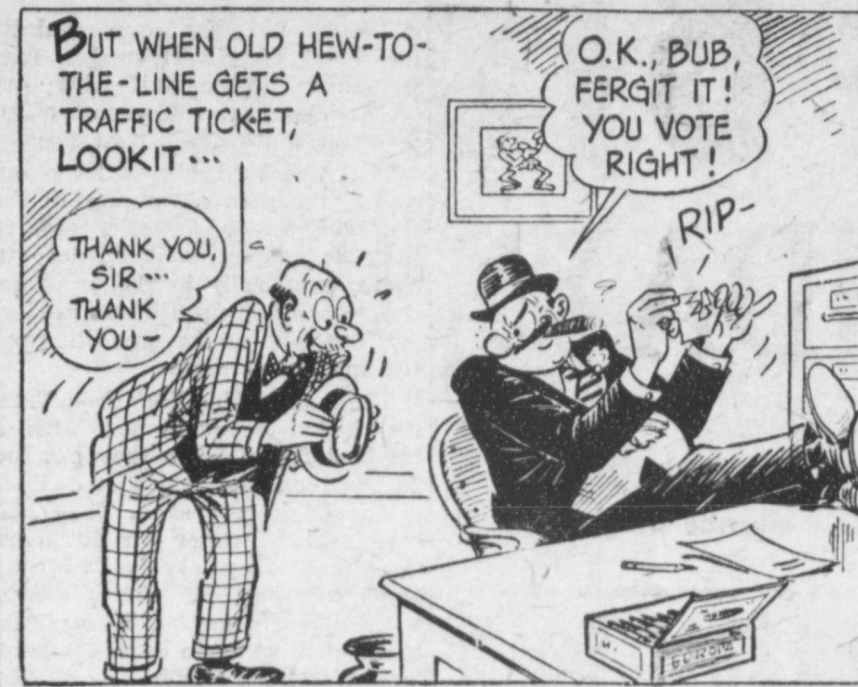
What about future improvements? Take it from this visitor, make your first project, a clean-up project.

**Mark Twain Classic Lavish Crosby Film**

Bing Crosby, who has perhaps gathered more honors and titles as America's favorite singing star than any other personality in the entertainment world, gets himself dubbed a knight in his new Paramount triumph, the technicolor production of Mark Twain's beloved classic, "A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court." They are given the opportunity of continuing their formal education while in service or learning some skill or trade that may well prove valuable upon their return to civilian life.

**DID YOU KNOW . . .**

Incorporated on May 26 in 1871 was the coastal town of Rockport. No other Texas community owed its beginning to such unique circumstances. Rockport was built in 1868 by the Morgan Steamship Company on the guarantee of the King-Kenedy and the Coleman-Fulton Ranch interests that they would ship \$1,000 worth of hides tallow, bones and hoofs every ten days.

Slaughter houses were built to handle thousands of cattle and a bone mill for making fertilizer started. The meat was first thrown into the bay as worthless, but in later years the near-by town of Fulton was the scene of beef packeries.

Cattle on the hoof brought 3c a pound at Rockport in the depression days of the range industry.—Houston Chronicle.
