charity, according to a statement by H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

"Old-age and survivors insurance is not a dole but an annuity based upon the wage earner's employment and contributions—his own by right of purchase and something to be proud of," Cleveland emphasized. "Some people have an apologetic attitude when they file a claim for these benefits. In some cases, older workers have lost benefits by not filing a claim. Their only reason for not filing was that they hesitated to admit that they were 65 years old and no longer working."

"Every one who has worked on Social Security jobs should get in touch with the social security office when he reaches age 65", Cleveland said. The office which serves this area is: Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor St., Corpus Christi, Texas.

Thousands of Texas Children Received Benefits During 1948

Austin.—Almost four thousand Texas children from more than 225 counties have received beneficial services and aid to happy, normal living under the Crippled Children's Division administered by the State Health Department, during the calendar year 1948. This information is shown by the annual report issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

According to Dr. Cox, the most commonly treated conditions are late effects of acute poliomyelitis, cerebral palsy, osteomyelitis, tuberculosis of joints, cleft palate, harelip, and clubfeet. Although the services are provided for children from birth to 21 years, the largest group treated were from the age bracket of 5 to 14 years.

The help given these crippled children represents 3,747 clinic visits, 43,433 days of hospital care, 2,897 days of convalescent home care, and 4,986 doctor's visits. "As long as sufficient State funds are available, any crippled

Texas child of normal mentality, under twenty-one years of age, whose parents or guardians are unable to pay for proper care, is entitled to help of the Crippled Children's Division," Dr. Cox said, "if his doctor believes that it is reasonable to expect that the child can be improved through hospitalization, medical or surgical care,

artificial appliances, or through a combination of these services." Parents of crippled children should make application for this assistance by completing application forms, which should be signed by the physician and approved by the County Judge. The application is then mailed to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin.

Tract 106 building a T-head. Atlantic Refining Co. State Tract 71 are still working on their T-head.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 2 in Copano Bay has been completed as a gas well. The rig has been temporarily abandoned.

Standolind Oil and Gas Co. proposes to erect structures for the drilling of a well for oil and gas in Copano Bay, State Tract No. 39, adjacent to the north shore of Live Oak Peninsula at a location approximately 6 miles north from Rockport.

The location is approximately 2600 feet in a westerly direction from the south end of the Copano Bay causeway and approximately 380 feet bayward from the north shore of Live Oak Peninsula.

The applicant proposes to construct a shell filled drilling base 138 by 168 feet, connected to shore with a shell filled road, 20 feet in width. The drilling base and 87 feet of the shoreward extension would be enclosed by a timber bulkhead. The bulkhead and shell fill would have a top elevation of 4 feet above mean low water. A derrick with a top elevation of 160 feet above mean low water would be erected for the drilling of the well approximately in the center of the drilling base.

3. That the new school district will be called the "Aransas County Independent School District."

4. The undersigned urge and recommend that when the consolidation becomes effective the acting board of the Aransas County Independent School District will immediately initiate a program for the construction of a new high school building and the enlargement of the Fulton Elementary School.

5. That the new high school plant will be approximately centrally located between Rockport and Fulton.

6. It is further agreed that this agreement will be recorded in the Minutes of the Commissioners' Court of Aransas County and shall be filed in the office of the County Clerk.

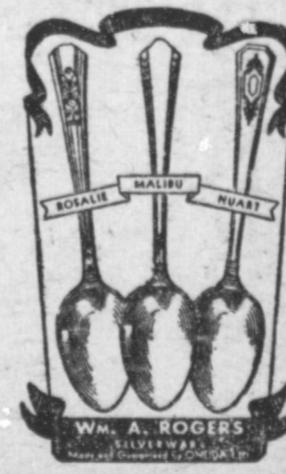
