

#### June Haver, Stevens Are Big Hit in Musical

That fabulous era just after the turn of the century when Jazz was the rage and song-pluggers infested Tin-Pan Alley where hit tunes sold millions of copies, is recounted tunefully and with Technicolor trimmings in "Oh, You Beautiful Doll," which shows at the Surf Theatre next Thursday and Friday. Here is a slick musical made by Twentieth Cen-tury-Fox, the company that has set the pace in fashioning nostalgic song-and-dance stories for the screen ever since "Alexander's Ragtime Band."

The stars, June Haver and Mark Stevens, sing and dance their way blithely through the proceedings and Director John Stahl has kept a swift pace.

The frame-work of the picture is built around the life story of Fred Fisher, whose song hits were on every piano of the nation in the early 1900's. A dozen of his tunes add melody and life to the film, among them being "Peg O' My Heart," "Ireland Must Be Heaven," "Come, Josephine, In My Flying Machine," and many oth-ers. Curiously, the title song "Oh, You Beautiful Doll," is the only one not composed by Fisher.

#### **Carelessness Rampant** In Hunting Field

The Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has reported that carelessness is still rampant in the hunting field. Last hunting season there were 37 deaths and 69 non-fatal accidents caused, in the big majority of cases, by carelessness.

The number of causes of the acidents are: Fatal accidents: Mistaken for game, 1; accidental discharge of gun, 11; stray bullets, 1; falling with loaded gun, 1; crawling through fence, 1; heart attack, 5; drowning, 13; accidentally shot by companions, 4; non-fatal accidents - Accidental discharge of gun, 17; falling from tree, 5; crawling through fence, 2; explosion of gun barrel, 2; stray bullets, 27; intoxication, 6; mistaken for game, 3; accidentally shot by companions, 7. Total hunting accidents, 106.

#### **Cancer Cure** In 15 Years Predicted

Baltimore, Md. - Cancer cure within 15 years? A Johns Hopkins Hospital scientist and leading authority held out that prospect today.

Dr. Perrin H. Long, professor of preventive medicine, predicted that medical men will gather enough information on cancer in the next 15 years to "alter com-pletely the outlook" for anyone who develops the disease.

He declared at a luncheon touchng off the annual Cancer Society campaign here yesterday that refectious diseases stood in 1936. Since then antibiotics such as enicillin, aureomycin, and the sul-

fa drugs have aided in practically wiping out "the fear of infectious diseases in this country," said Dr. Long, himself an antibiotics expert "Leads towards a cure of cancer

are turning up at laboratories all ver the country," Dr. Long aserted.

"We need something," he said, which can be taken by mouth to cure cancer the way antibiotics and sulfa drugs cure infectious diseases.

"That's not as far-fetched as it sounds, and I have a hunch we'll see something like that when the ball starts rolling in the chemical reatment of cancer."






