south winds have made fishing a thing to talk about and that is about all. Lack of bait in the area has not been a problem due to the fact that the weather is keeping the fishermen in anyway.

Bill Blevins supplied the area with shrimp for bait for about six days after the supply was gone. Every fisherman in the area went to Blevins for bait and the supply there was soon exhausted.

However, Blevins is not dismay ed by the fact that his shrimp hatchery failed to provide the desired bait during a period of no bait as he had planned that it would do. Blevins admits that he is experimenting and reports that he has learned a lot this year.

The first problem he ran into in the fall was a high tide which released the major supply of the shrimp from the hatchery. Later he made a huge landing but was unable to bring them in alive so had to deposit them back in the bay. As a result Blevins has made adequate installations to bring back a large supply of live shrimp should he run into them again, and distance won't matter.

The novice at the shrimp hatchery business reported that about one-third of the shrimp put into the hatchery were recovered. One of the major problems encountered was that of birds diving to the bottom to stir up the shrimp and proceeding to devour them as they came to the surface. As a result Blevins' next project will be to cover the top of the hatchery with

Bill Blevins is a determined man though and vows that where live bait was available for six days this year, they will be available for a month next year if all goes well.

Security Insurance Payable to Widows And Children

Some widows and children in this area are losing social security insurance payments because they think the benefits are paid only to older people or to the family of a worker who was 65 or older at the time of his death, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

"The truth is that survivors insurance is payable to the wage earner's family when an insured worker dies at any age," Cleveland stated. "It should be understood, however, that for a worker's family to be eligible for these benefits, the worker must have worked in business or industry long enough

to build up an insured standing." Cleveland urges that survivors of deceased persons should not rely on hearsay, but they should secure information direct from the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi,

The other half is sent to national headquarters. It is used for research to find a means of preventing or curing the disease, education of highly-skilled and muchneeded professional personnel and for epidemic aid to chapters whose local treasuries are exhausted.

However the money is distributed, all of it comes back in some form of benefit to the community in which it is raised. It comes back in improved treatment methods, trained personnel and cash when it is needed. Eventually, polio investigators say, it will come back in the form of vaccine to protect mankind against infantile paraly-
