## School Tax Vote Set for June 25

A bond assumption and tax equalization election for the Aransas County Independent School District will be held on Saturday, June 25. The election is a preliminary step to the voting of bonds for a new high school.

The purpose of the election is to set the tax rate which has to be done before the bonds can be issued. By voting for the increase, tax payers will not be voting to pay for bonds which the former Rockport Independent School District has issued. The increase would provide funds for improvements in the Aransas County School District.

The election calls for an increase in the tax rate in the former Fulton Common School District and the Lamar Common School District. The new tax rate would call for \$1.00 local maintenance tax and a 50 cent bond tax. Since \$1.50 is the maximum tax rate that may be levied, and most taxpayers are already paying the \$1.50, few people will be affected by the increase.

## Drill Stem Test Run On Huffman No. 3

A drill stem test on the Floyd Huffman No. 3 is being made between 7,147 and 7,158 feet on a 150 pound flowing pressure. Two thousand feet of pipeline oil was recovered in ten minutes.

The location for the Floyd Huffman No. 4 has been set at 467 feet from Huffman's east line and 467 feet north of the Hunt-Graham lease line.

The Hunt Oil Company No. 1 on State Tract 72 is in the completion process in B-4 sand.

The Renwar-Fogelson No. 1 on State Tract 106 is being worked over and completed after a squeeze job in the B-4 sand.

The T. G. and M. rig that completed the Jackson No. 2, is now moving to the Fulton Outlet Unit No. 1, consisting of Outlots 38, 39 and 40. It is 457 feet east of the west line of 40 and in the center of 40 north and west.

Madsett-Graham have a contract to move into Renwar-Fogelson No. 2 on State Tract 106. The location is 330 feet from the east shore line of Copano Bay and 933 feet southwest of their No. 1 well. The Atlantic Company is rigging up on their No. 6 well on State Tract 71.

## Giles Explains Operation of New Veterans' Land Program

The Veterans land program is now a reality.

The idea was born in the hearts of the veterans themselves while they were overseas and thinking about home. Their letters to my office asking how they might obtain a farm or ranch home if and when they returned, inspired me to put the machinery of this program in motion.

Last week Governor Jester's signature made the Veteran's Land bill into formal law. The bill was sponsored in the upper House by Senator John Bell of Cuero and in the lower House by Representative Reuben Senterfitt of San Saba.

The legislation grew out of a Constitutional Amendment adopted by the Citizens of Texas in a special election in November of 1946. At the following session of the Legislature the necessary enabling legislation failed to receive final consideration in the Senate.

The 51st Legislature, promptly and without a single negative vote in either House carried out the mandate of the people, making it possible for Texas Veterans of World War II to own a farm or

ranch home of their own choosing by making a small down payment with the balance financed by the State at a low interest rate.

The Legislature has placed the administration of this program in the hands of the Governor, Attorney General and the Commissioner of the General Land Office.

## County Airport Included In CAA Fund Request

According to a letter received this week, funds for rehabilitation of the Aransas County Airport are included in a request sent to congress by President Truman for appropriation of \$268,807 for the Civil Aeronautics Administration to be spent on repairs of six airports. The airport here would receive \$21,268.

The application has been approved by CAA and the grant is considered assured, Emory Spencer said.

The field near Copano bay was built during the war and was leased for three years under a 100 percent use and maintenance contract. For one year it was administered by the War Assets Administration and fell into disrepair before being taken over again by the county. Spencer filed a claim for repair funds under the Federal Airport Act 18 months ago.

The money will be spent to give taxi-ways and runways a sealcoat, for cleaning ditches, and graveling the field.

The airport logs an average of ten planes a day.

## Ground Breaking For New Church Held Sunday

Ground breaking ceremonies for the new Presbyterian church were held at the new site across from the school Sunday.

Rev. T. H. Pollard gave the welcoming address. Rev. G. W. Cro-

foot of the Woodlawn Presbyterian church in Corpus Christi led the opening prayer.

Greetings from Rev. T. O. Perrin, pastor of this church in 1908-09; Rev. and Mrs. Francis M.

Davis, former minister of this church; the Falfurrias Presbyterian church and the Refugio Presbyterian church were read.

Rev. Sam Hill of Cuero, the principal speaker, was introduced by Rev. Pollard. Rev. Hill stated that this new building was not a memorial to a people, not to a man, but to Christ. He also delivered greetings from the Cuero Presbyterian Church.

Rev. J. G. Ramsey of Robstown led the closing prayer and benediction, after which the group repeated the Misaph blessing.

Other out-of-town guests included Rev. Burton Riddle of Aransas Pass and Mr. and Mrs. Morgan C. Wheeler of Beeville.

## Large Shrimp Catches Made During Month

Gulf shrimping continued to be successful during the last week with many boats bringing in large catches. All of the shrimp are large ones of the 15-20 count to the pound.

Among the good catches reported from Rouquette and Wendell were: the Jack O'Diamonds captained by Henry Madden with 4,000 pounds and 1500 pounds, the Mitchell piloted by Nino Garcia with 1600 pounds, and the Sara Marie with 3,000 pounds by Charlie Hull. All of these shrimp were caught between Corpus Christi Pass and Freeport.

At Jackson Seafood, Fred Werhan unloaded 4,000 pounds from the "Babo," A. L. Brundrett had 3,000 pounds on the Sherry Lynn, and R. O. Morgan brought in 2,000 pounds on the "Bibbs". These shrimp were caught between Port Aransas and Pass Cavallo.

During the last month at the Fulton Fish Company, Roy Courts, Jr., on the Capt. W.B.J. brought in 11,000 pounds, E. E. Frandliog unloaded 10,000 pounds from the A. C. Glass, the Barbara carried 8,000 pounds with Milton Courts at the wheel.

During the last two weeks several good catches were unloaded at Casterline Fish Co. Those in the upper bracket were Wiley Allen on the Lorene with 1800 pounds, Rufus Casterline on the Lillian with 3,000 pounds, C. L. Grant on the Mildred G. with 3,000 pounds, and Raymond Owens on the "Billy Boy" with 1,760 and 2,000 pounds.

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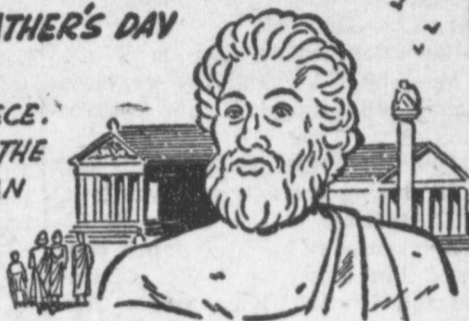

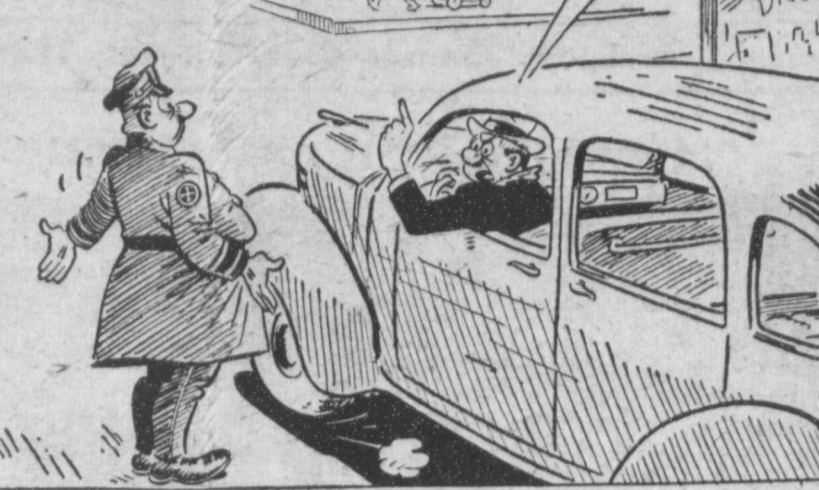

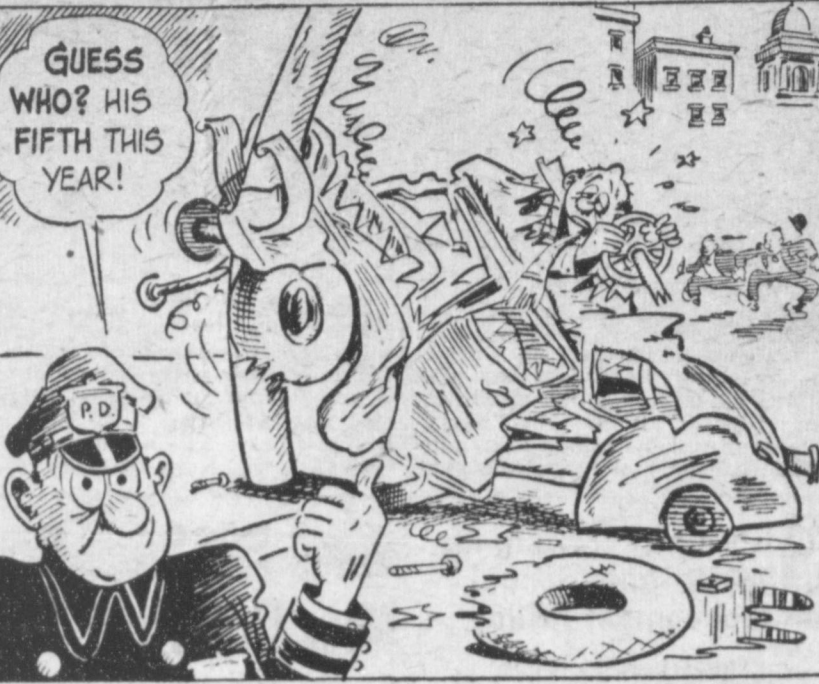

and made two runs, ending the Sharks' scoring for the day. The score was now 6-3 with Ingleside in the lead.

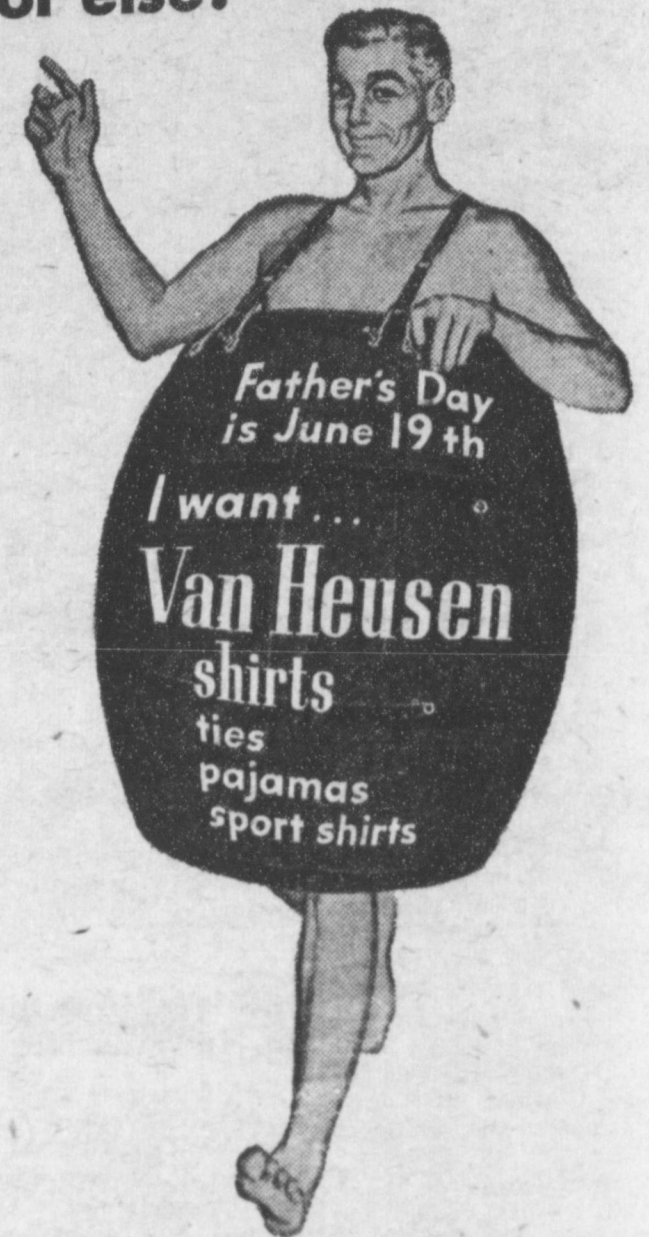
But the Sporters' bats did not stop until six runs later, making the final score 12-8.

**Bureau of Census Representative Will Call on Small Businesses**

If you own a store, a barbershop, a laundry, a wholesale establishment, or, in fact, almost any kind of business that serves the public, a representative of the United States Bureau of the Census will soon be calling on you. This census of Uncle Sam's approximately three million business establishments is the first of its kind since before World War II.

Business men themselves have asked for this vast inventory to help them give their customers increasingly better goods and service—at increasingly lower costs, and to map out their own business futures. The business census is confidential in that no information about an individual store may be revealed in any way. And no

such information may be used for purposes of taxation, legislation or investigation. The Census Bureau combines the information from all stores in a given kind of business for statistical purposes only. The census bureau urges that all businessmen fill out reporting forms promptly and accurately to help make the census a good census.

Enumerators for the Census Bureau will begin taking the business census within a week or 10 days in Rockport, B. R. Freeland, supervisor of the Corpus Christi district office, announced.

Applications for social security account number cards for the same period have increased to about 2400, a 6 per cent gain over last year, it was stated.

**State Health Dept. Recommends Fly Eradication Program**

Austin, Texas.—During the last several summers, considerable enthusiasm was shown by various local organizations such as Chambers of Commerce, many civic organizations, and others in the arranging of a fly eradication program. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that for taking interest in this work, the responsible parties are to be commended.

However, without year-round community sanitation the ultimate result, which is so important has not always been too successful; in some areas this has given rise to rumors that flies are DDT resistant.

"The Texas State Department of Health heartily endorses a fly spraying program, provided it includes a general clean-up program carried out during the entire year," Dr. Cox said. "For example, why spray a garbage heap that not only invites but actually breeds flies when it should have been removed. Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered. I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of perfume or toilet water to overcome B.O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles, decaying vegetation should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying. Proper garbage and rubbish containers with fly tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer outfit preferably with one or more hoses each manned by a skilled operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed.

A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is covered with grease, dirt or soot. This usually lasts four to six weeks. After that, a second spray is recommended provided the item of clean-up is still being carried out.

outstanding provisions of the new law:

The board may issue up to \$25 million in bonds to finance the program.

Land may be purchased from an individual, from the State, or corporations for re-sale to veterans at cost.

Veteran may select land which he desires to purchase subject to the approval of the board.

The maximum purchase by each veteran shall not exceed \$7,500 to be financed by the State.

Veterans disabled by combat service connected disability have 90 days preference right to purchase.

Lands may be purchased for a minimum of 5% down payment with 40 years to pay the balance at 3% interest. (This indebtedness may be retired sooner if the veteran wishes).

All money received during the six remaining years of operation shall be used to pay interest on bonds and to purchase additional land for re-sale to veterans. The purchaser shall not transfer or sell lands purchased for a period of 3 years from the date of purchase. The veteran will not be permitted to make more than one purchase. The veteran is not required to reside upon the property.
