

City to Clean **Ditches in Effort** To Aid Drainage

The City Council authorized P. Hanway to supervise the spraying of ditches in Rockport in an effort to clean the ditches of weeds and to eliminate breeding places of mosquitoes, at the meeting Tuesday night. It was believed that if the weeds can be removed from the ditches, drainage will be facilitated.

The council is making an attempt to purchase 2400 feet of 6-inch pipe to be used to extend the water system along the beach on Water street and on Broadway. With the extension of the water line it will be impossible to install fire plugs in these areas.

The council made arrangements to clean up the right-of-way around the city dump ground. It hoped that when the trash is removed from the right-of-way that the public will refrain from dumping their trash along the road and will continue into the ground and dump it in the place provided.
