The drive has not been completed as several committeemen have not turned in their collections. It is anticipated that their receipts will put the total well over the goal.


Sorenson has announced that the drive will be extended through Saturday, March 11, and has requested that all committeemen turn in their receipts on that day. The drive got underway March
