#### Application Is Made For Seismic Work

The Apache Exploration Company of Houston proposes to conduct seismic explorations in the west half of Copano bay and all of Mission and Port bays at a location central to a point ap-

# Texas Veterans Free To Select

By BASCOM GILES Commissioner of the General Land Office

Texas Veterans for a farm or ranch home of their very own,

One of the most attractive fea-tures of this bill is that section which permits a veteran to personally select a tract of land suitable for agriculture or grazing held under private ownership in any sector of the State. It might be

sector of the State. It might be owned by kinsmen or by a corporation—it matters not to the Board. What will matter to the Board will be that the veteran feels reasonably sure that it will serve his purpose and needs; that it must have at least half of the mineral rights unencumbered and that the land is worth the asking price.

rights unencumbered and that the land is worth the asking price.

After the veteran has made his selection his next step will be to furnish the Board with a complete abstract and description of the property so that it may be appraised. At the same time he files his application with the Board, he will pay to the Board his initial down payment of NOT less than five per cent of the total purchase under the full loan of \$7,500.00.

The term "state owned land" does NOT include Public School Land but will include land acquired by the State from other state or federal government agencies, or


