# **Fishing Million Dollar Industry** In Aransas County

A break-down of the 1948 dollar value of the commercial fishing industry on the Texas coast shows the fishing industry in Aransas County to be assessed at \$1,311,-000. The survey of the entire coast was made by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission this year.

Licensed fishermen in this area number 223 and operate 155 boats valued at \$927,000, the survey showed. Thirty-eight of the boats are equipped with two-way radios and 18 boats have receivers. One been made off the flats close to stalled a depth recorder. Twenty of the larger sea-going vessels are diesel powered, the remaining 135 have gasoline engines.





### **Governor Shivers** Proclaims Dec. 4-11 Better Health Week

Austin.-Governor Allan Shivers, by official proclamation, has designated the week between December 4-11 as Better Health For Texans Week, emphasizing vener-

The purpose of the week-long drive, according to State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, is to "acquaint all segments of the population with true facts concerning this most serious group of illnesses, thus providing a weapon of knowledge which all persons can use in their own protection."

Cox indicated that health department informational campaign would be a year to year project from now on, with a different phase of public health being the subject each year.

Highlights of this year's drive will be a state-wide radio address by Governor Shivers, and a short motion picture trailer featuring the Governor and the State Health Officer. Informational packets have been prepared for distribution throughout the State by city and county health units. The official proclamation reads:

"One of the most important factors that will influence the future of Texas is a healthy citizenship. Public health has many phases, all contributing to the welfare of man kind.

"One of these is the campaign to eliminate the venereal diseases. Methods of diagnosis and treatment are at hand to prevent the unnecessary suffering caused by these diseases. All that remains now is to induce our citizenship to take advantage of the present day knowledge.

"In recognition of these facts and the vital importance of health in our everyday lives, I, as Governor of the State of Texas, designate the week of December 4-11 as Better Health For Texans Week."

Principle appeal of the campaign is directed to leaders of individual communities. Dr. Cox believes that the "final solution to the venereal disease problem will be forthcoming only when it is tackled on a community basis."



### Social Security Insurance 'Miss Grant Takes Taxes to Jump Jan. 1; Same Benefits

Washington.-A 50 per cent increase in social insurance taxes day and Monday, Dec. 4 and 5 will go into effect six weeks from Sunday, raising \$667,000,000 more

With prices now at an "all time high," world supplies for the next ctf few years are likely to remain about the present levels, the Commerce Department said recently. It assured that no immediate shortage is foreseen.

The department published a 3,ctf 500 word study of the world coffee situation by Albert M. Prosterman and Alice M. Taylor, of the food
