'Wimpy" Wright rescued a man swimming in the Gulf while out on a shrimp, run Tuesday about 50 miles south of Port Aransas.

The Wright brothers happened to see the man swimming in the Gulf and at considerable risk to their boat, they went in close to shore, practically in the breakers, and picked him up. He was rendered first aid as he was ill from too much salt water.

The man, a Mr. Clark from Austin, had been marooned with a crippled friend when they got too far out on the beach and their car stuck in wet sand. They had been without water for 30 hours and when they observed shrimp boats trolling off shore, Clark, without realizing the distance, attempted to swim to them for help. The Wright brothers report that it was by mere chance that he was seen at all.

After receiving first aid, Clark was given a life preserver and a canteen of water and sent back to shore to his friend. The Coast Guard was notified to go down and pick them up in the car.





18 Year Olds Now Accepted By Army
