Delays Slow Farm To Market Road Construction

Due to several delays, construction on the farm-to-market road, which will extend 13.8 miles in a northwesterly direction from Rockport to the San Patricio County line and intersect with the highway at Bayside, has not begun. The road will start with the back road between Rockport and Aransas Pass, swinging westward across Port bay by the new causeway.

The road material question has not yet been settled. The engineering force from Refugio seems to be neglecting this county for a job on the Refugio-Goliad road. Another delay was caused by the signing of the deeds. It is expected that all of the remaining deeds will be signed during the next two weeks.

Aransas County is to furnish the right of way and move fences. The right of way is needed to widen the old road. The county's part of the job is almost completed, according to Judge D. R. Simmons. The road will be constructed and maintained at the expense of the state under the 1959-51 Federal State Farm-to-Market road program as part of the designated system of highways of Texas.

Application Is Made For Seismic Work

The Apache Exploration Company of Houston proposes to conduct seismic explorations in the west half of Copano bay and all of Mission and Port bays at a location central to a point approximately eight miles northwest of Rockport.

The work would be done by jetting temporary casings to a minimum depth of 20 feet below the bed of the bay at intervals of 1000 feet to 3000 feet along straight intersecting lines spaced at intervals of one mile. Charges of explosive would be detonated near the bottom of the casings and seismic recordings made. The applicant proposes to remove all obstructions from the waterway immediately after seismic recordings have been made. If not removed promptly, the casing would be marked by red flags during the day and red lights at night. No casing would be placed within 500 feet of dredged channels, open water extensions to dredged channels, bridges, wharves, or other improvements in regulations issued by the State General Land Office.

The decision as to whether or not a permit will be issued must rest primarily upon the effect of the proposed work on navigation.

Covered by the law are all public officers of the state, counties, cities, and school districts. Governor Jester signed the bill into law June 8, and it became immediately effective.

Aransas Wildcat Dry Hole; Huffman No. 3 Is Completed

Graham-Spencer No. 1 W. H. Wheeler, drilled to contract depth of 8500 feet set casing to 7150 feet. Perforated at 7121 and recovered salt water. After squeeze jobs and finally acidized and tested salt water, declared dry and abandoned. About 4000 feet of casing was salvaged and the hole cemented up.

Hunt-Graham No. 3, F. G. Huffman completed and on 8-hour test showed 1125 pounds surface flowing pressure, 2425 pounds bottom-hole flowing pressure, gas-oil ratio 668 to 1 and made 6 barrels per hour of 42.6 gravity pipeline oil through 9-64 choke. The T.G. & M. rig is preparing to skid to Huffman No. 4, 467 feet west of the East property line and 467 feet North of the Phillips North lease line.

Location is made for Modest and Graham No. 1 F. G. Huffman, a farmout from the Phillips Petroleum Company located 467 feet Northeast of the Gwynn-Huffman property line and in the center of the lease north and south.

Their contract calls for the immediate drilling of 5 wells on the 200-acre farmout. This lease is a narrow strip of land beginning directly north of Salt Lake and running to the west line of the Fulton outlots and lies parallel to the north line of the Huffman 1200-acre tract.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 State tract 72, made 115 barrels per day on R. R. Commission potential, through 7-64 choke with flowing pressure 1020 pounds, gas-oil ratio 878-1.

Placid Oil Co. No. 1 Fulton outlot unit spudded and preparing to set surface casing.

Atlantic No. 5 State tract 71 is rigging up, preparing to spud.

Renwar-Fogelson No. 2 State tract No. 106, rigging up, preparing to spud. This is an offset to Copano Unit No. 1.

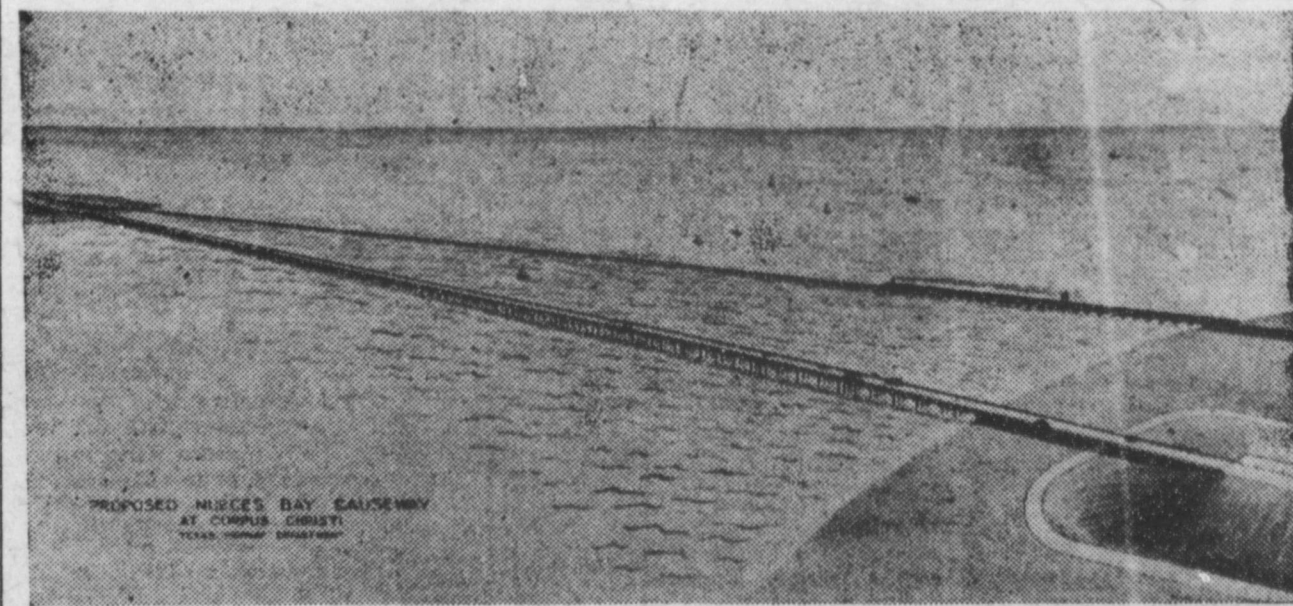

New Corpus Christi Causeway Scheduled



Construction work will begin shortly on a new causeway across Nueces Bay from the east to Corpus Christi. It is the largest single bridge contract ever let by the Texas Highway Department. Completion is slated in 1950. The above photograph of an artist's sketch depicts the causeway as it will look when constructed, with the railroad causeway in the background. The approach fill and pavement are to be built for an ultimate four-lane development. The new causeway will have only two lanes, but a like facility may be erected when the need becomes evident. Steel in the amount of 2,876 tons of structural and 64 tons of special alloy, will be provided by U. S. Steel's American Bridge Company.

School Tax Vote Set for Saturday

PURPOSE OF ELECTION IS TO SET THE TAX RATE BEFORE BONDS CAN BE ISSUED

The proposed bond assumption and tax equalization of the Aransas County Independent School District will be decided by the citizens who cast their vote in the election called for Saturday June 25.

Polls will be open at the main building of the Rockport school with Mrs. A. L. Brundrett as judge and at the Fulton school building where W. S. Steede is the judge. The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

New Water Mains Planned for City

Although Rockport has an ample water supply now, the City Council has taken steps to prevent a possible shortage this summer. C. M. Gramsuck and Son started drilling a sixth well for the city today.

James Jarboe, city engineer, and Tom Shults, water superintendent, are starting on water line extensions this week. This includes three new water mains and six new fireplugs.

The fireplugs will be on Market Street and in the north end of the city. These fireplugs will possibly reduce the fire insurance rates in those areas.

The water mains planned are: (1) a six-inch line extending down Market Street to Highway 35 to relieve the shortage in the Hunter subdivision and the western part of the city; (2) a six-inch line in the north end of town giving relief to user on Wood Patton, and Allen Streets and Broadway; (3) a line to increase the capacity on South Beach along Water Street.

This is a costly operation, but it was decided that the water situation needed attention before the streets.

Seismic Work In Local Bays

The Sun Oil Company proposes to conduct seismic explorations in Aransas, Copano and San Antonio Bays.

The work would be done by drilling shotpoint holes to a minimum depth of 30 feet below the bed of the bay at intervals of approximately 1200 feet along lines which will be surveyed and located with reference to U. S. C. & G. C. stations in that locality.

Three inch casing would be placed in the holes extending from the bottom of the holes to an elevation of 3 feet above the surface of the water. After the casing has been placed, charges of dynamite would be detonated near the bottom of the holes and seismic recordings made. At intervals of approximately 200 feet between the shotpoint lines detector positions would be located.

These detector positions will be marked by small wooden floats held in place by a string attached to a 10 pound weight. The applicant proposes to remove all obstructions from the waterway immediately after seismic recordings have been made. If not removed promptly, the casing would be marked by flags during the day and lights at night. No casing would be placed within 500 feet of dredged channels, open water extensions to dredged channels, bridges, wharves, or other improvements in the waterway.

The work would be conducted in accordance with regulations issued by the State General Land Office.

The decision as to whether or not the permit will be issued must rest primarily upon the effect of the proposed work in navigation.

A Letter to the Editor

Rockport, Texas
June 15, 1949
Dear Editor:

I have just read your editorial concerning cleaning the beach and let me agree with you completely. Our beach is one of the finest assets of our community and affords greater opportunity for pleasure to more people both old and young than any other of our resources.

However, has it ever occurred to you that in your honest zeal you may be getting in a rut on the beach subject, when from the casual observations of one who looks on it appears to be the neatest part of your town? Certainly the main street could not be cited as a criterion of neatness when the gutters and curbs are so littered with an accumulation of debris ranging from old newspapers and paper sacks, to the discarded personal wearing apparel of the fairer sex, that the water from a summer shower dries up in stagnant pools before it ever reaches the bay. Then step back just a few feet and observe that portion of the business area which is not supposed to be exposed to the scrutiny of the general public. Contrary to this fine theory our back alleys are exposed to the gawking stare of our tourists and other visitors in all their stark filthy ugliness. Unkept garbage cans, sprawling heaps of trash and old oil houses in the final stages of dilapidation are certainly impressive.

Some business areas in our town are so littered with worthless junk that the merciful growth of tall weeds which strive to cover them is a blessing in disguise. And that odor that is sometimes wafted from the regions of the bayfront by our famous sea breeze is not the tang of the sea, Mr. Editor. It arises from the rotting, green fly-infested juices that drain from trucks while in the process of loading shrimp from which thousands of pounds of heads are, each year dumped into the waters of our harbor to rot and fertilize the white-capped waves of our bathing beach.

Weeds, trash, junk, papers, cans, bottles, filth and stenches to which, we who live here have become so accustomed that we are beyond being impressed. Indeed it is not a pretty picture, and the task of its solution is a problem, which in my opinion cannot be solved by stirring editorials, nor ordinances, nor even the efforts of certain civic groups or political subdivisions. Such conditions are caused by indifference and carelessness of the general public, and worsened by the spirit of ruthless vandalism which is so alarmingly prevalent in our American people. Certainly

Holly Plans to Build Wharf Near Fulton

W. J. Holly proposes to construct a timber T-head wharf approximately one mile north of Fulton adjacent to the east shore of Live Oak Peninsula.

The proposed wharf would be 12 feet wide and approximately 602 feet long with the T-head portion 12 feet wide and 16 feet long. The wharf would consist of 2-pile bents spaced 8 feet on centers and would have a deck elevation of 6 feet above mean low water. The shoreward face of the wharf would be located at the mean low water shoreline. The bayward face of the wharf would be located in water having a depth of approximately 4 1/2 feet at mean low water.

The decision as to whether or not a permit will be issued must rest primarily upon the effect of the proposed work on navigation,

Texas Veterans Free To Select Privately Owned Land Tract For Farm or Ranch Home

By **BASCOM GILES**, Commissioner of the General Land Office
(Editor's Note: Second of a series of articles on the Veterans' Land Program.)
The recently enacted legislation implementing the Texas Veterans' Land Board will be the means of making the dream of thousands of Texas Veterans for a farm or ranch home of their very own, come true.
One of the most attractive features of this bill is that section which permits a veteran to personally select a tract of land suitable for agriculture or grazing held under private ownership in any sector of the State. It might be owned by kinsmen or by a corporation—it matters not to the Board. What will matter to the Board will be that the veteran feels reasonably sure that it will serve his purpose and needs; that it must have at least half of the mineral rights unencumbered and that the land is worth the asking price.
After the veteran has made his selection his next step will be to furnish the Board with a complete abstract and description of the property so that it may be appraised. At the same time he files his application with the Board, he will pay to the Board his initial down payment of NOT less than five per cent of the total purchase price. In the event the application is rejected the veteran's money will be refunded and he will be free to make another selection.
After the Board has appraised the land and approved the application for the loan for the balance, the applicant will be required to execute an on or before note for forty years at three per cent interest for the balance. After receiving his contract of sale he will be entitled to take possession.
Under the terms of the bill, veterans with combat connected disabilities will have a 90 day priority in financing, during which time non-disabled veterans applications will be held in abeyance.

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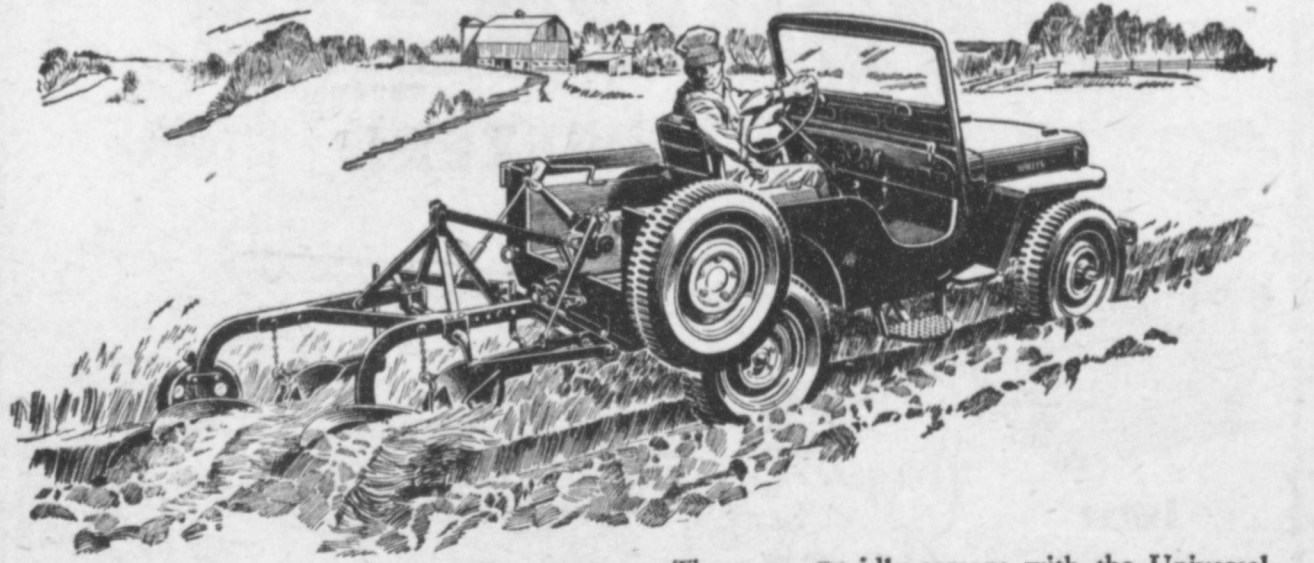

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HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be

held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session.

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Sec. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, same being September 24, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof" and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may au-

thorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 24th day of September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
