School Tax Vote Set for June 25

equalization election for the Aransas County Independent School District will be held on Saturday, June 25. The election is a preliminary step to the voting of bonds

for a new high school. The purpose of the election is to set the tax rate which has to be done before the bonds can be issued. By voting for the increase, tax payers will not be voting to pay for bonds which the former Rockport Independent School District has issued. The increase would provide funds for improvements in the Aransas County School District.

The election calls for an increase in the tax rate in the former Fulton Common School District and the Lamar Common School District. The new tax rate would call for \$1.00 local maintenance tax and a 50 cent bond tax. Since \$1.50 is the maximum tax rate that may be levied, and most taxpayers are already paying the \$1.50, few people will be affected by the increase.

County Airport Included In CAA **Fund Request**

According to a letter received this week, funds for rehabilation of the Aransas County Airport are included in a request sent to congress by President Truman for appropriation of \$268,807 for the Civil Aeronautics Administration to be spent on repairs of six airports. The airport here would receive \$21,268.

The application has been approved by CAA and the grant is considered assured, Emory Spencer

The field near Copano bay was built during the war and was leased for three years under a 100 percent use and maintenance contract. Spencer filed a claim for repair funds under the Federal Airport Act 18 months ago.



Melton of Waco was spray a garbage heap that not only a guest at Bay Shore Cottages last invites but actually breeds flies when it should have been removed. Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered. I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of perfume or toilet water to overome B.O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles,, decaying vegetation should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying. Proper garbage and rubbish containers with fly tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer outfit preferably with one or more hoses each manned by a skilled operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed.

A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is overed with grease, dirt or soot. This usually lasts four to six weeks. After that, a second spray s recommended provided the item of clean-up is still being carried
