661,500 Fans Expected To Attend Bowl Games

The football bowls expect to stuff some 70,000 more customers into their games Jan. 2 than a year ago, giving them something of an all-time record bulge. All four of the major post season attractions—Rose, Sugar, Cotton, and Orange Bowls—have found or built new seating space and are counting on crowd increases ranging from 2,000 to 10,000.

Jess Neely's Rice Institute Owls, hustling champions of the Southwest Conference, will meet the North Carolina Tarheels in the Cotton Bowl. Rice has nine victories and a lone loss to Louisiana State College; whereas North Carolina has a record of seven victories and three defeats. This game will feature such All-Americans as Froggie Williams and Joe Watson of the Rice Institute and Charlie "Choo-Choo" Justice and Art Weiner of the Tarheels.

The Sugar Bowl will bring together Oklahoma, which swept ten straight victories, and Louisiana State, with an 8-2 record. The Sooners were ranked second nationally, topped only by Notre Dame, in the final Associated Press poll of the year.

The Rose Bowl will feature Ohio State and California State. The Coast Conference is planning to "catch up" with the Big Ten after having taken it on the chin for three straight years at Pasadena—two years ago by 49-0.

The Kentucky Wildcats and the Santa Clara Broncos will be rivals in the Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla.

Seismic Operations To Begin In Local Bays

The Humble Oil and Refining Company has made an application to conduct seismograph operations in Aransas, St. Charles, Mesquite, Mission, Copano, Nueces, Oso, and Corpus Christi bays.

The central location will be a point approximately 17 miles northeast of Corpus Christi.

The company proposes to temporarily place casings and other structures required in connection with seismograph operations in the above bays. All structures will be marked by flags during the day and red lights at night. No casing will be placed within 500 feet of dredged channels, open water alignment of channels, bridges, wharves, or other improvements in the waterway.

Petitions for Mosquito Control to be Circulated Next Week

According to Ernest Jones the petitions for establishing a mosquito district in Aransas County are being prepared this week and will be circulated next week.

This action is being sponsored by the Fulton Lions Club. These petitions will call for a vote on this question.

If the elections showed Aransas Countians to be in favor of the establishment of the district and the levy of the tax not to exceed five cents on each one hundred dollar tax valuation, the Commissioners Court is authorized to levy the fixed amount or to lower the tax to any designated sum it may determine, should the revenue be in excess of that needed to carry out the provisions of the act. The tax would be collected by the county tax assessor and collector and deposited in a separate fund.

Increase In December Postal Sales Reported

Postmaster Marion McElveen reports that there was a \$200 increase over last year in postal receipts for the month of December.

There were 18,600 one-cent stamps, 19,600 two-cent stamps, 14,300 three-cent stamps, and 1,000 air mail stamps sold this month. Of the 62,500 stamps sold, 90 per cent was for Christmas cards. However the parcel post was lighter this year.

There was no back-log on Christmas cards this year as there has been in previous years. This was due to more employees and more cooperation on the part of the public.

Payments Slow On Poll Tax; Must Be Paid by Jan. 31

75% of City Taxes Have Been Paid

Sheriff A. R. Curry pointed out this week that there has been a lag in the payment of poll taxes. Out of the expected 1,400 payments only 169 poll taxes have been paid. One exemption has been granted.

In the past the property taxes and poll taxes were assessed together. However the law has been changed. The taxes are paid separately now. A poll tax receipt is not required in order to pay the property tax.

Although January 31 is the deadline for paying the taxes, Sheriff Curry advises the public to pay their taxes early. It will create a rush if everybody waits until the last day.

Every person between the ages of 21 and 60 must pay a poll tax to vote, unless he is granted an exemption. Over 60 a tax is not required to be able to vote. Also, the state law provides that in towns with a population under 10,000, exemptions are not required for such people.

Special attention is called to the fact that 1950 is an election year for county and state officers.

The poll tax is \$1.75. Mrs. Bonnie Townsend, city secretary, reports that 75 per cent of the current 1949 city taxes have been paid. Of the approximately \$20,250 collectable, \$14,765.07 has been collected.

In order to receive the one per cent discount the taxes must be paid by December 31. The taxes become delinquent if not paid on or before January 31.

Aransas Channel to Be Dredged by Dock and Channel Company

The Aransas Dock and Channel Company of Aransas Pass proposes to dredge the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway, on the right descending side of the tributary channel to Aransas Pass at the entrance to the turning basin there.

The company proposes to dredge a 9x100x525 foot slip, to construct levees and bulkheads, and to drive mooring piling.

All work to be done would be located on, or in front of, property belonging to the applicant. No structures would be constructed, or dredging work done, within 20 feet from the near bottom edge of the projected channel for the waterway.

Prospective Deep Well Now Below 11,233 Feet

Northeast of Lamar the Union Producing Company No. 1 Virginia H. Tatton, prospective deep discovery, was coring ahead below 11,233 feet Friday on a 13,000-foot contract. It is a John Durst survey, A-51, and had recovered 15 stands of oil and 10 stands of mud on drill stem tests at 10,228-523 feet, later logging a sand at 10,945-010 feet.

In the Salt Lake area Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 J. D. Stewart, Joseph Hollis Survey, A-76, was coring at 7,050 feet Friday, after running electrical log at 6,987 feet. Atlantic's No. 2 F. G. Huffman, same survey, Friday was 7,653 feet, running electric log.

One-half of Death Rate Of Children 1 to 4 Caused by Accident

Take all deaths among children from 1 to 4 years old caused by the so-called childhood diseases, and they would total a little more than half the child deaths caused by accidents.

Figures released by the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas State Department of Health, show accidental deaths in 1948 killed 218 children under 4 years of age, 218 of them under one year, while the combined deaths from diseases of childhood—scarlet fever, whooping cough, diphtheria, measles, poliomyelitis, and epidemic meningitis—killed only 324 children in the same age group.

The report shows one of every three deaths in the 5-9 age group is accidental; four of ten deaths in the 10-19 age group is accidental, and very little decline is noted in that rate through the other age groups under 30.

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox said, "State and local health officials can prevent epidemic diseases, and safeguard food and water supplies, but it is up to the individual citizen to protect himself from untimely death by accident."

According to the report, of 100 accidental deaths, 30 involve motor vehicles, 12 are due to falling or drowning, 5 are due to drowning, and 50 are due to other causes.

and despite frequent reports of death resulting from "not knowing it was loaded," only three of every 100 accidental deaths involve firearms, the Health Department report revealed.

The state health officer pointed out that only diarrhea and enteritis, and pneumonia exceeded accidents as a cause of death in the first four years of life.

"We've made remarkable progress in prolonging life during the last decade," Cox asserted. "But apparently we've prolonged it only to have it snuffed out in accidents—mostly foolish accidents."

Scout Encampment to Be Held at Valley Forge

One hundred thirty-three boys and twelve leaders will make up the Gulf Coast Council group to attend the Boy Scout National Jamboree to be held at Valley Forge June 30 to July 6 of next year, according to an announcement this week by W. H. Gilpin of Aransas Pass, district camping and activities chairman. Scouts must be Second Class, 12 years old and be considered as good campers by their scoutmasters to be eligible. Gilpin urged all troops in this district to start now on plans for sending a boy to this great encampment. Each troop will be allowed to send one boy. Twelve top leaders of the council have been selected as Jamboree leaders. E. F. Corbin of Ingleside was the only man selected from the Karankawa district.

The 1950 National Jamboree will be held in Valley Forge State Park in Pennsylvania, the site used by General George Washington and his troops in 1777. There will be 40,000 Scouts in this single camp site. This will be the largest encampment of a boys organization in the world. The last National Jamboree was held in Washington, D. C. in 1937.

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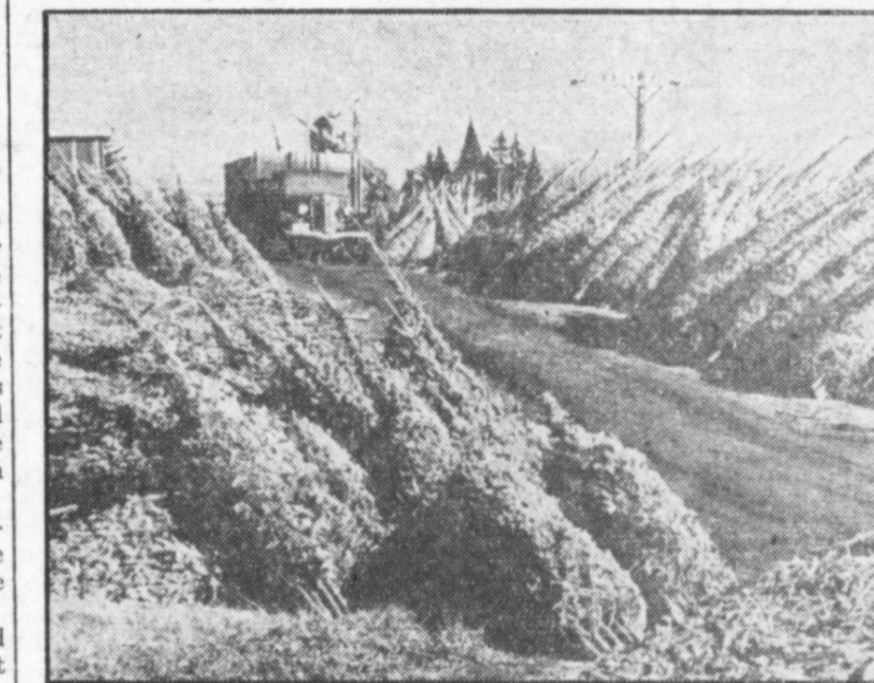
Christmas Went Underground With Puritan Ban of 1644

There was a time when Christmas went underground. People who advocated Christmas were in danger of arrest and imprisonment and it looked as though Christmas was on its way out.

It all happened around 1644 when the Puritans in England forbade any merriment or religious services, by act of Parliament, on the ground that it was a heathen festival. What resulted was much grumbling, breaking of the law and a Christmas underground which wrote and distributed pamphlets in favor of Christmas.

In 1648, for instance, was published "Canterbury Christmas." This pamphlet gives an account of the subsequent proceedings after the Cryer of Canterbury had upon Wednesday, December 22, "openly proclaimed that Christmas day and all other superstitious festivals should be put down, and a market should be kept on Christmas day. Which being not observed, (but very ill taken by the country) the town was thereby unserved with provision and trading very much hindered; which occasioned great discontent among people, caused them to rise in a rebellious way."

Among the rarest of the pamphlets issued at that time is one entitled "The Examination and Tryal of Old Father Christmas." In this little volume, "one old Christmas was commanded to be brought to the Bar, then was a jury for Life and Death to be impaneled." The Judge was called Judge Hate-bate, the Sheriff's name was called Leonard Love-

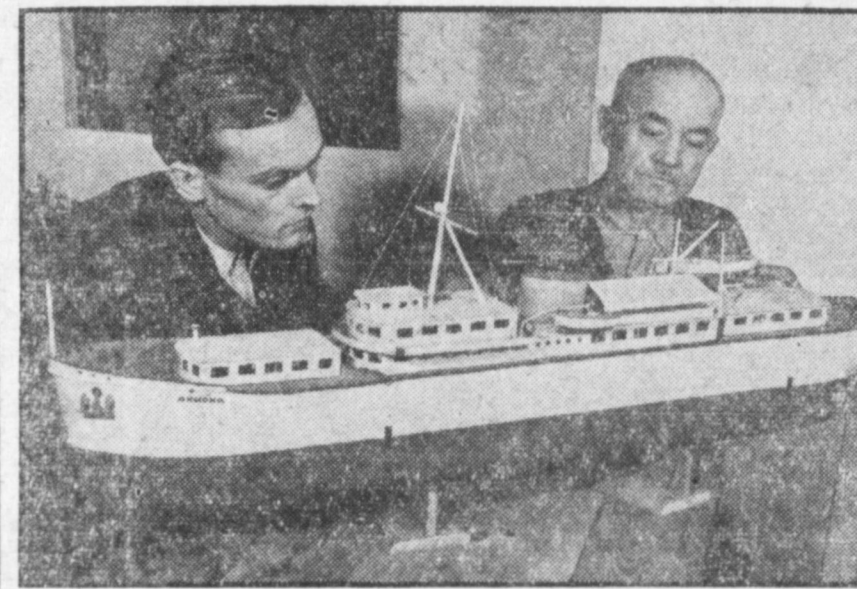

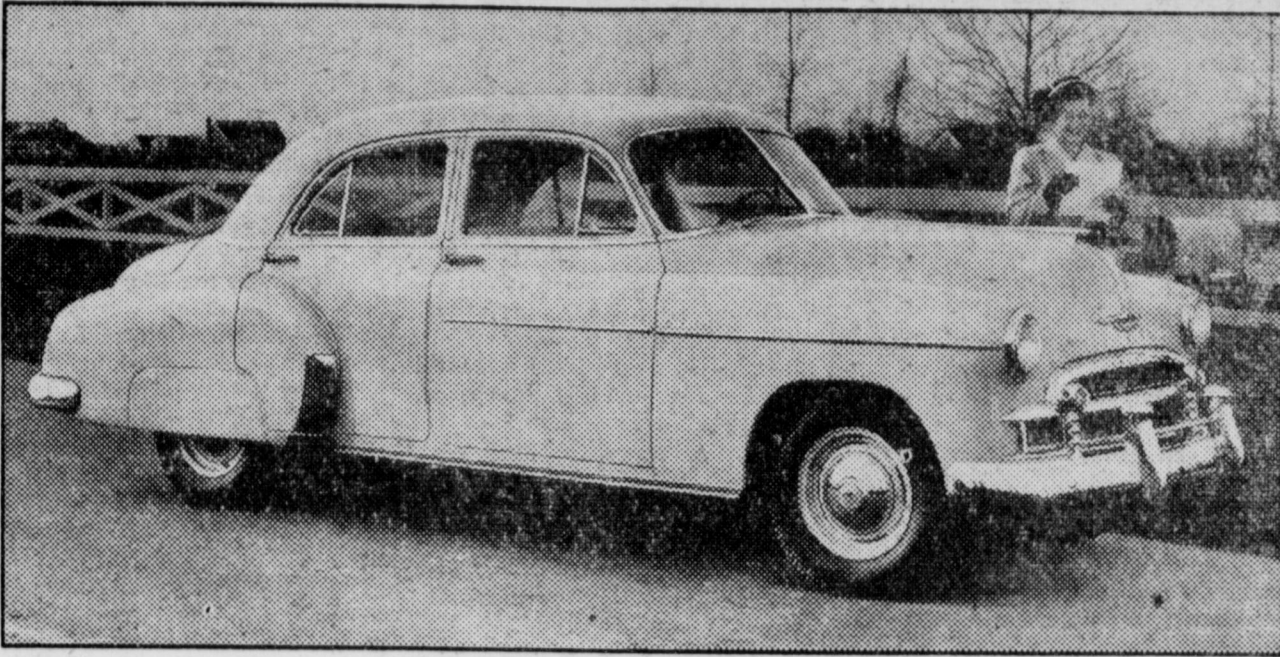

What Is Scouting?

Boys want companionship. They want to have fun with other fellows. They want to feel that they belong. So, they travel in gangs, their own gangs, under their own leadership.

This boys gang becomes the Scout Patrol, a small group of boys working together under the leadership of one of their own number. The Patrol is the unit of Scouting, whether for work or for play, for duty or for discipline.

In the Scout Patrol you have democracy at work on a small scale. The boys choose the leader they want to follow. They plan their own activities and carry them out together. They learn Scoutcraft according to their individual abilities and desires.

In the good Patrol, gang spirit—Patrol Spirit—is steadily at work producing a whole-hearted participation of all the members. The life in the Patrol creates in its Scouts a strong feeling of comradeship, of obedience to a common cause, and the willingness to help and share so necessary in life.

Boy Leadership
The Patrol Leader, elected by the boys themselves, encourages and assists his Scouts to train themselves in Scoutcraft. Besides, he helps to plan and carry out the program of the Troop, which is simply a group of Patrols, two, three, or more; working, playing, hiking and camping together.

The leadership involved sounds like quite a responsibility for a boy. But he can carry it, provided he feels that his Scoutmaster stands behind him, ready to guide and train him, and just as ready to trust and depend on him to carry through.

This guidance and training of the boy leader is given in the Troop Leaders' Council where the Patrol Leaders meet with the Scoutmaster and the other leaders of the Troop. The Troop Leaders' Council is the heart of the Patrol Method which, is not so much to save trouble for the Scoutmaster as to give responsibility to the boy, since this is the very best of all means of developing character.

The Scoutmaster
The Scoutmaster is the key man in Scouting. The effectiveness of the program depends upon this volunteer, on his understanding of Scouting, on his enthusiasm and energy, and on the quality of his efforts. He shows the Patrols the road ahead, and as the boys work toward the goal, each Patrol grows strong, and through the Patrols the Troop prospers.

The Scoutmaster's job is not an easy one. However, it isn't nearly as difficult as it may appear on the surface, particularly if he has efficient Assistant Scoutmasters and Committeemen.
To be successful, the Scoutmaster is not expected to spend weary hours on the details of running the Troop. A Scoutmaster's job is to train and guide boy leaders to run their Troop, not to run his Troop himself. By leaving the leadership with the boys, the Scoutmaster will have time to plan ahead for the Troop, and the chance to get close to the heart and mind of each of the boys.

A Scoutmaster doesn't have to be an expert in every Scoutcraft subject. A Scoutmaster's job is to help boys grow by encouraging them to learn for themselves, not to instruct individual boys in Scoutcraft.

The Troop Committee
Behind the Troop is the Troop Committee, the representatives of the institution or group of citizens that sponsors the Troop. These men have been picked because of their high caliber. Some of them may be fathers of Scouts in the Troop. The Troop Committee may be considered the Board of Directors of the Troop, the Scoutmaster deals directly with the boys. The Troop Committee, on the other hand, seldom has such direct boy-contact. Its members do everything possible to help the Scoutmaster in his leadership and to make Scouting a joyous experience for the Scoutmaster and the Troop.
