

Production of Carbon Black Discussed At Rotary Meet

Carl Snow, of the research division of the United Carbon Co. talk regarding the production of carbon black at the Rotary luncheon Wednesday noon.

Snow reported that 65 percent of the carbon blacy produced in of the carbon black produced in Texas and that 60 percent of the Texas production is produced in the Panhandle. The plant located in Aransas County produced 3,000,000 pounds

of carbon black per month at the present time, he said, and when the new plant gets into full production and a small plant moved here from Kansas, the production will amount to 51/2 million pounds monthly. The new plant produces a new type of carbon black which will replace the old channel black, according to Snow. The carbon black plant employs 115 persons at the present time, he reported, and the daily payroll amounts to \$1,700. Of this number, 20 of the employees reside in Rockport. 


