## Duck Hunting Season Split This Year

### OPEN SEASONS

Open seasons for hunting have been announced by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission. They are:

**DUCKS**—November 4th, November 21st; December 21st, January 7th, both days inclusive; November 4th and December 21st, shooting not to begin until 12 noon; shooting hours on other days, ½ hour before sunrise to 1 hour before sunset; bag limit, 4 ducks per day, 8 in possession.

**GEESE**—November 4th to November 21st; December 21st to January 7th; 5 per day; all may be snow geese or two may be Canada geese, two white-fronted geese or one each of Canada and white-fronted; shooting hours, ½ hour before sunrise to 1 hour before sunset.

**AMERICAN RED-BREADED MERGANSERS**—November 4th to November 21st; December 21st to January 7th; 25 singly or in the aggregate; no possession limit after the opening day of season; shooting hours, ½ hour before sunrise to 1 hour before sunset.

**COOTS**—November 4th to November 21st; December 21st to January 7th; 10 per day; 10 in possession; shooting hours, ½ hour before sunrise to 1 hour before sunset.

**RAILS AND GALLINULES**—Open season, September 1st to Oct. 30 starting at 12 noon Sept. 1; 15 in possession; 15 per day; 15 in the aggregate of all rails; shooting hours, ½ hour before sunrise to sunset.

**WHITE-WINGED DOVES**—Open season, September 16th, 18th and 20th; shooting hours, 4 p.m. to sunset; bag limit, 10 per day; 10 in possession; open season in the following counties: Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Kinney, Dimmit, LaSalle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy, Willacy, Val Verde, Terrell, Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, (Continued on Page 4)

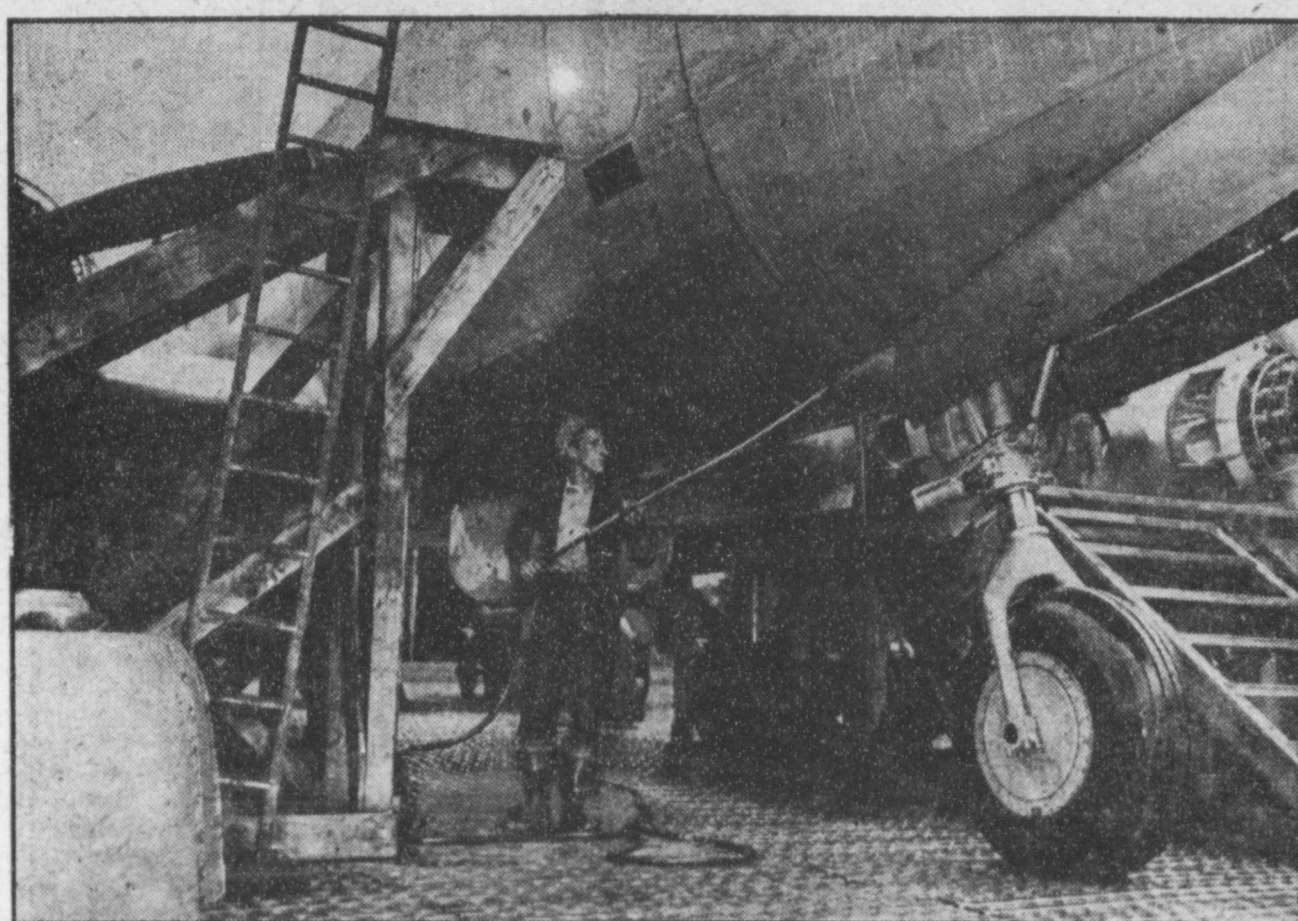

## Thurston Pleads Guilty For Failure to Stop and Render Aid

H. E. Thurston plead guilty to charges of failing to stop and render aid at the scene of an accident where damage to property was done and was fined \$100 plus costs at the office of Justice of the Peace D. The campaign to help stamp out mosquitoes and disease carrying insects will be continued by the Chamber of Commerce this week-end.

The chamber has arranged for a 6 per cent liquid coating DDT to be made available free to the public. The product will be distributed Friday and Saturday, August 19 and 20, at Ankele's Hardware and Appliance Store.

In the interest of public health each person will be given free one pint of DDT 6 per cent coating. It will not be necessary to bring containers as the product is in cans ready for use.

Ernest Jones remarked that the project certainly was worth while as there are far less mosquitoes and the spraying obviously did a lot of good.

Alec Scott and Matt Scott claim that they are among the favored few who are not bothered with mosquitoes except when there is not a breeze, which is seldom at Oak Shore. However they believe in mosquito control and recommend that the people of the county consider the 5 cent tax levy to raise funds for this purpose so that funds will be available to fight the pest throughout the season. By having a few more sprayings during the season such as this one, they are convinced that the menace in the area could be eliminated entirely.

Mrs. C. C. Fowler claimed this week that the spraying finally made it possible for them to enjoy their supper on the lawn. Mrs. Fowler said that they have attempted to do this many times this summer but have always been run inside by the time dessert rolls around. However, she said, they haven't been bothered with a mosquito since the spraying and are really getting a chance to enjoy the yard.

Jack Horton was of the belief that spraying represented money well spent. He believes that it proved 80 percent effective in the Oleander Court area and is convinced that had the weather conditions been ideal at the time that it easily would be 100 per cent.

Mrs. Joe Johnson remarked that she hasn't noticed a mosquito at her home since the spraying a week ago and claims that there were plenty of the pests around before; too many to be comfortable in the yard, she says.

Office workers in the downtown area report that they are now free to go about their work instead of devoting half time to slapping at the little monsters.

It would seem from the remarks made over the county that while a few mosquitoes remain, that the campaign against them was noticeable effective and that if the people of the area would follow up the spraying with a little DDT applied locally, the relief could last the rest of the summer. The general agreement is that the directors of the Chamber can consider the money well spent.

## Children Under Six May Enter School Without Tuition

Children whose sixth birthday falls before the 30th of November will be permitted to enter the first grade this year without additional tuition, Supt. J. F. Harbin has reported.

The school board made this ruling due to the fact that taxes from Aransas County parents are being collected for school support and it seems unfair to tax them again.

In the past tuition has been collected to make up for the amount which the state allows for each scholastic of school age. However, youngsters coming into the county during the school term who are not listed on the school census are not required to pay tuition so it was believed unfair to tax Aransas County parents because of the slight age difference.

These youngsters will be permitted to attend school providing there are adequate facilities to take care of them.

## MR. WILLIAM HEURMANN—A GREAT TEXAN

Although many men can influence the destinies of their fellows, during life, few indeed there are whose influence and beneficence extend beyond the confines of the grave. The late Mr. William Heurmann of Sinton is in that small and favored group of men whose generosity will be felt long after his generation and our generation have passed.

At his death, July 1st, Mr. Heurmann willed an estate valued at over \$250,000, to be used for research in the cause and treatment of cancer, the research to be prosecuted at The University of Texas, M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, at Houston. This hospital is The University of Texas Cancer Hospital, established by legislative action, for the purpose of studying the causes and treatment of cancer, and disseminating to Texas physicians and Texas citizens knowledge of the prevention and management of this disease. Mr. Heurmann's gift, therefore, is a gift directly to the people of Texas. It is not a gift made just to the residents of Mr. Heurmann's home community, nor to the citizenry of Houston, where the hospital is located, but to ALL benefit. It will help us when we most need help—when we are down—when we are in the grip of a deadly malady which right this minute has its brand and 40,000 of our unfortunate brethren, of whom 7,000 are doomed to die this year.

There is another aspect of Mr. Heurmann's gift which is particularly indicative of the donor's understanding of the needs and requirements of institutions devoted to medical research. Rather than describing in many pages of fine print exactly how the money should be spent, Mr. Heurmann permitted the Director of the Hospital to use it for research, as his cancer research program dictates. In other words, it must be spent on cancer research, and "it must be spent in Texas," but the exact problems are not restricted in any way. Although in the course of years many other thoughtful citizens of Texas will undoubtedly make the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research the object of their beneficence, few will demonstrate more solid horse-sense than did Mr. Heurmann. For the needs of cancer research change daily and constantly, and no living man, today, can predict what developments may occur this year or next year which will alter whole concept of cancer treatment. This fact is well illustrated by the relatively recent finding that radioactive iodine, practically unknown before the atom bomb was developed, can be used in the treatment of cancer of the thyroid gland. Officials of the M. D. Anderson Hospital, which was planned in 1941, have had to develop a whole new program of research, treatment, and building construction in terms of this and other new treatments in which radioactive substances are used.

Mr. Heurmann's gift, then, is particularly well received, for not only has it been made to an institution which can guarantee that every penny will be spent in fighting cancer "right here in Texas", but it allows The University of Texas Cancer Hospital authorities to spend the funds as the changing order of scientific development requires. This is important to Texans, for it operates toward providing them the most modern and effective treatment facilities for this insidious and deadly disease.

## LOOPHOLES in the Law

## Periodic Dental Examination Necessary Says Dr. Cox

Austin, Texas.—Tooth decay or dental caries is a destructive, progressive disease of the teeth. A large part of a tooth may be destroyed by decay with little evidence of decay on the surface, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Surveys of large groups of preschool children reveal that 50% of them have decayed teeth at three years of age, 75% at four years of age, and 90% at five years of age. Six out of ten children age 4 and 5 have as many as seven or more cavities.

Decay begins most frequently in the small pits and fissures on the chewing surfaces and at the points of contact between the teeth. Pits and fissures with structural flaws should be filled at once to prevent decay.

Dr. Cox said, "Dental examination and care should begin with the three year old child, and periodic examinations and necessary care should follow thereafter, as often as the dentist advises. The first or baby teeth should be kept in a healthy condition until it is time for them to be lost."

"X-rays aid the dentist in finding hidden cavities, especially those between the teeth. Many of these beginning cavities are located in areas where they cannot be found in any other way. X-ray pictures are also useful in finding other conditions that require immediate attention such as abscesses, impacted teeth, broken roots, bone destruction due to pyorrhea, extra teeth and other information that is important in treatment of the case.

"With periodic dental examination and adequate dental care for each child, beginning at three years of age, the great majority of the children will reach adulthood with good dental health."

Joe was a small town tough. He had the reputation of being mean and when he got drunk, which was often, he was meaner than ever.

He was both drunk and mean one day at high noon. He staggered down Main Street in his home town, shouting and shooting a pistol into the air. He was arrested and charged with unlawfully carrying a pistol.

The charge read, in part, as follows: "... that Joe — did, on or about the 4th day of October, 1939, in the County of Harrison, the State of Texas, then and there unlawfully, on or about his person, carry a pistol. . . ."

Joe was brought to trial, but then the charge was dismissed and he was released.

The reason for this action was that the word "and" should have been used instead of the word "or" in the sentence about "did then and there, on or about his person, carry a pistol." Joe couldn't be convicted of the charge because the court ruled this should have read, "did then and there, on AND about his person, carry a pistol."

Technicalities like that one often defeat justice. The State Bar is working for the elimination of such technicalities by seeking to bring about revision of Texas' criminal statutes.

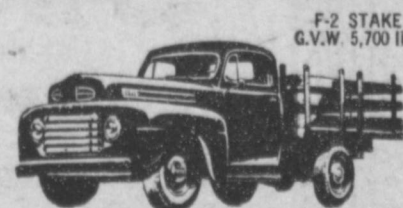

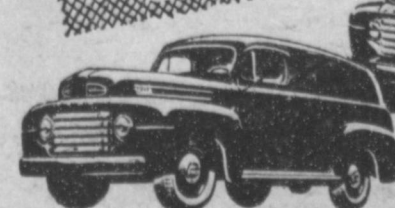

**Causeway Discussed At Rotary Meeting**

Tom Davis, District engineer for the State Highway Dept., outlined details regarding the Corpus Christi causeway at the Rotary luncheon meeting held Wednesday noon.

The approach to the new causeway will begin south of Gregory where the road will fork at the cemetery with one fork going to Aransas Pass and the other toward Taft, bypassing Gregory. A four lane divided highway will be constructed through Portland which will extend to the causeway.

For the present the causeway will consist of two 14 foot lanes with plans to make in a four road in the future. The top of the floor of the bridge will be 24 1/2 feet above sea level. The hydraulic fill approach will have an elevation of 8 feet.

The four lane road will continue into Corpus Christi to Market Street. The causeway is scheduled to be completed by Dec. 31, 1950.

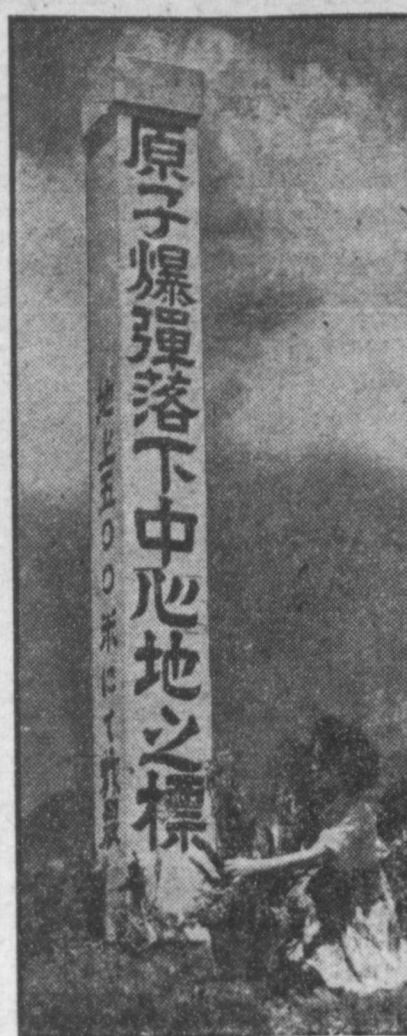
Mr. Davis said that a new type of piling of fluted steel is being used in the causeway. The piling is being driven 105 feet and more and is tested to hold 46 1/2 tons each. Approximately 5,000 tons cross the causeway at the present time and the new road will bear from 8,000 to 10,000 cars before it actually will be necessary to construct the other lanes.

The engineer remarked that the contract has been let for the paving of highway 29 from Goliad to Refugio. He also said that the contract for the farm to market road in Aransas County will soon be let and that it should be completed by summer, 1950.

Pres. Horton announced that E. J. Albin had resigned as program chairman of the club and that the position will automatically fall to Weldon Cabaniss, first vice-president.

Culberson, Hudspeth and El Paso; rest of the State closed by Federal regulations.

**MOURNING DOVES**—Open season, North Zone, (Val Verde, Kinney, Medina, Bexar, Comal, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Milam, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Cherokee, Nacogdoches, and Shelby Counties and all counties north and west thereof), September 1st to October 15th; South Zone, October 1st to November 14th except in white-winged dove open season counties, October 1st to November 11th; bag and possession limit, 10 in the aggregate of both white wings and mourning doves; shooting hours, 1/2 hour before sunrise to sunset except in white-winged dove counties, 4 p.m. to sunset, September 16th, 18th and 20th.

**WOODCOCKS**—Open season, December 23rd to January 21st in the following counties: Shelby, Nacogdoches, Angelina, San Augustine, Sabine, Trinity, Polk, Tyler, Jasper, Newton, San Jacinto, Liberty, Hardin, Chambers, Jefferson and Orange; no open season in rest of the State; daily bag limit, 4; possession limit, 8; shooting hours, 1/2 hour before sunrise to sunset.

**The Following In Effect West of Pecos River**

**WILD DEER**—Open season for Mule Deer, commonly called black-tail deer, during daylight, November 6th to November 11th, both days inclusive; bag limit and seasonal limit and possession limit, one mule deer, provided that no gule deer shall be taken except a buck mule deer with a pronged horn. Open season for whitetail deer, during daylight, November 6th to November 11th, both days inclusive, for buck deer only, having at least one pronged horn; bag limit, possession limit and seasonal limit not more than one white-tail deer. Bag limit, possession limit and seasonal limit not more than two (2) in the aggregate of all species of wild deer.

**COLLARED PECCARY**—(Commonly called javelina.) There shall be no closed season.

**WILD QUAIL**—Open season, December 1st through December 31st, both days inclusive; bag limit not to exceed 12 quail in any one day, possession limit not to exceed 24 quail in possession at any one time.

one-time, and provided that there shall be no open season on Mearns Quail, commonly called Fool quail.

**MIGRATORY BIRDS**—It is provided that the regulations governing the taking of migratory birds will be issued separately by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission and shall continue in effect for that portion of the State lying West of the Pecos River until such regulations shall expire.

**WILD TURKEY AND WILD ELK**—It is hereby provided that there shall be no open season for that portion of the State lying West of the Pecos River for the taking of wild turkey or wild elk.

**PRONG-HORNED ANTELOPE**—It is hereby provided that there shall be no open season for that portion of the State lying West of the Pecos River for the taking of prong-horned antelope.

**BIG GAME HUNTING LICENSE**—Required of all residents of Texas who hunt deer or turkey. License also valid for hunting all other species of game during open season. EXEMPTIONS—Citizens under 17 years of age and those hunting on land on which residing are exempt, but must hold an EXEMPT BIG GAME HUNTING LICENSE if deer or turkey are hunted. Exempt license does not permit citizens 17 year of age or over to hunt on land other than where he resides. Exempt license may be issued, without charge, upon application by qualified persons . . . no written application required.

**THE RESIDENT HUNTING LICENSE** remains in effect and is valid for hunting all species of game except deer and turkey, but it is not required of a person who holds a BIG GAME HUNTING LICENSE.

In issuing a Big Game Hunting License all information must be completed on the stub, license, and both deer tags. License and deer tags must be signed by licensee at the time issued.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment

authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and the proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election. c19

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session. "Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months."

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Sec. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A.D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law. Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. c19

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law. c19

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. c19

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto. c19

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; provided, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts;" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas. c19

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. c19

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary."

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding. "The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms

shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 8, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. c19

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32

proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional

Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. c19

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. c19
