Deep Test Slated For Salt Lake Field

Renwar Oil Corp. of Corpus Christi will drill a 9,000 foot directional wildcat in the Salt Lake Field area at its No. 3 State Tract 105. Renwar's test will be drilled from a dry surface location 100 feet south southeast of the south shoreline of Copano Bay and 800 feet northeast of the northwest corner of the Huffman tract. It will be 330 feet northeast of William Herbert Hunt Trust Estate No. 1 Copano Bay Unit 3 and an offset to that well. Bottom of the hole will be under the bay about 933 feet northeast of Renwar No. 1, same tract, and about 330 feet north northwest of the shoreline.

Sun Oil Co. No. 3 State Tract 73, Copano Bay subdivision, Fulton Beach Field, flowed 192.16 barrels of 42 gravity oil daily on potential test through 1 7/8 inch tubing choke under tubing pressure of 1,050 pounds, casing sealed from perforations at 7,156 1/2-58 1/2 feet with 16 shots. Gas-oil ratio was 870 to 1. Casing was set at total depth of 7,161 feet.

Stanford Oil and Gas Co. No. 2, State Tract 39B, also in the Fulton Beach Field, pumped 29 barrels of 42.6 gravity oil daily, plus 30 percent water, on potential test from perforations at 7,232-40 feet with 48 shots. Gas-oil ratio was 79 to 1. Total depth was 7,672 feet, 7 inch casing was set at 7,658 feet.

Copano Unit No. 3, Salt Lake Field, 330 feet north of the south line of the Hunt-Graham lease, 330 feet from the bay and 600 feet from the west line of the Huffman tract, pumped 69.10 barrels of 44.6 gravity oil on potential test from perforations at 7,947-52 feet with 20 shots. Gas-oil ratio was 4333 to 1. Flowing pressure on tubing was 1900 pounds, 2450 pounds on casing.

Airport No. 4 is drilling at 5717 feet on sidetracked hole.

Huffman No. 5 is preparing to spud 1700 feet from the east line and 933 feet south of No. 3.

Hewitt and Dougherty No. 1 F. G. Gabriel, fourth test for the deep Mud Flats Field, was taking drill stem test on perforations Wednesday at 9,775-83 feet. The well, (Continued on page 4)

P.-T.A. Schedules Spring Round-up

Mrs. Chas. Ankele, Child Hygiene Chairman of the Parent-Teacher Association, announced this week that the Spring Round-up will be held April 10, 11 and 12.

The Summer Round-up of the children is a health project sponsored by the National Congress of Parents and Teachers through its local units to arouse the interest of parents in improving the health of children entering school for the first time. It also aims to bring about continuous medical and dental supervision of children of all ages, especially those who are apparently healthy. It is carried out in cooperation with the community medical, dental and nursing professions.

In 1925 the National Congress of Parents and Teachers inaugurated the Summer Round-up of the children in the belief that the home, which is responsible for the health of the preschool child, can make no greater contribution to the school than to send a pupil physically ready to take full advantage of the opportunities that education has to offer. The Summer Round-up not only brings about correction of defects and immunization against communicable diseases, but it provides a medium for giving parents valuable instruction in child health.

Parents of pre-school children will be notified at a later date concerning the day and hours which will be set aside at the clinic for these youngsters. The clinic will be conducted at the Rockport school.

Guilty Plea Entered To Pollution Charge

J. L. Deputy plead guilty to charges of pollution of public waters in county court last Friday and was fined \$200 plus court costs. Charges were filed by Game Warden Mullinax early in March for permitting oil, chemicals and mud from oil well drilling to enter Copana Bay waters in such quantities as to be harmful to game, endangering the operation of boats and rendering unsanitary and unclean bathing beaches.

Marine Laboratory Spring Seminar April 6-9 Offers Program Of Special Interest To Commercial Fishermen

The Marine Laboratory of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service will present a program of unusual interest to all members of the Texas fishing industry at the Semi-annual Seminar and Field Study of Marine Sciences to be held here April 6-9. Lectures on Thursday and Saturday will be held at the school auditorium.

Mass X-ray Advisory Board To Meet Monday

R. R. Rice, chairman of the Mass X-ray Survey which will be conducted in Aransas County April 27, 28 and 29, has called a meeting of the advisory board to name committees to make plans for the survey. The meeting will be held at the Fulton Lions Club building Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock, April 3. All members of the advisory board are requested to be present at this time.

The board is composed of Miss Iris Sorenson, Mrs. Chas. Ankele, Mrs. Harry Mills, Mrs. Bobbie DeForest, W. S. Steed and Rev. H. L. Fort.

Preliminary plans for the free mass chest X-ray were made early in the month when Philip Gauss, tuberculosis field worker with the State Health Department, met with representatives of the various organizations in the county.

The survey will be carried out in the same manner as was the initial survey which was held here last year. Gauss stressed the fact that it is absolutely essential that all persons who were X-rayed last year report again this year for the X-ray if the program is to be a success. The primary purpose of the survey is to detect new cases of tuberculosis so that they can receive treatment before they become ill before they have spread the disease.

Persons 15 years of age or over are eligible to receive the X-ray. Every one will receive a report. The X-rays will detect not only tuberculosis but other chest pathology. Of the 1,480 persons X-rayed last year chest pathology was found in nearly 300 cases; only 30 of these, however, was tuberculosis.

The mobile X-ray unit will be set into operation at the John C. Sorenson Grocery building in Judy's Library. Gauss pointed out that it is not necessary to disrobe for the examination. The time required for the actual X-ray is less than a minute. The machine will be in operation from 9 a.m. to 5 a.m. each of the three days to enable everyone in the county to report for their X-ray during this time.

Elections are Scheduled To Name School Board Members and City Officials

County And District School Board Members To Be Named Saturday, City Election Tuesday

Two County School Trustees and the entire board of the Aransas County Independent School District, composed of seven members, will be named at the election Saturday.

Voters are urged to remember that, according to the resolution drawn up when the districts consolidated, four trustees must be named from the Rockport area, two from Fulton and one from Lamar. All members of the board are

up for re-election except for T. C. Kelly, who resigned from the board after serving for 14 years. Steirly Rozzell has announced his candidacy from the Rockport area. Those up for re-election are J. B. Jackson, Dick Fox and Hugh Morrison, Rockport district; A. F. Dervage and Harry Wilson, Fulton; and Green Fleming, Lamar.

Voters in Precinct No. 1, which includes residents of the county living south of the railroad tracks, will vote for a county trustee from that precinct. Residents of Precinct 4 will name a county trustee this year. Both W. G. Harriest and Walter Heldenfels will seek re-election from Precincts 1 and 4 respectively.

Voting will take place at the Rockport school, the Fulton school and at the Concession hall at Goose Island State Park. Mrs. Faye Brundrett will serve as election judge in Rockport, W. S. Steed at Fulton and Otto Key at Lamar.

Qualified voters of the City of Rockport will name a mayor, councilman from Precinct 1 and councilman from Precinct 2 at the election to be held at the city hall Tuesday. Travis Bailey will be the only candidate listed on the ballot for mayor. Dick Picton is the only candidate seeking the office of councilman from Precinct 1 and Arley Shivers the only candidate from Precinct 2. These officials are seeking re-election due to the fact that they were presented with a petition early this month requesting that they consider running for these offices again.

Bailey is completing his first term as mayor. Shivers has served on the council for 6 years and Picton has held the post for four years.

The city council set the salaries for the coming year at the meeting held Tuesday night. Beginning April 1 the Mayor of Rockport will receive \$50 per month for his services. Councilmen will receive \$10 per each regular meeting attended. The council meets twice per month.

For the past several years the mayor has received \$100 per year and councilmen have received \$4.00 per month.

Major Jas. A. Jarboe, engineer who has supervised the street improvement project, met with the council and reported that the black top job is nearly completed. Thirty-six blocks have received black top and the work is completed except for touch-up work.

The work which was estimated to cost the city \$10,000 has exceeded this figure in the amount of \$800, exhausting the fund set aside to do the job. The work will be paid for in cash. Heldenfels Brothers had the contract.

Census Enumerators Will Ask Many Questions

One day in April of this year the census taker will knock on your door. Do not be alarmed or indignant when she unfolds a printed form and starts asking questions so personal they would outstrip your most brazen neighbor.

How old are you? How many years since you were last widowed, married, or divorced? How many children have you ever had? How much money did you earn last year? If you live on a farm, how many cows did you milk yesterday?

These very intimate questions are not asked just for the fun of it nor are they prompted by meddling politicians. The census taking is a very serious part of our democratic process and your frank answers are vital to the future welfare of our families, our community, our nation.

Any good businessman takes a yearly inventory of his stock. At least once a week every housewife looks over her cupboard shelves: Is the coffee almost gone? Has she used the last can of tomatoes? Uncle Sam inventories his entire population only once in ten years and in size and significance the 1950 census will be the most gigantic of all.

On April 1, Uncle will ring up the curtain on the greatest quiz show of all time, featuring the Census of Population, the census of Housing, and the census of Agriculture. On that day 140,000 quizmasters will set out to get the facts on all the people, all the dwelling units, and all the farms in the land.

We the people first called for a population census of the U. S. when the wise framers of our Constitution voted that each state should have two seats in the Senate, and a varying number in the House of Representatives according to population. But who was to say how many were living in each

of the 13 states? Furthermore, the population was bound to change through deaths, births, and immigration. And so a population census at 10 year intervals became law—it was written into Section 3 of Article 1 of the Constitution.

In March, 1790, exactly one year after the Constitution went into effect, 17 U. S. Marshals and their 650 assistants set forth under the direction of Secretary of State Jefferson to count noses. As America's population spread and multiplied through the years, the huge growth of business, industry and agriculture demanded that we know more and more about our complex of life. Today the U. S. Bureau of the Census under the Dept. of Commerce is the largest statistical body in the world, collecting facts of one kind or another every day of the year. Every five years there is a census of business and one of manufacturers as well as the census of Agriculture. Every 10 years there is the original census of population. And until 1947, when Congress unfortunately failed to appropriate funds a census of religious bodies was taken every 10 years.

Federal law requires absolute secrecy concerning your name in connection with the details of your individual report. CONFIDENTIAL is printed at the top of every form the enumerator fills out, and all employees of the Census Bureau are under oath not to divulge anything concerning any person or establishment. Neither income-tax sleuths nor FBI investigators—not even the President himself—can see your return. If you do not wish to answer the enumerators' questions she will give you the form and you can fill it out and mail it yourself.

After your questionnaire has been completed, it will be packed into a strong wooden box along with others from your district and mailed to Philadelphia. There it will be checked in, reviewed, and the answers given code numbers. Then it will be mailed again, this time directly to the Census headquarters in Suitland, Maryland, where it will be turned over to a young woman seated at a typewriter-like machine who will transform the information into a pattern of holes in nondescript cards. Your original questionnaire—the only one bearing your name—will be whisked away to a secret file. Room after room of mechanical wizards will electrically

sort, shuffle, and deal the punched cards into every conceivable combination. And all the while final results will be rolling off the line in the form of printed tabulations for the countless patrons of this gigantic market of statistical information.

Would a governor like to know how many seats his state is entitled to in Congress? "What are our chances of electing a woman President?" In estimating the demand for household goods, manufacturers must know how many young people will be ready for marriage in future years. In their campaign for adequate school buildings, qualified teachers, etc., Parent Teacher Assn. will inquire: "How many children will be in school during the next 10 years?" Our population has been constantly on the increase, and with it has grown the demand for food. Ten years from now will there be enough farmers to feed ourselves and much of Europe and Asia as well?

A solid foundation of census information supports every program for longer and healthier life, improved housing, education and transportation. If this foundation is to be true and firm, it must contain accurate, complete facts on every person, dwelling unit and farm in the United States.

So when the census taker asks if you have been married more than once, how much rent you pay, and whether your bathtub is shared with another family, tell her. This will be your important contribution to Uncle Sam's inventory of the great house that we have built.

Cancer Research Is The Final Answer

The American Cancer Society is the only voluntary health agency in the United States devoted to all phases of the cancer control program including education, service and research. It is supported wholly by voluntary contributions from the public.

When someone gives a dollar to the Society, a quarter of it pays for nationally planned research projects. Sixty cents remains within Texas to support our state's programs of education, service and medical projects. The remaining 15 cents pays for the production of pamphlets, movies, exhibits and other national services, including fund raising.

Cancer is the second leading cause of death in Texas and in the United States. Conservative estimates show that at least one-third and probably one-half, of those dying of cancer could be saved with existing medical knowledge. To save these lives early diagnosis and treatment are necessary.

Some 25 cancer clinics have been established in the state, many of them a direct result of the Society's expanding work. Of these, 11 are supported to some extent by the Texas Division. To obtain such support, a clinic must serve the needy cancer patient.

donated is directed into a coordinated and highly efficient study of cancer causes and all possible cures for the disease. Cancer research in Texas has received aid totalling more than \$173,000.00 from the Cancer Society since July, 1947. These grants are given to the most worthy institutions. Funds have gone to scientists in Austin, Galveston, San Antonio, Houston and Dallas.

More money than ever before must be devoted to cancer research, which seems very near to broad new vistas and to the total solution of this great riddle.

Open House To Be Held At New Power Station

Employees of Central Power and Light Company will be hosts to the people of South Texas at an "Open House" to be held at Nueces Bay Power Station, Corpus Christi, April 16-23, inclusive.

All residents of Rockport and the surrounding area are invited to visit the big power plant during the eight-day Open House, B. T. Hardeman, CPL manager, said. Nueces Bay Station was greatly expanded, during 1949 and is the company's largest power plant.

"All of us in CPL are proud of Nueces Bay Power Station and the important part it plays in the economic well-being of South Texas", Hardeman said. "However, this is the first opportunity we have had to show it to our friends and neighbors. The first unit was completed in 1940, shortly before the war, and three more units were added while hostilities were in progress. We could not open the plant to the public at that time for security reasons. Since the war, we have been busy adding the fifth and largest generating unit. As soon as it was completed last June, we started making preparations for the Open House so that everyone could see the modern, efficient plant in which his electric service begins." CPL employees have been busy for weeks with preparations to receive thousands of visitors. Plenty

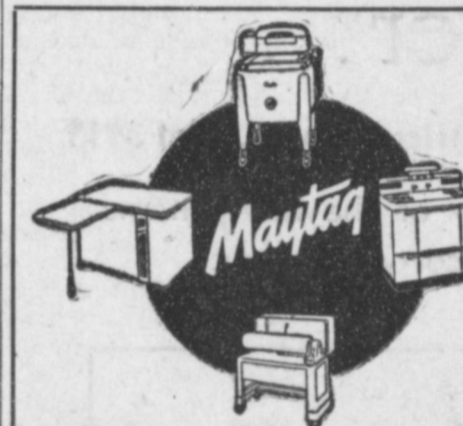

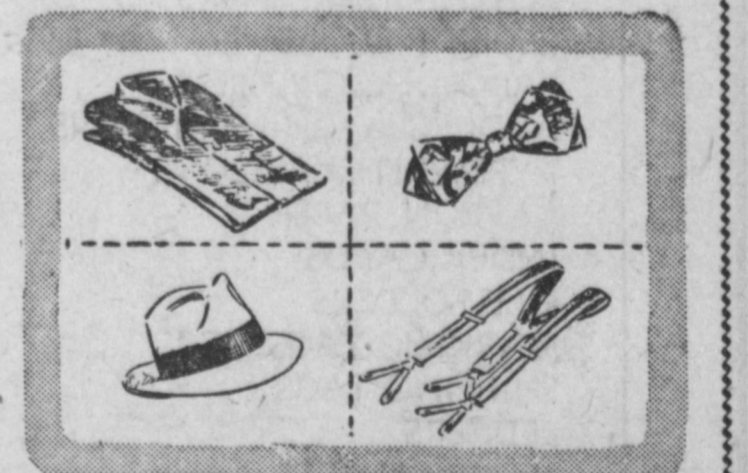

with 7 inch casing set at 8,761 feet, has 5 1/2 inch liner set to 10,169 feet. Total depth is 10,293 feet.

Before setting pipe, the Hewitt and Dougherty well had recovered oil on 4 drill stem tests in the 9,700 foot zone. At 9,703-11 feet, the well flowed water cushion in 6 minutes under 820 pounds working pressure. Recovery was 180 feet of 47 gravity oil, 270 feet of water cushion and oil and 180 feet of mud and oil. On 5 1/2 minute test at 9,712-19 feet, water cushion reached surface in 5 1/2 minutes and working pressure was 740 pounds. Recovery was 265 feet of 40 gravity oil, 180 feet of water cushion and oil, 1,740 feet of rat hole mud and oil.

The well flowed water cushion in 6 minutes on test at 9,720-27 feet, where working pressure was 740 pounds. Recovery was 375 feet of oil, 365 feet of oil, was water and mud. Water cushion flowed in 7 minutes on test at 9,729-35 feet, and working pressure was 740 pounds. Recovery was 190 feet of oil and mud (70 percent oil). Each test was on 1/4 inch chokes with 1,000 foot water cushion.

Ryan, Hays and Burke are drilling a north offset, the No. A-1 Gabriel, and a south offset, the No. 1 K. E. Werland, to the Hewitt and Dougherty well in Mud Flats. Both new tests were below 5,000 feet Wednesday.

Health Department Teaches Food Handlers

Austin, Tex.—The Texas State Department of Health's program of teaching food handlers sanitary methods of preparing and serving food continues to be very popular, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. It is one method of attack on that great group of respiratory diseases which include influenza, scarlet fever, measles, whooping cough and the common cold, the viruses of which are spread from person to person by the excretions of the nose and mouth.

Restaurant sanitation programs have become more necessary because of changes which have taken place in our national eating habits. Once upon a time it was customary for most people in Texas and in the U.S.A. to eat three meals a day at their own table. To "eat out" was an unusual and exciting event. Now, all the family including the baby, eat out.

In this constant mingling of people to eat and drink there exists a vast and complicated arrangement perfectly designed for exchange of saliva via cups, glasses, spoons, forks and fingers that go in and out millions of mouths. There are few hours in the day in any community when these vectors of respiratory and other diseases are not busy.

The prime purpose of restaurant sanitation is to have all dishes and utensils sterilized and to have all those who handle or serve food understand and practice restaurant sanitation every day and all the time.

The public in every community needs to be concerned about the cleanliness of its public eating places. You can help by demanding cleanliness in the places you eat.

They point out the need for complete control and describe the insecticides that have given the best results. Recommended control measures are listed for all of the more common vegetable insects found in the state.

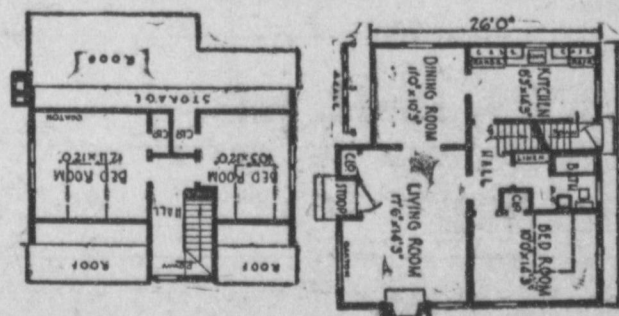
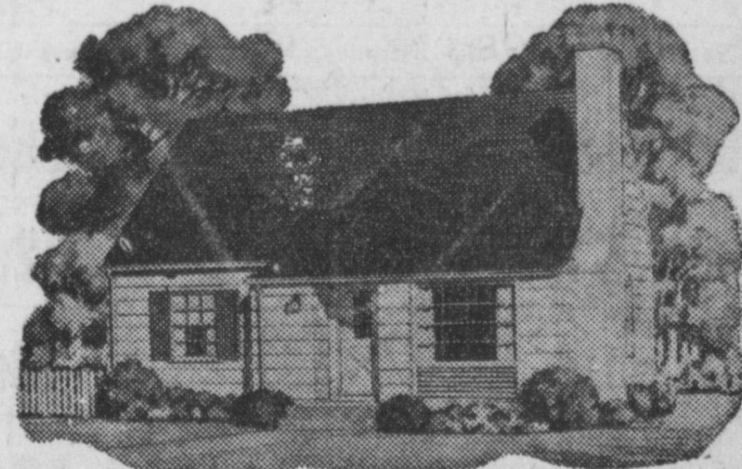
