

C. of C. Secures Machine To Spray Area For Mosquitoes

Spraying, Which Will Begin When Weather Is Favorable, Will Not Be Injurious to Household or Animals—Only Insects

A fog machine has been contracted for by the Chamber of Commerce in an attempt to alleviate the menace of mosquitoes and other insects. The spraying will get underway as soon as high winds that have prevailed cease and the work can be done.

The Chamber directors appropriated up to \$500 to have the spraying done. It is estimated that it will take from

three to five days to go over the entire Rockport and Fulton area.

The work will probably be done from midnight until about noon each day. Home owners are asked to leave their windows and doors open as they would ordinarily do as the spray is not harmful or injurious in any way. Neither will it have effect on chickens, rabbits or other animals—only the lowly mosquito.

While the principal problem of the area is recognized to be that of drainage, it was believed that some measure should be taken at the present time to alleviate this menace to health and comfort.

The spray machine, which will use five percent solution, has proved effective in many South Texas towns and the directors agreed that it would be worth while to try it here. While it is an expensive operation, it believed that the benefits derived would make it worth while.

Aransas County has been fortunate this year in that there have been no cases of polio reported here. However, after the recent rains, the spraying should aid as a sanitary measure to keep down the mosquitoes and other insects and help to keep the record.

Sandy Cemetery Walks To Receive Shell

Mrs. Pat Hooper, grounds chairman of the Cemetery Association, reported at the meeting held Monday afternoon at the W. B. Allen home, that she would be placed on the sandiest paths in the cemetery leading out from the main shelled streets.

The members decided to place a sign at the west entrance to the cemetery on Highway 35 to inform the public that the cemetery is private property and is not to be used as a thoroughfare. It was believed that such a move was necessary due to the fact that the roads are still being used for travel in spite of the fact that the motorists have been asked not to do so.

Research on Trout And Redfish to Get Underway in Sept.

Biologist Dewey Miles will take over the work in September with headquarters in Rockport, J. L. Baughman announced today.

Fee of \$1 a Car Will Pay Causeway Costs

Revenue of \$1 a car passing over the new Padre Island Causeway is expected to pay for construction and operation of the span during its first 10 years of existence, Jack Gubbels, land architect, said in Corpus Christi Tuesday.

After 10 years the State Highway Department is to assume responsibility for maintenance and operation of the bridge.

Installation of Water Mains Will Start Monday

Equipment for the new water main installations has arrived and work will get underway Monday, it was reported at the city council meeting Tuesday night.

Mains to be installed include a six-inch line extending down Market Street to Highway 35. This line will relieve the shortage in the Hunter subdivision and the western part of the city. A six-inch line in the north end of town giving relief to users on Wood, Patton and Allen Streets and Broadway will be installed, and a line to increase the capacity on South Beach along Water Street.

Work on the line was scheduled to have been underway last month but was held up until reducers arrived.

Stop signs have been placed at the intersection at the corner near the Roy Hinton residence. The stop signs have been placed on the paved road going east and west. The paved street going north and south to the court house will remain a main thoroughfare. The signs were placed at the intersection to reduce the number of accidents which occur there.

Bulkhead, Breakwater Completed On Fulton Harbor

The contract held by Baas Brothers of Victoria on the Fulton Harbor has been completed. The breakwater was extended about 600 feet and the bulkhead constructed to hold a fill, from Bracht's Grocery to one block north.

Dredging of the harbor will be the next project. The federal government has authorized the dredging of the turning basin to a depth of eight feet, making it 200 feet wide and 1,400 feet long, and the construction of a 1,000 foot protective dike on the north end of the turning basin, connecting the north end of the existing breakwater with the shore of Aransas Bay.

Funds from the federal government, promised for the work, have passed the committee and are up before congress, the Navigation Board has reported.

5,000 More Stickers Promised in Two Weeks

The Chamber of Commerce ordered 5,000 more stickers featuring the "Toast of the Coast" emblem for distribution. The chamber office reports that the first 5,000 went in a hurry and that local business houses are clamoring for more to take care of the many requests for them.

Vacationers not only desire them to put on their cars but ask for a few to take home so that their friends can have one too.

Delivery of the stickers has been promised in about two weeks. The new sticker will be more colorful as it will be featured on a silver background which will make it show up at a greater distance.

Construction on Hospital-Clinic Gets Underway

A building permit was issued to Dr. L. G. Wood Tuesday and construction on the new hospital and clinic got underway Wednesday. The contractor is C. C. Fowler.

The 30 by 50 foot building with an 8 by 16 foot offset will have 8-inch concrete walls with the front veneered with Austin stone. The plans call for all concrete floors, built-up tar and gravel roof, non-combustible materials. It will be stucco outside and plastered inside.

The one-story building is designed to include a reception room, emergency room with separate entrance, X-ray room, laboratory, treatment room, examining room, consultation room, several hospital rooms, kitchen and bath. There will also be a room available for a dentist should one desire to locate in Rockport. It will be air-conditioned and will have central heating. It will be located on the corner lot next to the theater and is estimated to cost \$10,000.

Ceylon Ammons obtained a permit to erect an army surplus 16 by 32 foot frame building with asbestos shingle siding to be used as a beauty shop. The building will be located in the east one-half of lot 5, block 25, Smith and Wood, which is the Ammons homestead. Cost is estimated at \$850.

The Rockport Lumber Co. was granted a permit to erect a 20 by 36 foot shed of frame and sheet metal north of the post office on the railroad reserve property. Cost was estimated at \$400.

Mystery Surrounds Details Regarding Stab Wound

Ramon Herrera was injured outside the Sportsman's Inn Monday night about 8 o'clock and is confined to the Aransas Pass hospital.

Herrera, with his three brothers, Yegcio, Jesus and Tomas, was leaving the Inn when an argument and fight ensued between Ramon and Yegcio. Shortly after the two were separated, Ramon said that he had been cut. Examination by local doctors revealed a stab wound in the throat, whereby Ramon was taken to the Aransas Pass hospital for treatment.

The three brothers told local authorities that they did not know how Ramon was injured. The victim claims that another individual did it, a person he had been with earlier in the evening. However, county officers say that there is no evidence so far that a fifth party was present.

It is impossible for the officers to question Ramon due to the condition of his throat.

No charges have been filed to date and the investigation by county officials is being continued, it was reported late Wednesday.

Zoning is the apportionment of the land into districts in each of which harmonious uses of the property are permitted and inharmonious or injurious uses are prohibited. Zoning is an exercise of police or community power and should be designed to promote the health, safety, morals, convenience and the general welfare of the community.

GRANT OF POWER FOR ZONING: A zoning ordinance would empower the city to regulate and restrict the height, number of stories, and size of buildings and other structures, the percentage of lot that may be occupied, the size of yards, courts, and other open spaces, the density of

Part of Playground Equipment Arrives

The equipment will be placed on the small triangle at the waterfront. Chamber of Commerce directors have agreed to meet and set up the items as soon as every thing is here. The Navigation Board is mowing the grass on the triangle so that there will be no delay.

The Chamber of Commerce has had a hard time in obtaining the equipment for the children. The City and Navigation Board transferred \$471, money held in escrow, to the Chamber of Commerce 1 1/2 years ago for the purchase of park facilities. The items for the playground were ordered last year and delivery was promised and never received. Again this year the order was placed and promised within 30 days. The 30 days were up May 1, and to date only one merry-go-round has been received. However the remainder of the equipment was reported to have been shipped July 18, so the Chamber of Commerce has hopes that the children will still have a chance to enjoy it this summer.

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SO, YOU DON'T GO TO CHURCH . . .

Men like you puzzle me. By all accepted standards you are a good man and a valuable citizen. The emphasis of your life is always to be found on the side of right. You admire the finer things in life and support various institutions that contribute to culture and refinement. You deplore the conditions that contribute to depravity and indolence. You maintain vigorously the right of private property and all the principles for which men are willing to wage war.

Yet you seem to feel a reluctance and distaste to be identified with the undertaking of the church which in truth is the only institution on earth wholly committed to the support of the very program you endorse and live by. I can't get it.

Perhaps the approach of the church in the past has been unfortunate when judged by present conditions. Its appeal was largely if not wholly emotional. It seemed to go little beyond an appeal to secure a seat in heaven and escape an eternity of torment. In all this the church was sincere and in a way effective. It may be that period has ended and a different approach is more nearly in keeping with the real teachings of Christ.

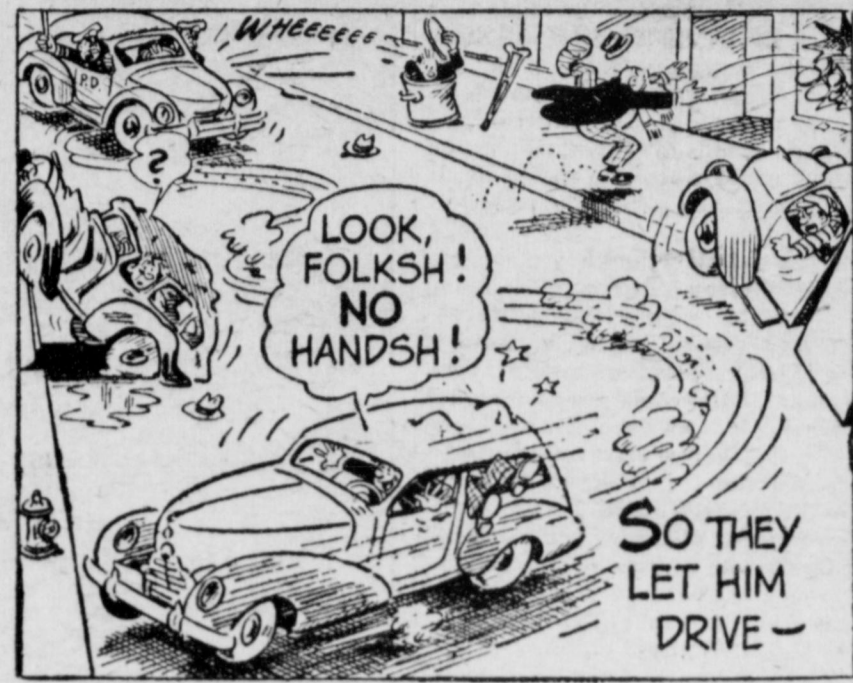
A just appraisal of the effect of the entire Christian movement would compel any fair minded inquirer to admit that the result was intrinsically practical. That out of it has come about all in life really worth while. The dignity of the individual, the equality of opportunity, the sacredness of the human body, the inviolability of private possession, liberty, freedom, charity—an endless list of values.

All too often we are apt to accept these values as our natural rights that come to one spontaneously. In fact the struggle to attain and maintain these inestimable privileges has been led and continued by the church as by no other force.

A weakening of the Church's influence would show instantly in at least a partial loss of these advantages. It is possible we are in the midst of such a transition right now. In the past as you know the leaders in practical affairs were also prominent in the councils of the church. That period was marked by a staunchness of character, a respect for the rights of others, a live and let live spirit that gave a sense of permanence and security. With the indifference of such practical men like you the Church has slipped in Sit Down Strikes, Labor Racketeering, Crack Pot schemes for Distribution of Wealth, Socialistic tendencies and Government Regimentation.

If there is any connection between these two tendencies then you and men like you have failed to put first things first. Perhaps when Christ said "Seek ye first the kingdom of righteousness and all these things shall be added" He was not making an appeal, not preaching a sermon but defining an immutable and inexorable law of nature. If so and this law is ignored, we will find it necessary some day to start all over again.

Lapsed Driver's License Renewal Made Easier

Austin, Tex.—State police have made it easier to renew your lapsed auto driver's license.

Public Safety Director Homer Garrison yesterday announced a new temporary plan under which renewals will not require new examinations. A shortage of personnel in the license division was given as the reason.

Garrison outlined these steps in the new procedure:

First: "If you have a license that was issued since Jan. 1, 1944, you may get a renewal by mail from the Department of Public Safety, without examination."

Second: "If you have a license that was issued prior to Jan. 1, 1944, you may renew by presenting the old license to a drivers license examiner in your locality and executing an original application. License in the latter case will also be issued without examination."

Formerly these applicants for renewal who had allowed their licenses to expire were required to stand a re-examination. Now, under the temporary set-up, you may reinstate your permit to drive without taking the test, regardless of how long it has expired, provided it is not now suspended or revoked.

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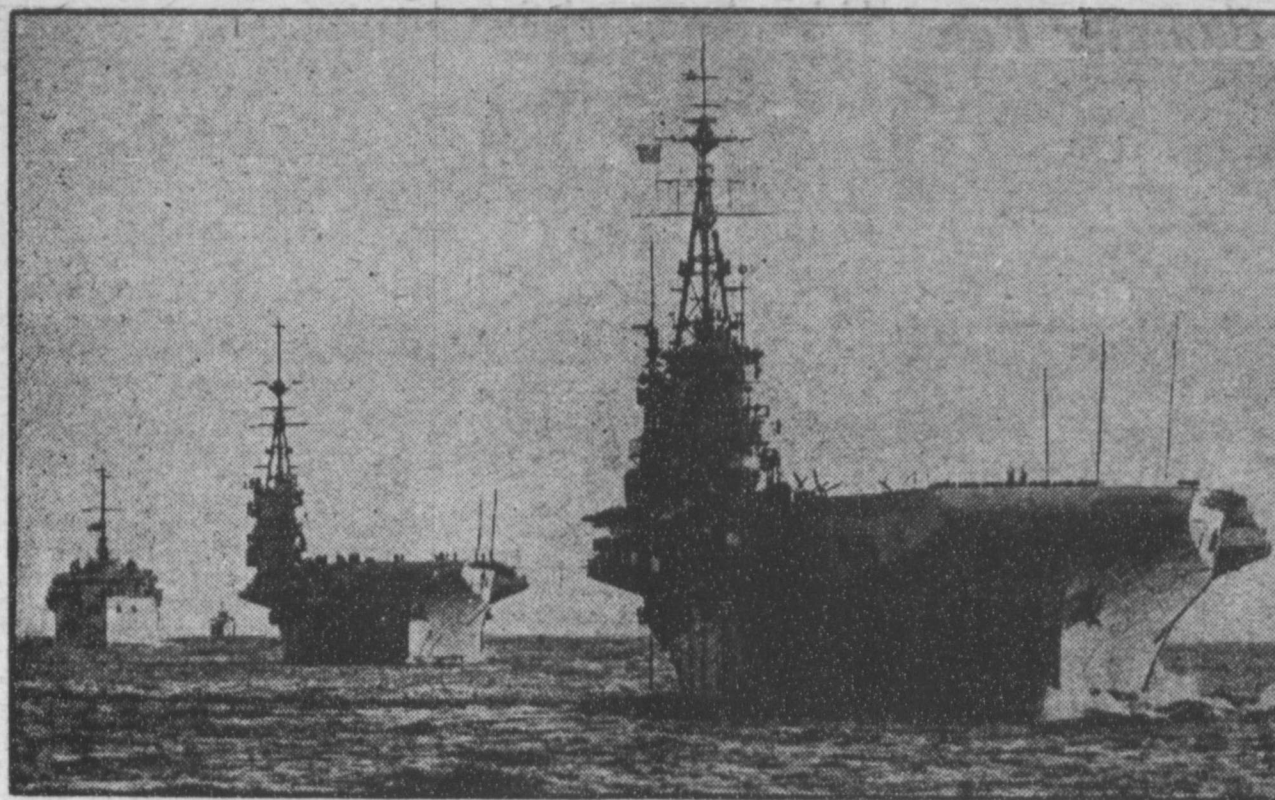

Ignorance, Carelessness Spread Tuberculosis

Austin, Tex.—There is no more emphatic proof of the power of ignorance and carelessness to spread disease than is shown by the continued ravages of tuberculosis, which is responsible for more deaths between the ages of fifteen and forty-five than any other disease.

Despite the knowledge of its cause, spread, and curative procedures, tuberculosis continues to be a grave public health problem, and today it holds fifth place among the killing diseases in this state.

These facts are disclosed by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who says, "treatment of the early recognized case is essential to recovery. It is of equal importance, from a public health viewpoint, that the spread of this devastating infection be prevented.

The State Health Officer added: "When a diagnosis of active tuberculosis has been made, examina-

tion of all other members of the family should follow as a matter of course. Tuberculosis runs in families, not because of any special susceptibility, but because it is communicable and easily transmitted from one member of the family to others."

To reduce the number of deaths caused by tuberculosis, Dr. Cox urges periodic examinations of all adults, including chest X-rays; frequent check-ups by physicians where active cases and their contacts are known; isolation or hospitalization of active tuberculosis cases, and a more intelligent application of hygienic living principles.

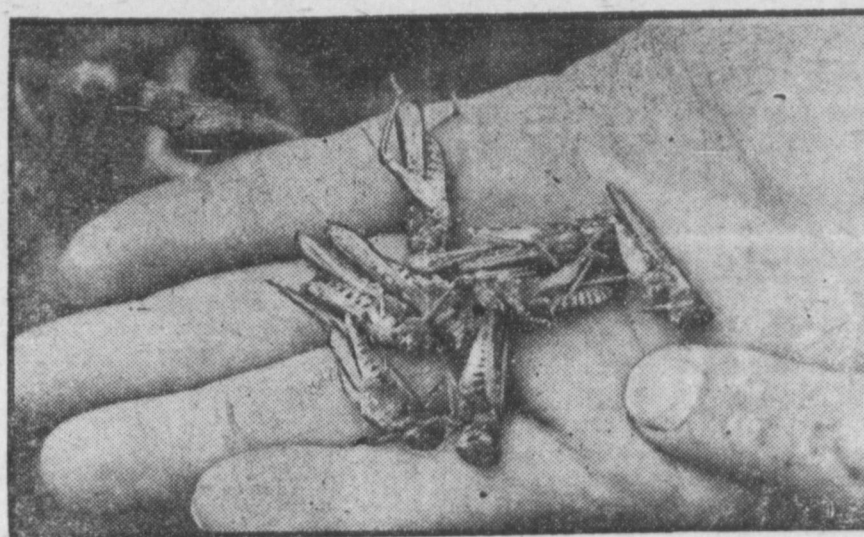

Use and Care of Social Security Card Explained

Social security account number cards are now issued in two parts, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

"Both parts of the card bear the name and account number of the applicant. The two parts of the card should be signed and kept in different places," Cleveland explained. "If the card itself is lost, a duplicate can be issued without delay if the stub or lower part of the card is presented to any office of the Social Security Administration."

"A duplicate card with the same number, of course, can be secured even if both parts of the card are lost," he said. "In that case, the records must be checked, to be sure that the number is correct, before a duplicate card is issued. This usually takes about a week, but when there is an immediate need for it, a temporary, unnumbered card, which is good until the duplicate is issued, will be furnished."

"Now that almost two out of every three persons throughout the country have social security accounts, there are a great many lost cards, and the number of requests for duplicates is increasing."

In discussing the use and care of the social security card, Cleveland advises all workers to keep the card in a safe place so it will not be lost. The card should be carried only when looking for a job.

He emphasized that it is especially important that every worker show his card to the boss when he starts to work on a new job. By doing so, he can be sure of receiving full wage credit in his account. All retirement and family insurance payments are based on each person's wage record.

In this area, social security cards and information about Federal old-age and survivors insurance can be secured from the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.

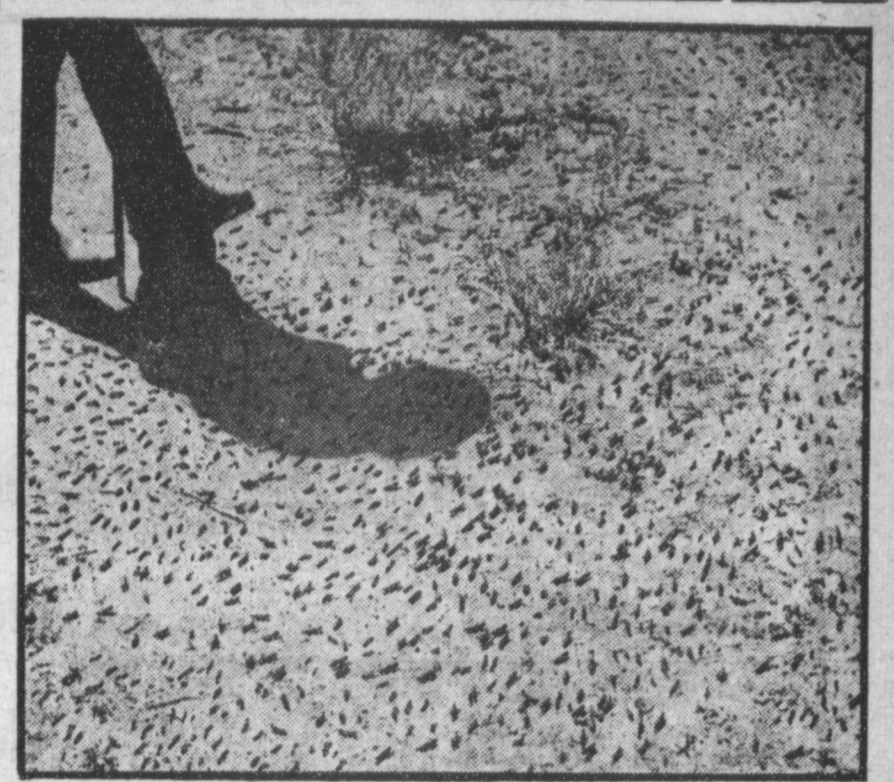

population, and the location and use of buildings, structures, and land for trade, industry, residence or other purposes.

DISTRICTS: For any or all of these purposes the local legislative body could divide the municipality into districts of such number, shape, and area as may be deemed best suited to carry out the purposes and within such districts it may regulate and restrict the erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, or use of buildings, structures, or land. All such regulations shall be uniform for each class or kind of building throughout each district, but the regulations in one district may differ from those in other districts.

Businesses now set up in what might be designated as a residential district would remain, however, if the business should be destroyed, such as by fire or storm, it could not be rebuilt. An ordinance cannot be made retroactive—it is planning for the future. Zoning cannot restrict the cost of the home or building—only the use of the land.

PURPOSES IN VIEW: Such regulations shall be made in accordance with the comprehensive plan and designed to lessen congestion in the streets; to secure safety from fire, panic, and other dangers; to promote health and the general welfare; to provide adequate light and air; to prevent the overcrowding of land; to avoid undue concentration of population; to facilitate the adequate provision of water, sewerage, schools, parks and other public requirements. Regulations shall be made with reasonable consideration among other things, to the character of the district and its peculiar suitability for particular uses, and with a view of conserving the value of buildings and encouraging the most appropriate use of land throughout the municipality.

METHODS OF PROCEDURE: The legislative body of the city shall provide for the manner in which the regulations and restrictions and the boundaries of the districts shall be determined, established and enforced, and from time to time amended, supplemented or changed. However, no regulation, restriction, or boundary shall become effective until after a public hearing in relation thereto, at which parties in interest and citizens shall have an opportunity to be heard. At least 15 days' notice of the time and place of the hearing shall be published in an official paper in the city.

ZONING COMMISSION: In order to avail itself of the powers conferred by the State Zoning Act, the city legislative body shall appoint a commission, to be known as the zoning commission, to recommend the boundaries of the various original districts and appropriate regulations to be enforced therein. Such commission shall make a preliminary report and hold public hearings before submitting its final report and the city shall not hold its public hearings or take action until it has received the final report or such commission.

Renwar Oil Corp. Applies for Pipeline in Copano Bay Tracts

The Renwar Oil Corporation has applied for a permit to place one 3-inch, one 4-inch and one 6-inch pipe line 30 inches below the bed of Copano Bay in State Tracts No. 105 and 106, adjacent to the west shore of Live Oak Peninsula.

The three pipe lines would extend east from the bayward end of the applicant's drilling base a distance of approximately 670 feet to the mean low tide shoreline. The pipe lines would then continue inland to the applicant's tank battery.

Bulldozer Slightly Damaged in Trash Fire

The fire department was called out at 12:45 p. m. today to extinguish a blaze at the old ship yard.

Trash was being burned at the yard when a bulldozer working there pulled up too close and the cushions caught fire and burned.
